## Vantrease will stand before parole board

Kicked Ryan Diviney in head during fight

One man convicted of attacking Ryan Diviney is set to have his third chance at parole Wednesday.

Austin Vantrease, 23, is scheduled for a parole hearing at St. Mary's Correctional Center, where he is incarcerated. St. Mary's is in Pleasants County.

Vantrease was sentenced to two to 10 years in prison for malicious assault against Diviney.

In November 2009, an argument about the World Series escalated into a fight outside the Willey Street Dairy Mart. Prosecutors said Jonathan May punched Diviney, causing him to fall and strike his head. Vantrease then kicked the former WVU student in the head. May was convicted of battery and has been released from jail.

Diviney was left comatose as a result of the altercation.

In July 2013, Vantrease was denied parole for a second time.

The parole board, which was made up of three women, determined that they didn't believe Vantrease was ready to go back into society. He told the board he didn't know why he kicked Diviney when he was already down.

## 5 factors to a strong U.S. economy

WASHINGTON — How does the U.S. economy do it?

Europe is floundering. China faces slower growth. Japan is struggling to sustain tentative gains. Yet the U.S. job market is humming, and the pace of economic growth is rising.

Here are five reasons the United States is outpacing other major economies:

**An aggressive central bank**  
 In December 2008, the Fed slashed short-term interest rates to near zero and has kept them there. Ultra-low loan rates have made it easier for individuals and businesses to borrow and spend.

By contrast, the European Central Bank has been slower to respond to signs of economic distress among the 18 nations that share the euro currency.

**Stronger banks**  
 The United States moved faster than Europe to restore its banks' health after the financial crisis of 2008-'09. The U.S. government bailed out the financial system and subjected big banks to stress tests in 2009 to reveal their financial strength. By showing the banks to be surprisingly healthy, the stress tests helped restore confidence in the U.S. financial system.

**More flexible economy**  
 Economists say Japan and Europe need to undertake reforms to make their economies more flexible — more, in other

words, like America's.

Europe needs to lift wage restrictions that prevent employers from cutting pay (rather than eliminating jobs) when times are bad.

**Less budget-cutting**  
 Weighed down by debt, many European countries took an ax to swelling budget deficits. They slashed pension benefits, raised taxes and cut civil servants' wages. The cuts devastated several European economies. The United States has done some budget cutting and raised taxes.

**A roaring stock market**  
 The Fed's easy-money policies ignited a world-beating U.S. stock market rally. During the past five years, U.S. stocks have easily outpaced shares in Europe, Japan and Hong Kong.

## Family holds onto pit-spitting title

EAU CLAIRE, Mich. — When it comes to pit-spitting in southwestern Michigan, it's tough to beat the Krause family.

Brian Krause won the 41st International Cherry Pit Spitting Championship on Saturday with a distance of 80 feet, 8 inches.

His father, Rick, placed second with 77 feet, 7 1/2 inches.

Brian's win made it 26 of 41 for the Krause family since Tree-Mendus Fruit Farm owner Herb Teichman launched the tournament in 1974 as a lark — but also to mark the region's tart cherry harvest.

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# Most union members have ties to government

WASHINGTON — Unions representing government workers are expanding while organized labor has been shedding private sector members over the past half-century. A majority of union members today have ties to a government entity, at the federal, state or local levels. Roughly 1-in-3 public sector workers is a union member, compared with about 1-

in-15 for the private sector workforce, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Overall, 11.3 percent of wage and salary workers in the United States are unionized, down from a peak of 35 percent during the mid-1950s in the strong post-World War II recovery.

The typical union worker is more likely to be an educator, office worker or food or service industry employee rather than a construction worker, au-

toworker, electrician or mechanic. Far more women than men are among the union-label ranks.

In a blow to public sector unions, the Supreme Court ruled this week that thousands of health care workers in Illinois who are paid by the state cannot be required to pay fees that help cover a union's cost of collective bargaining.

The justices said the practice violates the First Amendment rights of non-

members who disagree with stances taken by unions.

The ruling was narrowly drawn, but it could reverberate through the universe of unions that represent government workers. The case involved home-care workers for disabled people who are paid with Medicaid funds administered by the state.

