The Mountaineers then raised their arms and celebrated career win No. 500 for coach John Beilein, who also has led Canisius and Richmond to NCAA tournament appearances

Whether it be a gas or chemical spill on Interstate 68, or a full-out bioterrorist attack, hospital employees are being trained to help out when physicians and nurses are overloaded.

About 15 employees decked out in

Associated Press WASHINGTON — The Senate voted Thursday to strip all proposed Medicaid cuts from the \$2.6 trillion budget for next year, killing the heart of the plan's deficit reduction and dealing an embarrassing setback to President Bush and

Republican leaders. The amendment, whose chief oonsor was moderate Sen Gordon Smith, R-Ore., was approved 52-48 after days of heavy lobbying by both sides. It was widely seen as a test of the GOP-run Congress' taste for making even moderate reductions in popular benefit programs that consume two-thirds of the budget and are growing rapidly, even at a time of record federal deficits. The Medicaid cuts could still be revived when the House and Senate try writing a compromise budget next month. The more conservative House was voting Thursday on a similar budget that would make way for up to \$20 billion in Medicaid savings. The budget sets overall tax and spending targets to guide Congress as it writes bills later in the year that make actual changes in programs and tax laws.

chemical-proof suits and face masks were instructed on how to decontaminate patients in a giant tent called a three-line decontamination shelter.

Rod Kimble, a trainer with the WVU Center for Rural Emergency Medicine, along with several other center members, showed employees how to protect themselves and set up and operate the tent.

"There's a very good cross-section of people here today, and that's what we're looking for," Kimble said. "I hope that when we're done that we've built a team. Second, I hope they're not as afraid of hazardous chemicals. Finally, we're accomplishing something here today that takes us one step further toward preparedness."

The tent included an area where injured patients could be placed on backboards and rolled down the middle of the tent, while being scrubbed and sprayed with warm water.

The tent also utilizes two private paths where, on one side, men discard their clothes and are decontaminated, while women do the same on the opposite side.

Kimble showed employees how to construct the "hot zone" and install equipment that helps wash dangerous chemicals from patients' bodies.

'This is absolutely practical," said Amy Rockis, a Mon General corporate compliance officer. "When all the clinical people are taking in patients during an emergency, we'll be there to help.'

After successfully completing the course, employees are assigned different tasks and will practice what they learned Thursday on a regular basis, said Sandy Friedman, Mon General director of safety and security.

"One of our worries is that there may be a chemical spill in which only some of those exposed are taken by ambulance to our emergency department," she said. "But there are others that will get in their cars and drive to the hospital. In a situation like that, you can't just let them walk in.'

About 250 people have been trained in the course statewide, and 11 courses have been completed so far in West Virginia.

The West Virginia Office of Emergency Services and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security sponsor the courses.

The course is geared toward hospital personnel who may come in contact

# Man released from jail, rearrested for robbery

Morgantown resident charged with second crime on day he is freed

A Morgantown man released Wednesday on a \$2,000 bond for two counts of daytime burglary is now being held on a \$100,000 cash bond after getting arrested for another burglary the same day. Robert Wyckoff Jr., 21, was charged by Mor-

gantown Police with nighttime burglary at Blue Grass Village on Green Bag Road.

Police said the mobile home owner arrived

to find a strange vehicle in his driveway and someone inside. The man fled before police arrived, according to Lt. Ron Snyder.

Officers near South Middle School stopped the car and arrested Wyckoff. Officers obtained search warrants and items from the Blue Grass Village burglary were recovered. A second search warrant on Wyckoff's residence also was served and police recovered additional stolen items.

Wyckoff was arrested along with three other Morgantown residents who police say are responsible for at least 12 burglaries in the Valley View Road area of Morgantown.

The 12 burglaries occurred from January to March. As of Wednesday, more than \$22,000 in stolen items had been recovered.

Wyckoff was charged with two counts of daytime burglary and released after posting \$2,000 bond. Also arrested were Stephen Doll, 21, of Morgantown, one count of receiving stolen property; Debra Smith, 51, of Morgantown, receiving stolen property; and Travis Conrad, 23, of Morgantown, transferring and receiving stolen property.

All charges are felonies. Doll, Smith and Conrad were free on \$5,000 personal recognizance bonds.

"From information developed, we obtained a search warrant for 1111 Valley View, Lot 35, (Wyckoff's residence) and found stolen items, including digital cameras, DVDs, games for

The dog was tied in a yard, barking as usual, hungry and thirsty. At last, a heavyset man in shabby clothing appeared.

"There! Have your water!" said the man, pouring boiling liquid over the dog's hind end, searing his fur and skin.

All this is according to Colleen Nicholson, a professional animal communicator who says she telepathically bonds with abused animals.

"It comes to me in the form of mental pictures, thoughts, feelings," Nicholson said. "Sometimes I get words."

Far out, right? That's debatable. But proponents say that when all leads grow cold and a \$2,000 reward for information has no takers, they're no worse off putting their faith in someone who claims to gab with cats, dogs, horses, birds, iguanas, fish, rabbits — the whole barnyard and then some.

# DHHR project aims to promote teen abstinence

CHARLESTON — State health officials hope to reduce teen pregnancies and stem the spread of sexually transmitted diseases by encouraging youths to delay sex until marriage.

The West Virginia Abstinence Education Project targets children ages 10 to 14. It was developed by the state Department of Health and Human Resources' Office of Maternal, Child and Family Health, which is accepting public comment on it.

"It is imperative that prevention efforts begin prior to the age of 13 in order to successfully reduce high-risk behaviors," the proposal said.

Fifty-two percent of students in grades 9-12 surveyed for the 2003 West Virginia Youth Risk Behavior Surveys have had sexual intercourse, the proposal said. That figure is down from 63 percent in 1993.

The number of babies born to teen mothers who were 15 to 17 years old was 735 in 2002, according to West Virginia Vital Statistics. That number fell from 1,419 in 1985

The abstinence project also aims to educate parents. The proposal, citing 2003

research by the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy, said 53 percent of youth surveyed said that parents and their own values and religious beliefs have the greatest influence on their decisions about sex.

Project priorities include providing grants for community-based abstinence programs, as well as providing information and materials to encourage parents to talk to teens about abstinence and sexually transmitted diseases.

According to the West Virginia Bureau for Public Health, 925 cases of chlamydia were reported among 15- to 19-year-olds in 2003, as well as 176 cases of gonorrhea and one case of syphilis.

Besides encouraging abstinence, the project also focuses on reducing risk behaviors, such as drug, alcohol and tobacco use.

# State unveils new hunting license system

House bill would raise hunting, fishing tag fees

#### A PUBLIC HEARING is set on DNR's fall hunting season proposals for white-tailed deer and black bear. Proposals include DNR's proposal to prohibit bait for deer hunting. 6-8 p.m. March 21, East Fairmont High School Commons.

Outdoor enthusiasts can soon buy hunting and fishing licenses through a new online system.

The state Division of Natural Resources unveiled the \$1.2 million electronic license-sale system Wednesday at South Charleston's Spring Hill Rod & Gun store.

The goal is to have the Electronic Point of Sale System set up and ready to operate by licensing agents statewide by June 1, said Hoy Murphy, DNR public information officer.

"This is a prime example of how

state government can become more efficient and at the same time improve services to the public," said DNR Director Frank Jezioro. "The 'agent point-of-sale' system will solve many of the problems the old paper-based system had, at an annual cost 10 percent less than the paper system.'

The computerized system cuts the time of a license sale from seven minutes to two minutes, better protects against the theft of license buyers' personal information and eliminates the concern of running out of high-demand stamps or licenses, the agency said.

The system will greatly reduce the amount of time spent on licenserelated busywork, said Spring Hill Rod & Gun owner Dan Kessel.

"I usually spend about half an hour a day keeping track of sales, another 3 hours a month to do the bookkeeping, and 4 or 5 hours auditing the books at the end of the year," he said. "All that work will disappear. This system is so good, I'd almost pay to have it.'

About 140 to 150 licensed agents throughout the state who do a large volume of license sales will use the goWILD! Agent Point-of-Sale system and hardware, Murphy said. "We (DNR) are paying for the install and hardware and training," Murphy said.

About 200 licensing agents who sell about 100 or fewer license sales per year will continue using the current paperwork forms, he said.

The new machines will not affect the fee that licensing agents are allowed to charge per license. Last year the Legislature passed a bill allowing them to charge \$3, up from \$1, Murphy said.

#### **New license fees**

House Bill 3048, which provides for the first hike in hunting and fishing license fees since 1989, was introduced this week. The House **Education & Natural Resources** Committee is reviewing it.

The bill calls for increasing hunting and fishing license fees from \$11 each to \$18.

A combined license would increase from \$25 to \$33.

License fees pay for all of DNR's wildlife and enforcement activities

related to hunting and fishing, Murphy said.

'We've cut and redesigned our programs and stretched the dollars as far as they can go," Murphy said. 'In order to just keep services at their current level we have to have this increase.'

An earlier DNR proposal to offer only combined hunting and fishing licenses for \$22 apiece died, Murphy said. That proposal would have eliminated the option of buying a separate hunting or fishing license.

During a series of six public hearings held earlier this year, including one in Fairmont on Feb. 2, sportsmen opposed the idea, Murphy said.