In June, a California judge declared unconstitutional the state's teacher tenure, dismissal and layoff

laws. The judge ordered a stay of the decision, pending an appeal by the state and teachers union.

"The basic structure of the labor union movement has changed, reflecting changes in the economy," said Ross Baker, a political science professor at Rutgers University. "Manufacturing is a diminishing segment of the economy. Also, a lot of the manufacturing that's being done today is being done nonunion."

Union members continue to be a powerful political force in politics, and Baker said he didn't see the role of unions diminishing. "I just think the colors of the collars are changing," Baker said.

In 2013, 14.5 million workers belonged to a union, about the same as the year before. In 1983, the first year comparable figures are available, there were 17.7 million union workers.

## Senate majority could rest on the sage grouse

DENVER — An obscure, chicken-sized bird, best known for its mating dance, could help determine whether Democrats or Republicans control the U.S. Senate in November.

The federal government will consider listing the greater sage grouse as an endangered species in 2015. Doing so could limit development, energy exploration, hunting and ranching on the 165 million acres of the bird's habitat across 11 Western states.

Apart from the potential economic disruption, which some officials in Western states discuss in tones usually reserved for natural disasters, the specter of the bird's listing is reviving the debate about local vs. federal control and whether to develop or conserve the region's vast expanses of land.

Two Republican congressmen running for the U.S. Senate in Montana and Colorado, Steve Daines and Cory Gardner, are co-sponsoring legislation that would prevent the federal government from listing the bird for a decade as long as states try to protect it.

"Montanans want locally driven solutions," Daines said in an interview. "They don't want bureaucrats thousands of miles away in Washington, D.C., dictating what should happen."

Environmentalists and the two Democratic senators being challenged, John Walsh in

Montana and Mark Udall in Colorado, oppose the idea. They say they don't want a listing, either, but that the threat of one is needed to push states to protect the bird.

"A bill like what some in the House are proposing that would delay listing the bird would actually undermine locally driven efforts," Udall spokesman Mike Saccone said.

The greater sage grouse once roamed widely across the sagebrush plateaus of the West's interior.

Livestock grazing eroded the bristly plant that the bird depends upon, development chopped up its habitat and energy exploration erected towers that chased it away from its home range.

Rachel Carson warned in 1962 of the bird's possible demise in "Silent Spring," her environmental book.

Three environmental groups sued to force the federal government to protect the bird after the government declined to list it as endangered in 2005. In a 2010 settlement, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service agreed to decide on listing by September 2015.

## California wildfire destroys eight homes; others rage

COLLINSVILLE, Calif. — A fire tore through a Northern California community, destroying eight homes and damaging three more over the holiday weekend that has firefighters throughout California hard at work.

Nobody was injured in the Friday afternoon blaze in the small community of Collinsville along the Sacramento River, about 60 miles east of San Francisco, Chief Joe Rosewall of the Montezuma Fire District in Solano County said Saturday.

The fire is out, but 25 residents are without homes and it caused an estimated \$2.5 million in damage, Rosewall said.

State fire officials say they were battling several fires throughout California and expect dry conditions to keep them busy over the July 4 weekend. The blazes have led to injuries of some firefighters, destruction of homes, evacuations and cancellation of some July 4 events.

Also in Northern California, the Monticello Fire in Yolo County started Friday afternoon and has consumed nearly 8 square miles on the southeast shore of Lake Barryessa, about an hour west of Sacramento. At least 50 homes had been evacuated, and the fire is 15 percent contained, state fire spokesman Daniel Berlant said.

The Butts Fire in Napa

and Lake counties, northwest of Lake Barryessa, started Tuesday and has burned nearly 7 square miles. The flames led to minor injuries of three firefighters and destroyed two homes, state fire officials said. It was 70 percent contained.

In Southern California, a fire near the mountain town of Julian that had destroyed two homes was 90 percent contained Saturday after burning about 220 acres.

Four firefighters were injured, state fire Capt. Kendal Bortisser said. The extent of their injuries wasn't immediately clear, and the cause of the fire in central San Diego County was under investigation.