'The overwhelming desire of the outdoor sportsmen was that they wanted to be able to purchase separate hunting and fishing licenses," Murphy said. "No one is arguing that we don't need an increase. The only opposition we got was when we tried to combine the hunting and fishing licenses. "By offering only combined licenses, the DNR could have gotten about \$250,000 in federal dollars, and could have kept license fees lower, Murphy said.

#### State scraps plans to move section of Airport Boulevard

The West Virginia Division of Highways has abandoned plans to move a section of Airport Boulevard to correct problems with homeowners' property lines, officials said Thursday.

Don Williams, acting district engineer for the agency's regional office in Clarksburg, said three households that would have been affected by the change backed out

of a petition to move the road. Rerouting the road would have moved it 13 feet in some places, cutting into some residents' yards and adding to others.

Williams said the residents who dropped from the petition didn't want to lose part of their yard when the road shifted. He said they also were concerned that the road would go over their septic fields

#### **Hearing reveals divides** on insurance issue

CHARLESTON - West Virginia consumers will either fall prey to insurers or enjoy lower policy rates if legislators ban a certain kind of lawsuit that alleges claims were resolved in "bad faith," the Senate Judiciary Committee

heard Thursday. Lawyers who file such lawuits and agents for the insurers they sue lined up to speak at the committee's public hearing on Gov. Joe Manchin's proposal (SB418) to eliminate third-party bad faith lawsuits. "You have to have some stick to hold over the insurance companies so they treat you fairly," said Jeff Jones, a Charleston trial lawyer, in defense of such cases. But Lisa Godwin, a State Farm agent from Kanawha County, was one of several to pledge that rates would go down if the governor's proposal becomes law. 'This bill puts me back in business," she told the committee. "The cost of insurance is going to go down if this bill is passed."

Manchin has promised that auto insurers would reduce their rates by \$50 million, or up to \$100 for every auto policy in the state, within 90 days if his bill is made law.

#### Mezzatesta to take job of another school official

CHARLESTON - Hampshire County's school transportation director said Thursday he has been told he is losing his job to former House Education Chairman Jerry Mezzatesta because Mezzatesta's position is being eliminated. David Fritsch said he received a letter dated March 10 from Assistant Superintendent Paula O'Brien telling him he would be transferred to another job for the 2005-06 school year. Such letters do not give reasons for transfers or say where employees will move to, but state personnel rules allow employees to ask why. He said county Personnel Director Susan Grady told him that Mezzatesta's \$60,000-ayear job as a school community specialist was being eliminated.

with hazardous materials when receiving contaminated patients.

The skills acquired can be used in events such as chemical spills, and biological or chemical attacks.

Dr. Brooks Gainer, a physician at the hospital, received his training before the Sept. 11 attacks in New York.

"We went through what this



# Iraqi government coalescing

#### Newly sworn in legislators hammer out compromises

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Kurdish and Shiite politicians said Thursday they made headway in solving new disagreements in their deal to form a coalition government, nearly seven weeks after Iraqis took to the polls, but it remained unclear when that new government would be announced.

The talks came after Iraqi legislators were sworn in Wednesday as members of the 275-seat National Assembly, vowing to uphold freedom and democracy two years after the fall of Saddam Hussein. Many of the new deputies wore traditional robes trimmed in gold, and mingled with austere Shiite clerics in black robes and turbans. Other men wore tan or gray suits, while nearly all the 85 women lawmakers wore headscarves.

Elected on Jan. 30, when insurgent attacks killed more than 40 people, the assembly ended its first session with an oath to protect Iraq's "federal democratic system" and "public and private liberties."

Insurgents, hoping to disrupt the ceremony, fired seven mortar rounds in quick succession at the convention center that temporarily houses parliament in the heavily fortified Green Zone. U.S. Apache attack helicopters hovered overhead.

Thursday's discussions focused on whether to allow the Kurdish peshmerga militia to remain in Kurdistan as part of the Iraqi security services and army, and on setting a timetable for the Kurds to assume control of oilrich Kirkuk and allow the return of its nearly 100,000 refugees. Those conditions were included in an interim law that serves as a preliminary

#### constitution.

"Negotiations were very constructive and the differences in the interim law and peshmerga were solved. We have agreed that some peshmerga will join the Kurdistan police and some will be part of the Iraqi army, with the same equipment and salaries and take orders from the defense ministry in Baghdad," Azad Jundiyan, a spokesman for the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan, told The Associated Press.

That is the political party of Jalal Talabani, who probably will become Iraq's next president.

But Jundiyan added that announcing a new government could come after Kurds celebrate their new year next week.

"I think that the new government will be announced on March 26 after the end of Nowruz," he said.

The interim constitution has no set time limit on forming the government after the National Assembly convenes. But once it elects a president with a two-thirds majority, a prime minister must be chosen within two weeks.

There was no immediate comment on the date from Shiite politicians.

Earlier, a member of the Shiitedominated United Iraqi Alliance said there was agreement on issues such as the peshmerga, and more talks would be held.

"The army units in Kurdistan will be mixed and follow the orders of the central government. As for the police force they will be formed from the people of Kurdistan," Ali al-Dabagh said.

On Wednesday, the deputies failed to set a date to reconvene, did not elect a speaker or even nominate a president and vice president — all of which they had hoped to do. Instead, the session was spent celebrating the moment, and the enormous obstacles Iraq has overcome.

## U.S. envoy strives to resume N. Korea talks

Pyongyang's absence stalled negotiations about nuclear weapons

SHANGHAI, China — Envoys from the United States, China, Japan and South Korea discussed Thursday how to restart formal talks on ending North Korea's nuclear weapons program, officials said, but there was no indication that a Pyongyang representative attended.

U.S. envoy Joseph DeTrani and Chinese Foreign Ministry officials were among those attending the meetings, officials said. Scholars and experts on the region also were there.

"We believe this meeting will nurture new opinions and approaches for promoting the resumption of the six-party talks," said a Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman.

Those talks have been stalled by North Korea's refusal to attend. Since 2003, Beijing has hosted three rounds of talks with the United States, Japan, the two Koreas and Russia to discuss ways to dismantle the North's nuclear weapons program. Pyongyang canceled a planned fourth round in September. North Korea has demanded more aid and a peace treaty with Washington in exchange for abandoning nuclear arms development.

China, as North Korea's last major ally, has been trying to bring the reclusive country back to negotiations. The effort has taken on greater urgency since Pyongyang's unconfirmed declaration in February that it has nuclear weapons.

"At present, the six-party talks have stalled and encountered some problems," Liu said. "We hope the various sides will work vigorously and demonstrate flexibility in order to reopen the six-party talks."





# Palestinian factions agree to cease-fire until end of year

#### Militants want Israel to free prisoners, end violence

CAIRO, Egypt — Palestinian militant groups agreed Thursday to a truce with Israel until the end of this year on condition that Israel interim step, and in order for there to be progress in peace efforts, terrorist organizations cannot continue to exist as armed groups, and certainly not as terror organizations," the statement said.

Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas agreed to a de facto ceasefire at a Feb. 8 summit with Sharon. Militant attacks have dropped considerably since — but a suicide bombing in Tel Aviv in late February prompted Israel to back off some of its promises, and Abbas was eager to get militants on board with a truce to push forward the fragile peace process. "What has been agreed upon is that the period of calm will have an upper time limit, which is the end of the year." said Mohammed Nazzal, a Hamas leader.

# Oil prices soar to record; analysts predict it's new norm

WASHINGTON — Oil prices soared to new highs Thursday, promising higher gasoline prices and leaving some analysts saying the upward run defies gravity.

U.S. light crude rose past \$57 a barrel Thursday as traders shrugged off the promise a day earlier by the world's major oil producers to increase production. That puts oil prices about 50 percent higher than they were this time last year.

Gasoline prices are still lower than their 1981 highs, which in today's dollars would top \$3 a gallon. In gas stations across the United States, a gallon of unleaded gas now averages about \$2.05, about 30 cents more than it did a year ago. Get used to it, energy analysts say.

They warn that fuel prices are likely to go higher and say high prices may become the norm. Experts say increasing demand for oil in large developing nations such as China and India, the lack of sufficient infrastructure to deliver oil in the future and changes in investment patterns are combining to drive up prices.

On the face of it, rising prices appear illogical. Energy Department statistics show that U.S. crude oil stockpiles were higher at the beginning of this year than they were at the beginning of 2004.

"It is so irrational ... it is defying gravity," said Steve Bellino, a New York-based senior vice president of energy risk management for Fimat USA, a global investment broker.

Lee Raymond, the chairman and chief executive officer of Exxon Mobil, the world's largest oil company, recently told Wall Street analysts that speculation, not market conditions, is driving today's oil market.

The International Energy Agency in Paris, which tracks oil demand for industrialized nations, offered a more nuanced explanation: Oil consumption has caught up with the capacity to extract and refine oil into gasoline. The agency projects rising demand for oil across the globe in the second half of 2005.

The United States remains the biggest oil consumer, using 21 million barrels a day, but the International Energy Agency warned that focusing

on the United States misses the global picture. It showed that China used almost 5 million barrels a day last year and by 2022 may consume as much as the United States does today. India, the world's second most populous nation, also has a fast-growing appetite for oil.

Analysts said there wasn't enough production capacity to meet the world's growing oil demand, despite the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' announcement Wednesday that it would increase production by 2 percent.