## Newtown shooting victim's animal shelter dream turning real

HARTFORD, Conn. — Before she was killed in the Newtown school massacre, 6-year-old Catherine Violet Hubbard raised money from returnable bottles and cans to buy bones for dogs at the pound and designed business cards for an imaginary animal shelter, listing herself as "caretaker."

Her pretend animal shelter is now on track to become a reality as the state prepares to transfer 34 acres of a former psychiatric facility to a foundation raising money to build

an animal sanctuary to honor the life of the little girl who was one of 20 first-graders killed in the 2012 Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting.

"It was just in her soul," said Jenny Hubbard, describing her late daughter's love of animals. "She didn't care if it was fuzzy or slimy."

Plans for the sanctuary in her name include a shelter and adoption center for cats and dogs, a refuge for farm and work animals, and a rescue and release program for injured, native wildlife. Plans also include

a veterinarian clinic and a welcome center where educational programs will be held. The goal is to open the main building in Newtown in 2016.

Gov. Dannel P. Malloy recently signed legislation instructing the Department of Agriculture to convey the state land to the private Catherine Violet Hubbard Foundation set up by her parents. Several steps remain before Attorney General George Jepsen can sign off on the final transfer.

For Jenny Hubbard and her husband, Matt, who

each have business backgrounds and wrote the sanctuary's business plan, the project has been both a healing and humbling experience. They've been amazed by the outpouring of support. To date, \$800,000 has been donated, even though formal fundraising efforts have not yet begun.

A mistaken Google search ultimately led to the idea for the sanctuary. Tasked with the unimaginable job of writing their 6-year-old's obituary, the Hubbards decided to ask people to donate money in

lieu of flowers to the local animal control center.

But as a friend looked up the address, they instead discovered The Animal Center, a small, nonprofit group of volunteers who provide foster homes to stray cats and dogs until permanent homes can be found. Harmony Verna, the group's vice president, remembers getting a call from the Hubbards, asking if the center would mind being listed in Catherine's obituary. Within two weeks, \$150,000 had been donated in the little girl's name.

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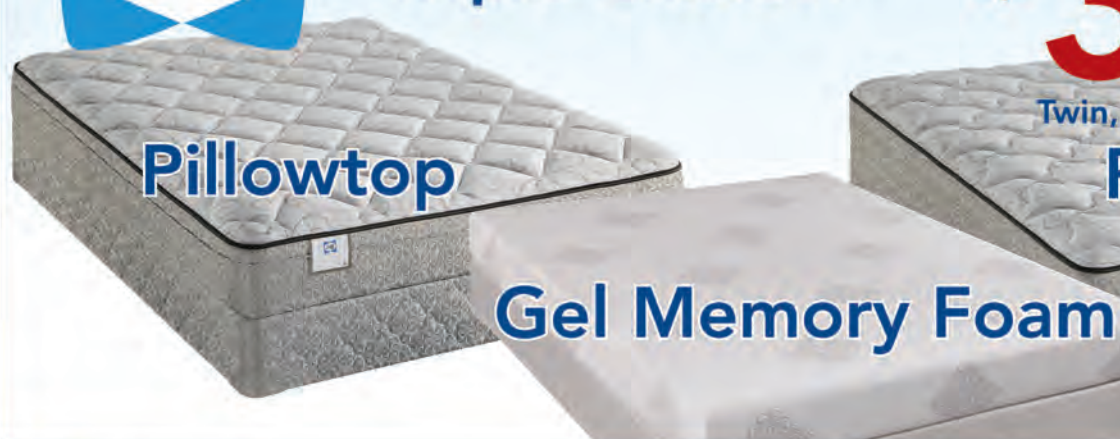
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# NATO: No new members for now

BRUSSELS — Faced with a newly aggressive Russia, NATO has been mulling how to react, but it is ruling out one option: Rapid expansion.

Four would-be members, including the former Soviet republic of Georgia, have been informed that admission to NATO isn't in the cards anytime soon. For some, that means dashed hopes. Macedonia's foreign minister told The Associated Press in a statement it was a "step backward."