'It's really simple. We grossly underestimated the world's need for oil and we were hallucinating about the available supply," said Matthew Simmons, the head of Simmons & Co. International, a Houston-based investment bank specializing in the oil sector.

Simmons thinks there's little room in the next year or two for production increases, so oil isn't really overpriced, it's too cheap.

"I think we will look back and say how on Earth did we think that \$50 or \$60 a barrel was expensive," Simmons said.

John Iglehart, a managing director for investment giant Goldman Sachs in London, said the high oil prices of the 1970s led to excess production in the 1980s. Since then, he said. there's been insufficient investment to meet increasing demand.

"We've been living off the excess capacity of the 1970s," Iglehart said. "Not only do we have strong demand, but now for the first time severe supply delivery constraints."

Another sign that higher oil prices are here to stay is the futures markets for oil contracts. Oil prices are set on the spot market, in which contracts call for delivery within 30 days. To hedge against changing oil prices in the future, many investors purchase futures contracts, whose prices historically tended to be lower than the spot price.

Today, futures contracts for oil are trading at prices higher than the spot price. That means long-term contracts are being snapped up on the belief that the long-term price, although higher than today's spot price, will still be lower than the spot price will be four months from now.

# **Steel boom** pays off big for execs

PITTSBURGH (AP) - A banner year for the domestic steel industry has turned into banner payouts for some steel executives.

The chief executive officers at both United States Steel Corp. and International Steel Group Inc. cashed out company shares for checks worth \$34.8 million and \$40.1 million, respectively. That's on top of annual salary.

Similar payouts are likely for executives at Nucor Corp., which is expected to file documents with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission later this month outlining executive compensation.

Thomas Usher, who stepped down as chief executive officer at U.S. Steel in September, made nearly \$46 million, which on top of exercised options, includes a \$825,225 salary, a bonus of \$3 million, a retention bonus of \$3 million, and another \$2.7 million as part of a consultation agreement.

In SEC documents filed Thursday, ISG reported that its president and chief executive officer, Rodney Mott, exercised options worth more than \$40 million on top of his salary of \$650,000, and a bonus of nearly \$2 million.

Executives at both companies navigated deftly through a major consolidation in the industry that saw dozens of competitors collapse. At the same time, they worked new contracts with labor

# Two firms, developer acquire Toys R Us

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - Toys R Us Inc., the nation's second-largest toy seller, is staying in one piece after weighing a breakup.

The struggling retailer announced Thursday it had agreed to become a privately owned company in a \$6.6 billion buyout deal proposed by a group that includes two equity firms and a real estate developer. The deal ended a seven-month auction that started as an effort to divide the sluggish toy business from the smaller, but more lucrative, Babies R Us segment.

Instead, the company agreed to be swallowed whole by Kohlberg Kravis Roberts & Co., Bain Capital LLC and Vornado Realty Trust, who will be equal partners. There was no immediate word on the buyers' specific plans for the company's roughly 1,500 stores.

"We look forward to building on the many strengths of the company to make the stores a better place to shop and work," Michael M. Calbert, a director at the famed buyout firm KKR, said in a statement.

John H. Eyler Jr. said it was up to the new owners to determine what stores, if any, would be closed.

But he noted, "The new owners paid a significantly handsome price, and the only way you can pay that price is if you believe in the future of the business, so I expect this business to be around for a very long time." Chris Byrne, an independent toy

consultant, said a privately run Toys R Us will free executives from the pressure of quarterly earnings reports, and allow them to build a business that typically has the bulk of its sales around the December holidays.

"You have to expect that your second quarter is going to be slow and your third quarter is going to be slow, but that hopefully you're going to make it up in the fourth quarter," Byrne said. Toys R Us has been losing market share in the toy business to industry leader Wal-Mart Stores Inc. and other discounters such as Target Corp. It announced in August it would separate its toy business from the Babies R Us segment, which sells children's apparel, furniture and accessories, but did not say how.

government's bid for prison time and sentenced him to six months of house arrest, five years on probation and ordered him to pay \$60,000 in criminal forfeitures and fines.

Keeping up his attack, Parkman asked if McVay got to stay in his

# 'Ring 2' looks good, but is hollow at its core 'Ice Princess' scores well

Back in 2002, "The Ring" was successful enough to make Hollywood assume that audiences were



screaming for more. But this week's sequel will leave audiences ready to bay at the moon. The new movie's special effects offer scant compensation for its negligible plot, dreary

pace and slim characterization. Verbinski's "Ring" had snappy dialogue, strong characters, a couple of genuinely creepy scenes and a refreshingly clever storyline in which watching a certain video damned the watcher to an unpleasant demise. The new film jettisons the murderous-video routine after 20 minutes and focuses on the first 'Ring's'' least exciting data.

Journalist Rachel Keller (Naomi Watts) and son Aidan

**REVIEW** (David Dorfman) are again at the center of things. Following

their horrific misadventures in Seattle, Rachel and son move to the small coastal community of Astoria, Ore. But trouble follows them in the form of evil spirit Samara, actually the ghost of a murdered child. Samara just won't leave Aidan alone and wants to co-habit his body.

"The Ring Two" looks good, with the Pacific Northwest serving as an enticing locale. But once past the surface, it's hollow at the core. Grade: D+.

will put her in the best college and launch her in life.

But in doing that project — she uncovers the physics of great skating technique, the jumps, spins, etc. she comes under the influence of tough Tina, a skating coach played without a hint of sentiment by the terrific Kim Cattrall of TV's "Sex and the City."

"You have to want it." she growls at Casey. "You have to want it more than anything else. It's not something you do on a whim.'

What plays out amid Casey's new social interaction with her fellow skaters and her accidental discovery of her graceful and beautiful side on the ice is nothing less than a struggle for the girl's mortal soul, between her intense and uncompromising mom and her

equally intense and ruthless coach. One, who grew up a plain Jane, is dismissive of the sexy sport and its "cute little outfits." The other has hints of Tonya Harding in her past. Catfight!

Seriously, director Tim Fywell looked at his script and at his dream cast, and threw in one terrific mother-daughter or mother-vs.-coach or coach-student scene after another. Cusack and Cattrall are so good that they make Trachtenberg better.

There are funny bits about "skating parents" pushing their kids toward the fame and big money that an Olympic career can mean, and the head games of the various "mean girl" competitors (real skater Juliana Cannarozzois, a Goth-girl skater and a stitch). The more generic teen stuff, the high-school flirting bit — Trevor Blumas is a pretty-boy Zamboni driver — doesn't get in the way of the main story.

This is really about the ways that a kid who's already learned how to focus on something can turn that intensity on a new passion, and the rewards of trying something new.

And the life lessons of "Ice Princess" — about betrayal, gamesmanship, the hard bargains that you strike to get what you want, and the pressure of making decisions at 17 that will change your life forever — are worth their weight in Olympic gold.

Forget "The Pacifier." This is Disnev's niche, a good movie with positive messages, a G rating and no Vin Diesel. About time they found it again.

was one of two held this month. The two meetings, held with the

organization's citizens advisory committee and technical advisory committee, were the first step in gathering public input on traffic concerns in Mon and Preston counties.

"We had big-idea discussions about what we thought the major issues were in town," Parsons said. "I think a lot of this will be used as basically a foundation. This is going to be one step in the process.'

The two sessions were part of an overall transportation plan update that will take the next 18 months, Parsons said. The update will take a comprehensive look at roads, buses and alternative modes of transportation, such as bicycling, walking and riding the Personal Rapid Transit system, or PRT.

Once complete, the plan will provide the guide for building roads, widening existing streets and development of new transportation methods for the two counties the organization covers, Parsons said.

Mike Kelly, chair of the citizens advisory committee for the organization, said the meeting this week was useful. He said it was important to identify issues that were important to citizens.

"I think it was very good, very informative," he said. "It's part of the process of gaining information."

The next step will be three public meetings during the week of April 18 to gather input from local residents,

Parsons said. He did not have the exact times or locations available.

Interested residents also can submit their comments on a survey at the organization's Web site, www.plantogether.org.

Because the board did not have enough members in attendance to make a quorum, it could not take official action. The board postponed votes on the organization's budget and several amendments to the organization's transportation improvement program, which is the list of upcoming construction projects.

The board plans to hold a special meeting later this month to take action on those issues.

Though it could not take action, the board members talked about plans to build an intermodal facility at the WVU Health Sciences Center.

Bob Roberts, director of transportation at WVU, presented a concept plan that would include an eight-level parking garage that would hook up with the PRT station there. It also would provide access for cars and alternative forms of transportation, such as buses and bicycles.

The board agreed to send a letter to U.S. Rep. Alan Mollohan, D-W.Va., saying they wanted to proceed with the project. The organization hopes to keep more than \$7 million in federal money to build the project.

"We do have a consensus now and this is the project we would like the funding directed to," he said.

While Morgantown previously has made "top" lists for being a livable small town, a new designation has an important economic development angle that could pay off in quantifiable ways, officials said Thursday.

Morgantown was rated as a 5-Star Quality of Life Metro by Expansion Management Magazine, a 45,000circulation periodical that goes out to corporate clients who might consider moving a company of 50 to 500 employees.

"The nice thing about this citation is that it comes from a magazine that deals with relocation prospects of mid-sized businesses, which represents a good fit for our community," said Tom Witt, director of the Bureau of Business and Eco-

gantown area's transportation plan. Chet Parsons, director of the Morgantown-Monongalia County Transportation Planning Organization, said at the MPO's meeting Thursday night that the session

Morgantown was the only West Virginia city listed among 72 Metropolitan Statistical Areas as having a 5-Star Quality of Life, based on such attributes as crime, affordable housing, public schools, traffic and air access. Parts of the eastern panhandle were listed among the Washington, D.C.-statistical area. which also made the list.

Witt and Don Reinke, director of the Monongalia County Development Authority, both mentioned Morgantown's inclusion as an MSA based on the 2000 census as a primary factor of recent growth that has stores such as Best Buy and Target opening up in the city.

"It really represented a tipping point," Witt said. "Before then, we sort of fell below the cut-off point and the perception was that we didn't have the critical mass of customers and the potential labor supply."

Reinke also serves as president of the Morgantown Area Economic Partnership, which includes Preston County, part of the Morgantown statistical area.

"If you're going to recruit businesses and keep them in the area, that area has to be able to offer a good quality of life," Reinke said.

To that end, officials noted that Morgantown's infrastructure has some catching up to do to allow the city to maintain a desirable quality of life. Traffic and more housing are the two main areas where work needs to be done, and the Morgantown-Monongalia County Transportation Planning Organization's 18- to 24-month study of roads is a good starting point, Mayor Ron Justice said.

"That's the most pressing issue and if we don't do something and get the attention of the state to build roads, we're going to choke on our own growth," Justice said. "That's the message we've been sending loud and clear to the Legislature this term."

Groups such as Sunnyside Up, which will provide more student housing in Sunnyside and clear out more homes for single-family dwellings, also will help, he said.

In addition to Morgantown, cities in bordering states listed as 5-Star Quality of Life Metros included Pittsburgh; State College, Pa.; Erie, Pa.; Harrisburg-Carlisle, Pa.; Blacksburg-Christianburg-Radford, Va.; Charlottesville, Va.; Roanoke, Va.; and Lexington, Ky.

#### Star City playground fund raising in full swing

Park designed around history of the region

The drive to raise funds for a community playground in Star City is picking up.

Proponents of the park hope fund-raising events in April will help them raise a large chunk of the \$150,000 that is needed to build and maintain the park.

The main event, at 2 p.m. April 9 at Mountaineer Mall, offers anyone interested in supporting the park an opportunity to buy sponsorship tiles, bricks and picket fence slats that will be used to construct the playground for \$25 each. Children will have the opportunity to paint some of the tiles at the event.

That same day, playground organizers will have a table set up at the Morgantown Mall in conjunction with the WVU Children's Hospital Kraft Fair with information for interested donors.

"We're really pushing our corporate campaign right now," said project coordinator Elizabeth Beall. Many local businesses have offered in-kind support services to help get the job done. But she said business support is only part of the equation.

"We want the community to feel they own this playground," she said. "The ideal thing would be for 150,000 people to give us \$1."

Playground planners have so far raised about \$5,000. The playground, which will be

located along the rail-trail, off Frontier Street in Star City, has been in the works for several years and is the fruit of a collaborative effort between Morgantown North Rotary Club, the town of Star City, Scott's Run Settlement House, Pace Tec, Inc., and others.

Beall said planners expect to have all the materials and volunteers needed to build the playground during the week of June 15-19. The playground should be finished by the end of the week and a ribbon-cutting ceremony will be held the evening of June 19.

The architectural firm Leathers and Associates of Ithaca, N.Y., worked with local kids and adults

from the community to create a design for the playground. The history of the region will be recognized through wooden play structures that will look like a steam ship and

locomotive engine, Beall said. The playground is designed so older kids will play in one area and younger children will play in the other. Much attention has been given to making the playground accessible to handicapped children; designers substituted ramps for ladders wherever possible, Beall said.

Star City Mayor Allen Sharp said the playground will be part of an overall revitalization of the waterfront in Star City that could attract homebuilders and businesses to the area.

The Kiwanis Club is planning to build a picnic area near the playground and the town recently applied for a grant that could eventually link the former Ames Plaza with the rail-trail.

Sharp said a number of volunteers from the community and around the state have stepped forward to pledge their support for the playground. He said playground organizers have made meal, transportation and day care arrangements for the week the construction is to occur to make volunteering for the project easier.

# Did somebody say election?

Are you ready for another election?

Well, ready or not, for the next 40 days it's going to rain news, political signs and candidates on us about Morgantown's municipal election, April 26.

But let's not get ahead of ourselves. If you're not registered to vote, you need to be by April 6.

We encourage you to join the 14,144 registered voters eligible to cast a ballot in Morgantown's election.

And unlike registering your vehicle, registering to vote costs nothing.

Speaking of registering your vehicle, if you're doing that at a Division of Motor Vehicles facility you can also register to vote there — just ask them for a voter's registration application.

Probably the most common way to register to vote, though, is at the Monongalia County Courthouse in the voters' registration office. Other options include registering to vote on the secretary of state's Web site or just drop by our newspaper's office to pick up that application. We'll even mail it to you if you like.

So that doesn't leave many excuses for not registering.

And since we mentioned no excuses to not register to vote, there's also no excuse to not vote.

From April 6-23 you can vote in Morgantown's election about every day, including the two Saturdays, preceding the election.

Our newspaper plans to cover this election as extensively as we did the Nov. 2 general election and then some.

As a rule, if 20 percent of Morgantown's voters cast a ballot in its municipal election, it was a good day.

That's unacceptable. But, we'll be the first to admit we're thankful we live here. Issues other communities in the state are wrestling with, like budget shortfalls, economic development, the public and private sectors bickering, and so on, are not the biggest fish in the pond here.

However, issues like transportation, zoning, infrastructure, planning, consolidation of government services, pedestrian safety, parking and other issues continue to cause waves.

Morgantown's City Council is divided by wards and its candidates are nominated by them, but each council member represents the entire city. As such, its residents vote for all seven of them. Though incumbents face challenges to only two of seven wards, the 1st and 6th, even this limited competition could change things.

# Exempt school building projects from wage act

I am writing in reference to the building costs overruns for new schools in Monongalia County. I want to offer an option for the projects. The only information I have is from The Dominion Post news stories; but it appears that the only thing being considered by the Monongalia County Board of Education is to remove parts of the project to reduce cost. There is another alternative.

Since this is a public project, the county is required by state law to pay the prevailing wage rates for the construction labor; if there is enough public support, this would be a good time to ask your legislators for a resolution to specifically exempt these projects from the Prevailing Wage Act.

The Prevailing Wage Act sets the minimum wage rates to be paid to construction workers doing public jobs. In Monongalia County, the 2004 "minimum wage" for a Class III Laborer (someone to sweep floors and pick up trash on the construction site) is set at \$24.50/hour in wages and fringe benefits; a carpenter makes \$31.75/hour.

Is it really necessary to pay the construction janitor more money than the teachers who will be working after the construction is complete?

If prevailing wage was not an issue; the competitive market would pay a much less cost for labor. The actual prevailing wage in Monongalia County, as determined by the state Department of Employment, is about half of what the taxpayers are required to pay under the act. If labor costs were able to be competitively bid out, it could easily save 15 percent to 20 percent over the entire project, thus giving all the schools, all items promised by the BOE.

These are your tax dollar; fight for them — stop subsidizing special interest construction organizations and start getting your money's worth on public projects. **Mike Mitchell**

# As holidays go, March 10, was nothing much to celebrate

**As HOLIDAYS GO,** March 10 didn't have the familiar ring of, say, July 4th or December 25 or even March 17. But a holiday it is — of sorts.

If you failed to stop for champagne and a greeting card, you may be forgiven, as it was hard to get behind something called "National Day of Appreciation for Abortion Providers." It doesn't quite slip off the tongue like "Merry Christmas!" but there it is.

In fact, I've tried to come up with an appropriate greeting — Termination Tidings? Happy Vivisection Day? — and, well, you see the problem. It's also hard to be pithy about death, in this case the 1993 murder of Dr. David Gunn, an abortion provider who was killed by a crazy person, who, without irony, described himself as "pro-life."

The idea to declare a commemorative day to celebrate Gunn's work



in the gut-wrenching trenches of aborted life is credited to Refuse and Resist (R&R), a grassroots group that protests whatever needs protesting.

R&R claims credit, for instance, for protesting the death sentence of Mumia Abu-Jamal, the radical black journalist who was who was convicted in 1982 of murdering a police officer. In 2001, a federal judge upheld Abu-Jamal's conviction but overturned the death sentence.

This year, Abortion Apprecia-

tion Day fell the day after another important date on the abortion calendar — the trial of Jeff White. Little known among Americans who go about their days without giving much thought to abortion, White is the fellow who last year was dragged away from a Washington, D.C., abortion clinic for displaying the remains of an aborted fetus in a jar.

Or the remains of a pre-born baby, depending on your point of view.

As protests go, you have to hand it to White. He gets high marks for riveting visual effects and for making the point he was after. Which is we avert our gaze from what abortion does for focusing on marches for "choice" and women's reproductive health.

White staged his demonstration during last April's "March for Women's Lives." If convicted, he faces three months in prison on what surely is among America's most unusual charges: unlawful display of human remains without a permit. Who knew? Next time, buddy, get your permit.