The bottom line: The North Atlantic Treaty Organization, celebrating important anniversaries this year of a dozen nations joining its ranks, will welcome no new members when President Barack Obama and other leaders convene for a summit in Wales, in early September.

Analysts say that NATO members are worried about granting, or being perceived as granting, se-

curity guarantees that could quickly be tested by Russia. That's particularly true of Georgia, which has been waiting since 2008 for the U.S.-led military alliance to make good on its promise of admission.

Before taking over Crimea from Ukraine, Russia invaded and occupied two regions of Georgia nearly six years ago — and NATO is reluctant to

take any action that might provoke a riposte from Moscow.

"The conflict over Ukraine has made it clear to them at NATO they have to be careful, both about security commitments and credibility," said Liana Fix, an associate fellow at the German Council on Foreign Relations. "If you give Georgia their membership action plan but don't defend

them if something happens, what does it say about your credibility?"

NATO won't publicly hang up the "No Vacancy" sign.

Anders Fogh Rasmussen, the alliance's secretary general, proclaimed recently that "NATO's door remains open. And no third country has a veto over NATO enlargement."

But even before Crimea's annexation, some NATO countries were experiencing "enlargement exhaustion" and had become reluctant to increase the alliance's membership rolls, said Jorge Benitez, senior fellow for trans-Atlantic security at the Atlantic Council, a Washington, D.C.-based think tank.

Post-Crimea, "the issues are much bigger," Benitez said. "The question is, how much insecurity would you add to the alliance versus how much security would you bring to the alliance?"

## Video allegedly shows extremist leader in Iraq

BAGHDAD — A man purporting to be the leader of the Sunni extremist group that declared an Islamic state in territory it controls in Iraq and Syria made what would be his first public appearance. He delivered a sermon at a mosque in a city in Iraq, according to a video posted Saturday.

The 21-minute video that is said to show Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi, the head of the Islamic State group, was reportedly filmed on Friday at the Great Mosque in the northern city of Mosul. It was released on at least two websites known to be used by the organization. It bore the logo of its media arm, but it was not possible to independently verify whether the person shown was indeed al-Baghdadi.

There are only a few known photographs of al-Baghdadi, an Iraqi militant believed to be in his early 40s with a \$10 million U.S. bounty on his head. Since taking the reins of the group in 2010, he has transformed it from a local branch of al-Qaida into an independent transnational military force.

Al-Baghdadi's purported appearance in Mosul, a city of some 2 million that the militants seized last month, came five days after his group declared the establishment of an Islamic state, or caliphate, in the territories it seized in Iraq and Syria. The group proclaimed al-Baghdadi the leader of its state and demanded that all Muslims pledge allegiance to him.

In the video, the man said to be al-Baghdadi says that "the mujahedeen have been rewarded victory by God after years of jihad, and they were able to achieve their aim and hurried to announce the caliphate and choose the Imam," referring to the leader.

Speaking in classical Arabic with little emotion, he outlines a vision that emphasizes holy war, the implementation of a strict interpretation of Islamic law, and the philosophy that the establishment of an Islamic caliphate is a duty incumbent on all Muslims.

## Finnish couple wins 'wife carrying' race

HELSINKI — A Finnish couple has narrowly won the 19th World Wife Carrying Championships — a quirky competition in which men race to be the fastest while carrying a female teammate.

Ville Parviainen and Janette Oksman cleared the grueling 278-yard obstacle course in 63.75 seconds on Saturday, less than a second ahead of Britain's Rich Blake Smith and Anna Mar-

guerite Smith.

Thirty-six couples from a dozen countries, including Australia, Japan, and the United States, took part in the race, which was held in the central Finnish municipality of Sonkajarvi, north of the capital, Helsinki.

The rules stipulate that the woman must be over 17 years of age and weigh at least 108 pounds. Despite the event's name, couples don't have to be married, and organizers

say male contestants could "borrow a neighbor's wife" if they didn't have a female companion.

The men can carry their teammate in various ways, though a popular method is for the woman to hang upside-down with her legs around the male contestant's shoulders.

Finland has established itself as a prime venue for unusual events such as international air guitar, swamp soccer and mobile phone throwing competitions.