There are enough passions on both sides of the abortion issue, it seems, to neutralize interest among those who occupy the radical middle — the majority of Americans who support legal abortion, albeit with restrictions, but who really would prefer not to talk about it. Or better, who wish the subject would go away. Sort of like White's little jar.

Who wants to see the "products of conception from your termination," anyway? That's how hospital administrators in Glasgow, Scotland, referred to another fetus-in-a-jar one containing the issue of Nicola McManus, who had induced a mis-

carriage with the RU-486 "abortion pill" a few years ago.

Hospital staff had labeled the jar with McManus' name and, in a lapse of judgment, left it in her room for pickup and delivery to the pathology lab. McManus was chatting on the phone with her husband when she realized what was in the jar sitting by her.

Things did not go well after that, prompting hospital officials to fashion an apology as cold and sterile as an operating room. Just the way we like it, or else we might all end up in tears the way McManus did.


So here we are, marking another year since Roe v. Wade, another anniversary of Gunn's death, another count of aborted fetuses, another month of protests.

On one side are White's supporters, who think the jar is the way to go. On the other are those rallying to celebrate Gunn, who no sane person would argue deserved to die. Abortion may be a lot of things we can debate, but it's legal and murder isn't.

But Gunn's work isn't much to celebrate, either. Though it may be lucrative, suctioning human life from a woman's womb can't bring much satisfaction at the end of the day.

If you were just passing through and, without prior knowledge or history, noticed these two armies — one celebrating abortion and the other hoisting jars of baby parts — you might think the world had gone bloody mad. You'd be right.





# Tough day for McGwire, wrestlers

#### ST. LOUIS

It was a day like no other, really, this sunny Thursday on the Mississippi River, a sports fan's delight.

This city that will host the Final Four was conducting a dry run with the NCAA Wrestling Championships beginning at the Savvis Center, an underpublicized event that matches the Final Four in intensity, if not in thrills.

If that was all that was going on, it would be a day to remember, but instead there was so much more. Televisions throughout the city were tuned to the first round of the NCAA Tournament, people marveling at how little time it took for a No. 12 seed the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee to knock off a No. 5 seed, Alabama.

Mostly, though, the people of St. Louis were clicking their remotes to the House of Representatives' hearing on steroids in baseball.

Mark McGwire was testifying and how crushing would it be to this baseball-mad city to learn that its most revered sports figure was a cheat. They'd rather learn that their beloved Gateway Arch was a McDonald's knock off.

McGwire did not disappoint them. He refused to admit to using steroids to build the muscles that hit baseballs from one zip code to another, stopping far short of making an out-and-out denial of using the juice, as did both Rafael Palmeiro and Sammy Sosa.

And, while saying he knew that steroids could be dangerous, he stuck to the code of the underground and said, "I will not implicate friends and teammates," a double-entendre that took a shot at his former teammate Jose Canseco but, at the same time, indicated that he did know of others who were steroid abusers.

# Jones breezes through two NCAA matches

**Runs** winning streak to 48

 ${\rm ST.}\ {\rm LOUIS}-{\rm Greg}\ {\rm Jones}\ {\rm roared}$ through the first day of the NCAA Wrestling Championships in quest of his third national title. Undefeated and top-seeded at  $184\,$ 

pounds, Jones did what he vowed to do when he arrived here on Tuesday.

"I told myself on Tuesday night to have fun with this," he said. And what could be more fun

than winning two matches, defeating Alex Camargo of Kent State by a technical fall in his first match, then cruising past Joe Rovelli of Hofstra in the second round, 15-5.

Along the way Jones broke his own school record by recording his 47th consecutive victory while outscoring his two opponents, 38-13.

Jones will be matched against Missouri's unranked Matt Pell, 32-8, in today's third-round match, but it may not matter who faces Jones the rest of the way. His focus seems to be laser sharp.

"I was ready to wrestle," he said. "This is what we've waiting on.

#### **NCAA WRESTLING**

The time's finally here, so we have to get it done."

His first match was a mismatch. "The first match is important, especially for me. I use it to establish a rhythm for myself," he said. It didn't take long for Jones to establish his rhythm — One-twothree, takedown. One-two-three, takedown.

That's how it went. Seven seconds after shaking hands with Camargo, Jones had his first takedown. After allowing an escape, it took Jones

about 10 seconds for a second takedown and six more seconds for a third after they reached a neutral

position. By the time the match had ended, Jones possessed 10 takedowns.

Let's put that in perspective. In his career -126 matches, including this first match— Jones had been taken down a grand total of 10 times.

Camargo had no chance and seemed relieved when it finally ended, Jones leading 23-8 and being credited with a technical fall at 6:37 of the match.

The second match was more of the same. He was facing a talented freshman whom he had defeated 13-7 during the season.

Again the rhythm was one-twothree, takedown. One-two-three, takedown.

This time it took eight seconds for him to get Rovelli down. By the time the first period ended, he possessed four more takedowns and a 10-3 lead.

From there it was simply a matter finishing out the match.

As strong as Jones was is as weak as the rest of the WVU contingent was. None of the other four



CLEVELAND — You have to make it through the night if you want to talk about your dreams. WVU woke up with plenty on its

slack. I figured if I kept on playing, I'd get my chance to make something happen."

Kevin Pittsnogle had 17 for WVU and Mike Gansey finished with 12. Pittsnogle's first basket put him over 1,000 for his career.

Nate Funk led the Bluejays with 23 points, but missed a potential game-winning 3-pointer at the ouzzer. Johnny Mathies had 16. but just two in the second half when he was in foul trouble. He fouled out with more than two minutes remaining. Creighton, the second-best 3-point offense in the tournament, made 8 of 20 3point shots, just below its season average. "They're just a great team and to come out with a win in the NCAA Tournament is a tremendous achievement," said coach John Beilein, who recorded his 500th career victory.



While this was going on, there was one disinterested viewer in St. Louis, a participant in the NCAA Wrestling Championships by the name of Greg Jones.

As lovely a morning as it was, for the West Virginia University wrestling contingent, it was nothing but sleet and rain. Rather than wrestling as if they had their backs to the wall, they wrestled with their backs to the mat.

By 1 p.m. of five competitors, the only one who had not been eliminated from the championship bracket was the top-seeded, defending champion Jones, who is looking to become a three-time NCAA champion.

First it was the freshman Shawn Cordell, who felt like a winner just because he survived the flight to St. Louis.

"I don't like to fly." he said. admitting this was just his second flight, the first one being a trip to the Dominican Republic. "I got a little woozy on landing."

Following Cordell, in rapid-fire succession, Seth Lisa, Matt Lebe and Zac Fryling had lost.

Jones saw the trend developing and it wasn't exactly what he wanted to see.

"If you sit there in the arena long enough, it will suck the energy out of you," Jones admitted.

And so it was that Jones would watch a teammate wrestle, then leave the arena, go off where a television was and watch the House of Representatives hearings on steroids in baseball.

Did he care about that? "Not really," he admitted.

Neither, apparently, did McGwire, who was whole lot tougher to pin down than a WVU wrestler as he danced around questions, refusing to talk about the past or his own past, that now seems as dirty as many believe Barry Bonds' present to be.

Unlike McGwire, Jones did make a statement, ending the run of WVU losses with a 23-8 technical fall in his opening match, then adding an overwhelming victory in his second match.

"A good day," he said. At least he had a better day than Mark McGwire.

"That just shows something about our team. One player can have a bad game, but we have a bunch of players who can pick up the

# Oakland coach wants Tar Heels

#### Craves game in national spotlight

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - Soon after Oakland finished a surprising run through the Mid-Continent Conference tournament, coach Greg Kampe began thinking about North Carolina.

Keep in mind this was nearly a week before the NCAA tournament pairings were announced, and long before the Golden Grizzlies were slotted for the play-in game. At the time, despite a 12-18 record, various computer rankings had them high enough where a 14th seed was possible.

That wasn't what Kampe wanted. He wanted to be the ultimate underdog. He wanted to be a No. 16 seed, with a chance to go through the opening round and face the Tar Heels.

"I wanted to be in that game, because if I was in that game, then it's going to be North Carolina," Kampe said Thursday. "You're going to be on the national stage."

Well, coach, you got your wish. Oakland easily beat Alabama A&M for the chance to play the top-seeded Tar Heels (27-4) tonight in the first round of the Syracuse Regional, with the winner advancing to face either eighth-seeded Minnesota (21-10) or ninth-seeded Iowa State (18-11).


In the evening session, top-seeded Duke (25-5) plays 16th-seeded Delaware State (19-13) in the Austin Regional, with eighth-seeded Stanford (18-12) and ninth-seeded Mississippi State (22-10) meeting in the finale.

North Carolina and Duke should have plenty of support, since the Charlotte Coliseum is within about 150 miles of their campuses. It should be everything but a home game, courtesy of the selection committee's new policy of keeping No. 1 seeds close to home.

"To me, I've always wanted the regular season to be very important," Tar Heels coach Roy Williams said. "I think the idea is really good."

Even if the majority of fans are rooting for the teams from Tobacco Road, the environment won't be as tough as ones Kampe and his team already have seen this season. They made earlier trips to Illinois and Michigan State, part of a demanding non-conference schedule created by their coach.

# NASCAR ponders races outside the United States

**ROBBIE WEISS, NASCAR's** multilingual internationalist, is suddenly one of the most sought-after stockcar racing executives on the tour. The latest men seeking his wisdom are from Montreal and Toronto.

Weiss, who helped lay out the Mexico City game plan and is now laying out Canadian options, likes the "rule of thirds." When NASCAR makes a change, he said, he expects a third of the stock-car men to enthusiastically embrace it, a third to just go with the flow, and a third to vigorously fight it such as the people who still say that NASCAR was wrong to drop Rockingham for Los Angeles.

The votes are coming in on Mexico and Canada, and though NASCAR president Brian France may still have a hard sell persuading some Cup drivers to make the trip to Mexico City next year, many of them seem resigned to whatever France plans to deal them.

Steve Hmiel sat in the stands for the Telcel Motorola 200, spotting for his son, Shane, who ran fourth, and watching Martin Truex Jr. win for Dale Earnhardt Inc., where Hmiel works as technical director.

"The reception by the people was incredible," Hmiel said. "They stomped their feet and screamed and hollered. There were a bunch of us spotting, and some of the fans asked who we were spotting for, and then they'd cheer for them. They really seemed to enjoy it.

"But what I most noticed was the seamless logistics. It was a very easy trip. Somebody did a heck of a job laying the groundwork. It was absolutely seamless. It was outstanding. The buses started running at 5 a.m., and you could wait as late as 7:30 or 8 and there'd be a bus or van to take you right to the

"I don't really have a feel for that yet," Hmiel said. "Sitting in the stands, the folks really enjoyed their Mexican drivers, and I don't know how many of those you'd have if you took the Cup group. For sure, Busch cars will race again. I'm not a car owner or a truck driver, so I didn't see that part of it. But from a crew guy's standpoint it was a really enjoyable event, and I'm glad I went."

Might Dale Earnhardt Jr. show up next year? "Dale Jr. enjoys his time off; but he enjoys road racing, and he's a good road racer," Hmiel said. "And as word gets around that it was a pretty neat experience, more people will become interested.

"But I am disappointed with people who didn't even go, telling you how bad it was. I was there, and it was fine.'

Part of the reluctance by some to embrace the Mexico City adventure is because the track is a road course, which is not a stock-car racer's favorite. But most racing throughout the world is on road courses, and there is certainly no incentive to build a large oval without the NASCAR eye and fan potential.

Jeff Gordon said that to make the Mexican and Canadian ventures work just right, someone must build oval tracks. The threequarter-mile track at Cancun, part of a Formula One effort in that world-famous Caribbean vacation spot, is a hot topic.

But Mark Martin, for one, may be a hard sell: "Watched it on TV Sunday. Hope that's what I do again next year. Don't want to go. I'll only go kicking and screaming. Because of the hassles. Leaving the country is leaving my comfort zone. I'm just a hillbilly from Arkansas. I don't want to go to Mexico. I hated going to Japan, with a passion.

"If I go to Mexico — and I have been to Mexico - I want to go on vacation. I'm happy to go dow there on vacation; but not to work."

## As races spread across the country, logistics of NASCAR's travel become more difficult

LapbyLap eff Harkey will have only 48 hours to recover from an odyssey that spanned two countries, three weeks and 9,000 miles.

The hauler driver for Justin Labonte's No. 44 Coast Guard team returned home Monday to Charlotte, N.C., for the first time since Feb. 21. His truck was to hit the road again by Thursday, heading to Atlanta Motor Speedway with a rear-view mirror full of indelible memories of Mexico. Multiple convoys of 18-wheelers were escorted from the Texas border by the flashing blue lights of the federales (Mexican federal police). "I've never seen anything like it." Neither had NASCAR - but the Busch Series' one-month, crosscontinent swing from Daytona Beach, Fla., to Fontana, Calif., to Mexico City to Las Vegas could become a familiar routine in coming seasons. future destinations for the Nextel Cup Series. As NASCAR stretches its schedule geographically, teams will feel the impact logistically as many did with this year's addi-



Coast speedways, returning to the East Coast wasn't an option even though it was necessary. Cars used for ovals and road courses aren't compatible.

Way stations were created in Laredo and San Antonio to allow for swapping out cars and secondary hauler drivers. "If not for UPS, I'd still be trying to get in the country," Harkey said. "I couldn't have done this by myself."

Many Busch teams still struggled with transportation hassles, renting extra trailers to ferry cars from North Carolina to Texas. Kevin Harvick said the trip was tough on his Busch crew, but he prefers preparing cars in Kernersville, N.C., to a satellite shop



# Survey: Landowners want control of who is on their property

**As I MENTIONED LAST WEEK,** there were several very interesting topics covered at the Southeast Deer Study Group meeting in Shepherdstown a couple of weeks ago.

Actually, some of the most interesting material was in the appendix of the book of abstracts all participants received.

One of the topics covered was the implications of posting on deer management. This was done by some folks at Penn State University, long known for its research on deer. Access to private land is critical for effectively managing the deer herd.

About 1,900 landowners were mailed a survey and 56 percent returned it. The study covered 77,400 acres of posted land and 28,600 acres of nonposted land.

The results: 70 percent of landowners who responded post their property. More than 80 percent of the nonposting landowners who responded indicated that hunting occurred on their land.

About 25 percent of the posting landowners said they allowed hunting by others who were not family or friends if the hunters came and asked for permission; 70 percent of the nonposting landowners allowed hunting if asked.

Landowners want control of who is on their land.

An interesting point that was discovered is that the landowners' socio-demographic background has a large impact on how they allow their land to be used. Landowners born in the suburbs are nine times more likely to post their land than those born in a rural area. Offers of financial rewards, technical services, and more law enforcement were not incentives to open their land to hunting.

The use of dogs to hunt deer has long been a tradition and legal in many southern states. However, Georgia began to experience problems similar to those we now have in West Virginia with the bear dogs since the Legislature passed a bill several years ago that allows the bear houndsmen to run their dogs 365 days a year and 24 hours a day. Conflicts between landowners, still hunters and dog hunters began to intensify over the blocking of public roads, trespassing to recover dogs, and trespassing by the deer dogs. Changes in the law and regulations resulted in dogdeer hunting now requiring a permit that is specific to a tract of land that must be greater than 1,000 contiguous acres. The permits require that the dogs remain on the permitted land. Permits can be revoked based upon violations of the law and permit



#### restrictions.

So far, only two clubs out of 358 have had their permits revoked.

Further changes in the law and regulations are likely since the majority of public opinion is in opposition to hunting of deer with dogs. However, this combination of laws and regulations as they now exist do allow for the revocation of permits for aggressive, noncompliant clubs.

Some other interesting data from the 2003-'04 hunting season: Of the 16 core states that make up the southeast (Pennsylvania is not included), West Virginia ranks 13th in total deer habitat, 14th in deer population, and ninth in total harvest. However, when it comes to number of hunters, we rank third, with 328,000, behind Texas and Missouri, with 530,000 and 425,000 respectively.

Alabama, with an estimated deer population of 1.75 million, harvested 11.1 deer per square mile. West Virginia harvested 9.1 deer per square mile with an estimated population of 848,000.

Texas, on the other hand, has more than 4 million deer and only harvested 3.4 deer per square mile.

However, keep in mind that Texas has almost 130,000 square miles of habitat compared to West Virginia's 23,000.

Alabama has more than 100,000 fewer hunters than we have in West Virginia and takes a little over 2.5 times the number of deer.

How does this happen? They have no season limit on the number of deer that can be taken. Hunters can take two antlerless deer per day and one buck per day. Alabama's firearms season is 71 days long compared to West Virginia's 22 and its archery season lasts for 110 days versus West Virginia's 64. Also, baiting is illegal in Alabama, as it is in Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, Virginia, and parts of South Carolina. Another interesting point is that West Virginia is the only state out the 16 that does not allow crossbow hunting. Eight of the other 15 states allow it for use by the handicapped and a couple allow it for those hunters over the age of 60 or 65. The other seven states allow it.

### Trophy bass lurk in state's small impoundments

**About This Time Each Year,** Mountain State anglers get a bit antsy. They are just getting over "cabin fever" and can't wait to dive head first into some serious trout fishing.

Even though the Mountain State doesn't feature an official season, most anglers consider March through May to be the year's best trout fishing. Nothing fires up an angler more than to see a "brood" trout chasing his lure across the water. Catch that giant trout, and, well, "Katy bar the door" because celebrations may run rampant.

But where is the best place to find these trophy trout?

Small impoundments are generally limited to 50 acres. Most offer excellent shore fishing, and some even have the capacity to hold small boats. Small lakes provide a stable reprieve from typical springtime high water fluctuations, and best of all, each impoundment seems to be loaded with big trout.

Buffalo Fork is a high elevation lake in Pocahontas County that offers excellent trout fishing. At just over 22 acres, it has the ability to maintain cool water temperatures even during the summer. As a result, trophy trout thrive in this scenic mountain lake. Some even survive all year.

The West Virginia DNR stocks trout in Buffalo Fork once in February, biweekly from March through May, and again in the October. Buffalo Fork is known for quantities of trophy-sized trout, and each year Buffalo Fork ranks among the state's elite in the number of trophy trout citations.

James P. Bailey, in Mercer County, is another place to be if you're an angler looking for West Virginia's trophy trout. The best fishing on James P. Bailey occurs during the spring because water temperatures get high in the summer, making holdover potential low for the lake's trophy trout. This 28-acre impoundment is stocked only twice each spring, but plenty of big trout are included in these stockings.