## Militant: Jordan not immune to violence

MAAN, Jordan — An al-Qaida linked Jordanian militant leader warned on Friday that the kingdom was "not immune" to the chaos befalling neighboring countries, although he acknowledged that a Sunni extremist group's recent declaration of a caliphate spanning Syria and Iraq was threatening to divide the jihadi movement.

Mohammed al-Shalabi, a senior leader of ultra-conservative Muslims known as Salafis in Jordan, told The Associated Press that the fighting between rival militant factions in Syria has already

undermined the battle against President Bashar Assad.

Al-Shalabi, who spent 11 years in Jordanian jails on charges including plotting to attack a U.S. military base in the kingdom, said Jordanian Salafis have stopped sending their supporters to join the rebel ranks in Syria, fearing they will end up fighting other Muslims. More than 1,600 Jordanian have fought in Syria and 250 of them have been killed, al-Shalabi said.

Al-Shalabi spoke in a rare interview with a Western media organization at his home on the outskirts of the southern

city of Maan, an impoverished area that has seen protests by supporters of the Islamic State group that has seized large swaths of territory in Iraq and Syria and announced it has established a long-sought Muslim caliphate. The announcement has been rejected and even derided by many of the rival Islamic rebel factions fighting in Syria.

Al-Shalabi urged Jordan — a U.S. ally that relies heavily on donations from the U.S. and oil-rich Gulf Arabs to keep its fragile economy afloat — to implement Islamic Shariah laws and more balanced economic and social policies.

## Labor creates new arm for fundraising

CHARLESTON — West Virginia organized labor has created a new independent fundraising arm ahead of the November general election. According to a filing with the Federal Election Commission, the West Virginia AFL-CIO created the new federal political action committee "Honest West Virginians" in late June. AFL-CIO treasurer Josh Sword said that the group felt it needed to fight the flow of outside money affecting federal elections in West Virginia. The AFL-CIO already has a state-level political arm, called the Committee on Political Education or AFL-CIO COPE. Sword said he's focusing on the federal PAC now.

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# 'I don't think people are liable to forget it'

## Officials reflect on Neese case

It wasn't just family and friends of Skylar Neese who have felt a range of emotions during the past two years.

There are also investigators and prosecutors who have been close to the case for months and won't soon forget the details.

Star City Police Chief Vic Propst was involved in the early stages of the investigation.

In July 2012, Skylar left her Star City apartment and met with Shelia Eddy and Rachel Shoaf. The three drove to Pennsylvania, where Eddy and Shoaf attacked and stabbed Skylar to death. They left her body in the woods. She wasn't found until months later.

Propst said the case started as one of a runaway, but it took law enforcement

down an unexpected path.

Propst said the case was one of the saddest that he has had to work, and he is glad it is resolved.

Eddy and Shoaf eventually came forward and took responsibility for their action, but much sense hasn't been made of the case, Propst said. He added it seems the crime was committed because the girls didn't want to be friends any more.

"People are still searching for other motives," he said. "It doesn't seem to an-

swer any questions."

The case has removed the words "kid's stuff" from Propst's vocabulary, he said. He used to qualify events such as runaways and youngsters partying under that umbrella, but doesn't since the Neese case.

As time passes since the murder, Propst said he believes thoughts may fade, but doesn't believe the case will disappear from the community's collective mind.

Monongalia County Prosecutor Marcia Ashdown

agreed, and said it might be pushed to the back of people's minds, but nobody will forget it.

"I don't think people are liable to forget it," she said.

Each murder case has its own unique set of circumstances and Ashdown said they aren't forgotten. But, the Neese case was at a high level because of its headline-grabbing nature and the fact she was killed by friends.

While things have calmed down for the Neese

family regarding the criminal proceedings, Ashdown said they will continue to experience the case.

"It's never over for them," she said.

With today marking two years since Skylar was killed, Ashdown said it doesn't feel that way because of the length of the investigation and the legal hearings that followed.

"You know it almost seems longer because it was such a long process," she said.

"It's two years of pure hell we've been through, and I mean pure hell," Dave Neese said. "Unless you had something like this happen to you before, you'll never understand what we went through and still are going through every day.