CHARLESTON — Jared Stiltner likes to hunt. The 11-year-old bagged a doe during this past fall's youth antlerless deer hunt.

But a discovery in the woods near his rural Wyoming County home in spring 2004 has him asking West Virginia lawmakers to draw a line on killing albino deer.

"It just seems wrong to kill something so rare," Stiltner told lawmakers in a letter distributed recently in the House of Delegates.

Game experts estimate that between one in 10,000 and one in 100,000 deer are albino.

Stiltner's cause prompted introduction of House Bill 2959, which has some pretty potent co-sponsors. They include his cousin, House Majority Leader Rick Staton, as well as House Speaker Bob Kiss, D-Raleigh, and House Judiciary Chairman Jon Amores, D-Kanawha.

"I think it's a really good bill," said Staton, D-Wyoming. "The letter that he wrote was very heartfelt. He was very affected by seeing this."

In his letter, Stiltner explained that the lack of melanin, which gives skin its color, leaves albino deer with weaker eyes and ears. Without natural camouflage, the animals are more vulnerable to hunters and other predators, Stiltner learned.

"I just decided, why not try to

make a law?" said Stiltner, who was on hand for the bill's introduction as a House page.

West Virginia hunting laws do not address albino deer, though 13 other states have passed laws protecting them. The bill would make it a crime to hunt, trap, shoot, possess or attempt to kill an albino deer.

The state Division of Natural Resources has not taken a stand on the issue, but Curtis Taylor, chief of the agency's wildlife resources section, said, "There's no biological reason to prohibit the killing of an albino deer, and no reason within deer management."

Taylor added that albino deer could be confused with piebald, or partially white deer.

MONONGAHELA RIVER: River conditions are normal and the water temperature is 40 degrees. Cold river temperatures will cause fish, particularly hybrid striped bass, to be attracted to the warm water discharges at the Rivesville and Morgantown power plants. A pier at the Morgantown plant makes fishing safe and convenient. Walleyes and saugers are starting their spawning movements and will move in and out of the tailwater areas and tributary creek mouths, especially Buffalo, Paw Paw, and Prickett creeks. Start fishing about an hour before sunset because saugers and walleyes will begin feeding at dusk. Jigs with minnows are particularly good baits but 3-inch plastic grubs and deep-running crank baits are also productive. The shoreline from the Morgantown lock to the mouth of Deckers Creek is always a good place to fish from the shore. During high water, fish will be concentrated along the Westover shoreline just below lock wall.

**TYGART LAKE:** The lake is 35 to 40 feet below the summer level. Walleye will be starting to spawn and continue for 3 to 4 weeks. Spawning occurs after midnight in shallow water along the shoreline. Casting large rapalas-type shallow-running minnows along the shoreline after dark can be successful at this time of year.

The tailwater temperature is 38 degrees. Trout were stocked twice during October and are still being caught. Walleyes move through the dam into the

tailwater at high flows (above 5,000 cfs). Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cubic feet per second). Call the Corps of Engineers telephone hotline at 304-265-5953 for daily lake and tailwater conditions.

**CHEAT LAKE:** Anglers should now be concentrating on yellow perch and also looking for walleyes. Boats can be launched at any water level at the new winter ramp at the Cheat Lake Park . Shoreline fishing will be best at the Park along the riprap on the lake side. Try the tailwater fishing pier for walleyes and saugers. Minnows are

the best bait. Start fishing at dark when saugers and walleyes begin feeding. The pier is located entirely in West Virginia about 25 minutes from Morgantown , but you have to drive from, and park in, Pennsylvania to get there. Take U.S. Rt. 119 from Morgantown to Point Marion , PA. Turn right after crossing the Cheat River and proceed 4 miles to Cheat Dam. The pier is lighted for night fishing and is handicapped accessible .

**BEECH FORK:** Lake is approximately one half foot above winter pool. The lake and tailwater are muddy. For more information call the Corps of Engineers recorded message at 525-5092. Fishing in the lake should be picking up for walleye, saugeye and hybrid striped bass. Try fishing with white grub-tipped jigs along the shoreline in the morning or around dusk. Trout were stocked in

the tailwaters on March 14. BLUESTONE: Lake is at winter pool. Lake and tailwater are cloudy. For more information call the Corps of Engineers recorded message at 466-0156. With the warmer weather predicted, anglers may be able to get back on the lake and enjoy some fishing. Remember that during the winter season, fish are still active but typically have a slower metabolism, so anglers should fish slowly and methodically. During this cold weather, bass may be caught in deeper water off rocky points while using live bait such as minnows or nightcrawlers. Anglers should look for points that drop off into the main channel and that have some cover such as stumps or logs

Back in 2003, 55 trophy citation trout were caught from James P. Bailey Lake, and during subsequent years, the lake has nearly doubled the number of trophy trout citations from other small impoundments in the state.

James P. Bailey makes a great destination for trout anglers, particularly those willing to travel to the southeastern part of the state.

Spruce Knob, in the center of the Monongahela National Forest, features some of our state's best trout fishing. At just 23 acres, the lake maintains cool water temperatures that provide excellent holdover potential for trophy trout.

The DNR stocks rainbow, golden rainbow and brown trout in the lake once in January, twice in February, weekly from March to May, and then again in October.

Spruce Knob Lake is famous for big trout, and stockings in January and February typically include a lavish amount of trout weighing more than 4 pounds.

During some years, ice may be encountered on the lake in March, but that shouldn't be a problem this year.

If you are looking for lunker trout this season, West Virginia's small impoundments may be your best shot.


The top three EAGL teams — N.C. State, UNC and WVU - are ranked 28th, 29th, and 30th in the NCAA, respectively.

It happens every year — 16 of the past 17 now. A 15-seed puts on the glass slipper and beats a 2-seed. Cleveland saw the first of what could be a few 12-seed triumphs this year as the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee beat Alabama and busted brackets around the nation.

The story, though, belongs to coach Bruce Pearl.

He was a talented multi-sport athlete in high school until he suffered a serious knee injury. Still, Pearl, a Boston native, went to Boston College and tried to walk on for coach Tom Davis.

Davis denied Pearl, but wanted the youngster to stay on help the Eagles fill the Roberts Center and make it a competitive, intimidating environment in the Big East.

Pearl then moved up to bigger and better jobs for Davis and B.C., and he even hosted Patrick Ewing on his recruiting trip to Chestnut Hill. When Davis left for Stanford in 1983 during Pearl's senior year, he invited Pearl to come along.

He started as an assistant and was the associate head coach at the age of 23.

Pearl later followed Davis to Iowa before taking his fist head coaching job at Southern Indiana. With back-to-back automatic bids to the NCAA Tournament and now a firstround victory, he's turned UW-M into contender with a style that attracts good players.



**Tight-lipped McGwire** provides few answers

#### Palmeiro, Sosa deny steroid use

WASHINGTON — On Capitol Hill instead of a baseball field, wearing suits instead of uniforms, they walked into the room, stars all, forced by subpoena to testify before Congress whether they cheated by using steroids.

Heads turned, strobes flashed and necks craned to get a glimpse of the humbled heroes.

Five current and former players, some future Hall of Famers, bemoaned steroids as a problem for their sport but denied they are widespread.

Mark McGwire hemmed and hawed, his voice choked with emotion, his eyes nearly filled with tears. Time after time, he refused to answer the question everyone wanted to know: Did he take illegal steroids in the historic home run summer of 1998 or any other time?

No matter how hard the congressmen tried, McGwire wouldn't say.

"If a player answers 'No,' he simply will not be believed," McGwire said in his opening statement. "If he answers 'Yes,' he risks public scorn and endless government investigations.

On a day of extraordinary theater at the House Government Reform Committee, McGwire sat at a wooden table, his accuser, Jose Canseco, at the other end. Also there, sitting biceps-to-biceps, were Sammy Sosa, Rafael Palmeiro and Curt Schilling.

Canseco raised his hand, took the oath and repeated the admissions and accusations in his best-selling tell-all book, "Juiced": He used steroids himself, and they were rampant in the game. Steroids were rampant in baseball. Sosa, Palmeiro and Schilling said they didn't use them.

McGwire, wearing a green tie on St. Patrick's Day, repeatedly avoided direct responses, saying his lawyers advised him not to answer certain questions. Often, he said he couldn't answer or had no opinion because "I'm retired."

McGwire, peering over reading glasses, fidgeted as he looked up at the congressmen, no longer the heroic figure who was the greatest singleseason home run hitter ever.

Asked by Rep. Elijah Cummings, D-Md., whether he was asserting his Fifth Amendment right not to incriminate himself, McGwire said: "I'm not here to talk about the past. I'm here to be positive about this subject." Asked whether use of steroids was cheating, McGwire said: "That's

not for me to determine." Still, he said he knew steroids could be dangerous and would do whatever he could to discourage young athletes from using them.

"What I will not do, however, is participate in naming names and implicating my friends and teammates," said McGwire, who ranks sixth in major league history with 583 homers.

"What anybody can do to improve it so that there's no more meetings like this. I'm all for it.'

It was a tense scene. Canseco sat stone-faced at the table and said he could not fully answer questions because of concerns that his testimony could be used against him.

During a break after the players' opening statements, four of the stars gathered in one nearby room, Canseco in another.

When the Boston Red Sox's Schilling, the only pitcher among the players, testified, he said flatly of Canseco: "He's a liar."

The hearing came after committee members accused baseball of ignoring its steroids problem for years and then, only under pressure, embracing a weak testing program.

At the hearing's start, almost all of the congressmen gushed about the sport, recalling how they collected baseball cards and autographs and naming several retired heroes before leveling their harsh criticisms.

# Leg angina requires investigation

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** What is "leg angina?" I get severe cramps in my calves when I walk. I am 78 and suspect arthritis but cannot see my rheumatologist until June.

DEAR READER: I recommend that you see your primary care physician first because, from your brief report, I doubt that arthritis is your problem.

When the heart is called upon to beat more efficiently during exercise, it may not be up to the task because of coronary artery blockages, from arteriosclerosis, that prevent an adequate supply of oxygen to reach the heart muscle. The result is chest pain that disappears during rest. This is called angina pectoris, and is a serious warning of disastrous consequences if not treated.

The same phenomenon is also present when, during exercise, the leg muscles cramp. Sometimes the cramps disappear if the exercise continues — so-called "walkthrough claudication." In any case, the pattern of leg muscle pain during exercise may reflect significant arteriosclerotic blockages in the arteries leading to the extremities.

In my opinion, your PCP should order a test called "arteriography," which will show the position of the blockages and how advanced they are. If there is a significant prob-

lem, you may be a candidate for aggressive therapy — either a bal-loon angioplasty or bypass surgery.

If I am wrong and the arterial study is normal, you can always keep your appointment with your arthritis specialist.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed with oral cancer and have undergone surgery eight times on my tongue. What information can you share on my diagnosis of squamous cell carcinoma?

**DEAR READER: Squamous** cell carcinoma is a type of malignancy arising from the cells of the skin and the lining of body cavities. As with any cancer, it will spread uncontrollably unless treated. Symptoms depend on the site of the tumor, as well as the extent of the metastases (spread) at the time of diagnosis.

For example, squamous cell carcinoma of the oral cavity is usually diagnosed early while a similar tumor in the lung may not be recognized until it has grown large enough to cause cough, blood-tinged sputum, weight loss and a shadow on chest X-ray. The treatment for a malignancy depends largely on its size and location. Surgery, radiation, chemotherapy or a combination of these methods is usually employed, with varying results.

# Suspect arrested in Dallas shooting

#### Warrant issued for second man

UNIVERSITY PARK, Texas -The man who police say was at the wheel of a Jaguar when a passenger stood up through the sunroof and opened fire with an assault rifle, killing three people, was arrested on suspicion of murder. Authorities continued to search for the gunman.

Jimmy Aristides Velasquez, 20, was taken into custody Wednesday. A warrant was issued for the alleged gunman, Israel Barretero, 21, police said.

The shooting took place early Tuesday on a road near Southern Methodist University.

Police believe the attack stemmed from a bar fight earlier in the evening between one of the shooting victims and the owner of the Jaguar, who was wounded in the fight.

Police believe friends took the Jaguar owner to the hospital, then returned to the bar and waited for the group involved in the fight to leave, police said. Then the friends

# **Bush picks Portman for** trade representative post

Ohio congressman will negotiate U.S. trade deals

WASHINGTON — President Bush chose congressman Rob Portman on Thursday to be U.S. trade representative — America's top salesman for free-trade agreements around the world — saying the Ohio Republican has shown a deep dedication to free and fair trade.

"As an Ohioan, Rob knows firsthand that millions of American jobs depend on exports, including one in every five factory jobs,' Bush said.

America is home to about 5 percent of the world's population, which means 95 percent of the nation's potential customers are abroad, Bush said at a White House ceremony in the Roosevelt Room. "To keep our economy growing and creating jobs we need to continue opening foreign markets to American products," he said. "Rob knows that America's farmers and workers can compete with anybody, anytime anywhere in the world so long as the rules are



fair.'

but told him, "Dad, it sounds like a really neat job.'

"And it is," Portman said. "Open markets and better trade relations are key components to a more peaceful and more stable and more prosperous world," he said. "Here at home, trade policy opens markets to create jobs, a higher standard of living and greater economic growth."

# Atlanta courthouse shooting victims remembered **Thousands pack funerals**

COLLEGE PARK, Ga. — Tears mixed with laughter at the funeral for courthouse shooting victim Judge Rowland Barnes, who was remembered by 3,000 mourners Thursday as a fair, fun-loving jurist who wasn't above poking fun at himself.

A barbershop quartet broke the tension by belting out a tongue-incheek song about law and justice called "Old and Wise" to the tune of "Edelweiss." It was one Barnes once performed at an annual bar association fund-raiser while wearing a bathrobe, boxers and his favorite T-shirt that read "Real men don't need Viagra."

"Everybody thought they were Rowland's best friend," H. Clay Collins said in one eulogy. "There was nothing phony about Rowland, he was as real as they come. For a man who was such a great judge, he was the least judgmental person."

Barnes, a 64-year-old Fulton County Superior Court judge, was shot to death Friday in his Atlanta courtroom, along with his court reporter, allegedly by rape defendant Brian Nichols. The suspect also is accused of killing a deputy outside the courthouse and later a federal agent, whose funeral was also Thursday.

The courthouse where the shootings happened closed early Thursday so employees could attend Barnes' funeral held in a convention center in this Atlanta suburb.

Hundreds of people — includ-ing judges wearing their black robes cried and smiled as speakers talked about a respected colleague who could also be an impish prankster.

John Stuckey Jr., who was a friend of Barnes for the last 45 years, pointed to the judge's photo projected on a big screen, saying that smile summed up the man more than anything else.

"Rowland, in the end, measured up to the most exacting of all standards a loval constant friend and decent loving human being," he said.

The bald, gray-bearded judge also was praised for his ethics and fairness to all who appeared in his courtroom. Fulton County Superior Court Chief Judge Doris Downs said Barnes was the judge all judges aspired to be.

"He was one who ultimately gave his life on the front lines of justice," she said.

Earlier Thursday, in Salisbury, N.C., others said goodbye to federal Immigration and Customs Agent David Wilhelm, who was found shot to death in his unfinished Atlanta

home Saturday. Authorities believe he was killed by Nichols, who had broken out of the Atlanta courthouse the day before.

About 1,000 mourners, including fellow federal agents wearing black armbands, packed a chapel on the campus of Catawba College to remember the 40-year-old as a relentless investigator, loving husband and generous friend.

Wilhelm's widow, Candee, spoke of her husband's integrity and generosity.

"Often he would make eye contact with the homeless, broken, or needy individual on the corner, roll down the window and offer an encouraging word and a few dollars from his pocket," she said, her voice breaking.

Patrick Wilhelm, also a federal agent in Atlanta, said his brother had a good sense of humor. "In the Wilhelm family, just like in his law enforcement family, David liked to get into some picking and namecalling, but there was always a strong bond of love," he said.

Others remembered Wilhelm's patriotism. "The United States lost a hero last Friday night," said friend Todd Elmore.

A procession of more than 200 vehicles had accompanied the transporting of Wilhelm's body from Georgia to Salisbury on Monday.

# Florida House passes bill to keep Schiavo alive

Law would stop removal of feeding tube from brain-damaged woman

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — The state House passed a bill Thursday that could keep Terri Schiavo alive, less than 24 hours before the severely brain-damaged woman's feeding tube is scheduled to be removed. The Senate began debating a more limited version of the bill as lawmakers rushed to beat the scheduled removal of Schiavo's feeding tube. The legislative action was part of a last-minute flurry of attempts to save Schiavo's life. Congress was also considering legislation to move

the case to the federal courts, Schiavo's parents appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, and Florida Circuit Court Judge George Greer scheduled a hearing Thursday to consider a request from the state to halt the removal of the tube.

The House bill would block the withholding of food and water from patients in a persistent vegetative state who didn't leave specific instructions refusing the artificial measure. It passed 78-37. "This provides a safety net where the government stands up for the vulnerable who don't otherwise have a voice," said Republican Rep. Kevin Ambler. Gov. Jeb Bush has strongly urged the Legislature to pass a bill that would save Schiavo, as it did in 2003.



If confirmed by the Senate, the 49-year-old Republican congressman from the Cincinnati area would replace Robert Zoellick. who has become Condoleezza Rice's top deputy at the State Department. As one of Bush's chief links to Congress on trade, tax and other issues, Portman has been a strong advocate of free trade even though he comes from a state that has been hit hard by job losses.

# Sex offender questioned about missing girl's disappearance

9-year-old vanished from bedroom Feb. 23

HOMOSASSA, Fla. — A registered sex offender being sought for questioning in the disappearance of a 9-year-old girl was taken into custody in Georgia on Thursday.

John Evander Couey was picked near a Salvation Army shelter in Augusta, Ga., and held for failing to notify Florida officials that he was leaving the state, a requirement for sex offenders.

Detectives in Citrus County, Fla., focused on the 46-year-old Couey as a "person of interest" in the disappearance of Jessica Lunsford because he lived near the girl's home and had an arrest on his record that involved grabbing a young girl in her bedroom. But officials emphasized there is nothing that ties him directly to the Lunsford case.

Citrus County Sheriff Jeff Dawsy said his detectives and FBI agents would question Couey on Thursday

about the missing girl and either name him as a suspect or "take him out of mix" entirely.

The girl's father, Mark Lunsford, said Thursday that he had never seen Couey before and didn't know he was staying nearby.