"When I die, I better go to heaven because I sure lived hell on earth," Skylar's dad said.

Today marks two years since Skylar left through her bedroom window to meet with Rachel Shoaf and Shelia Eddy. It was that night that the three supposed friends — and classmates at University High School — left to drive around and smoke marijuana.

But, Shoaf and Eddy had other ideas. Based on information from their plea hearings, they planned to kill Skylar for months, and packed the supplies they would need to do so.

The three drove to Pennsylvania, where Shoaf and Eddy agreed to attack at a predetermined signal.

They used kitchen knives to stab Skylar, even as she tried to flee. They stood over her as she drew her last breath. They also tried to conceal the crime and left Skylar's body in a wooded area — information all released by the county prosecutor's office during hearings.

### The search

Skylar was initially thought to be a missing person and a months-long search ensued. Tips came in about her possible whereabouts, but none were accurate. Shoaf and Eddy expressed concern though social media and even assisted in the search for their friend.

Shoaf's story began to change and eventually she confessed to police about what really happened. She also provided details on the locations of Skylar's remains, which led police to discover her body in the wooded area that has become the memorial.

The two girls pleaded guilty to their acts — Eddy to first-degree murder and Shoaf to second-degree — and were sentenced earlier this year.

Eddy received life in prison with mercy, meaning she will be eligible for parole after 15 years.

She was sent to Lakin Correctional Center, the state's only jail for women.

Shoaf was sentenced to 30 years in prison and is awaiting transfer to Lakin.

She will be eligible for parole after 10 years.

### Apology not accepted

It was during Shoaf's sentencing hearing, that either girl first spoke publicly about that night.

"I'm so sorry," she said during the sentencing, turning to face the Neese family. "I hurt the Neese family as well as Skylar. May God bring eternal peace to Skylar and the Neese family."

It was an apology that Dave Neese doesn't buy.

"I was thinking, 'Don't apologize to me you sicko,'" he recalled about

four months after the hearing. "You apologize for stepping on someone's toes or you apologize for spilling someone's drink. You don't apologize for murdering someone in the first degree. Something you thought about doing for a year, then you carry it out.

"You don't say you're sorry for that 'cause you're not. You sure as hell weren't sorry July 6 when you did it."

### Difficult days

Sitting in the courtroom during the proceedings wasn't easy, Neese said. He added that Eddy's hearing was more difficult because he and Mary knew her better. They treated her like their own daughter and they loved her.

It also hurt that Eddy came to court smiling and in a jovial mood.

"I didn't see anything funny about it," Neese said. "You're there because you killed somebody and you're laughing? She's a sick, sick individual."

There were other thoughts running through Neese's mind during the proceedings and it was court security that prevented him from trying to stop the smiling. He admitted that without court security there he would have likely attacked the teens.

"They both deserve my hands around their necks," he said.

If he had the chance to face his daughter's killers today, Neese said he didn't believe he would say anything to them — his instincts would take over.

"No matter what I would say or what I would think, my reactions would take over and I'd just want to kill her. That's horrible to say, but it's true."

### 'It ain't good enough'

Neese was disappointed with the court and its decisions made at the hearings. He said he was upset that Monongalia County Circuit Court Judge Russell Clawges only sentenced Shoaf to 30 years instead of the maximum 40-year imprisonment.

He also said he has looked at other states where juveniles have committed murder.

He found that some face punishment as adults and are sentenced to life or half a century in prison.

That left him questioning West Virginia's policies.

"For God's sake, what's wrong with our legal system?" he asked.

He also questions God. Neese said Skylar went to church, but he never went all that much. He said he believed in God before the murder and hasn't written God off completely, but the two have "issues."

"I feel like God's let me down," Neese said.

There is also a phrase that Neese said he and Mary hate to hear — there is a reason for the murder.

Neese said there is no reason for it — a car wreck he could believe there was a reason, but not murder.

"People keep saying

God has a reason, I don't care what his reason is, it ain't good enough."

### No reason matters

Neese called the two killers a "waste of human life."

He said he is happy to see them locked up. He has heard people speculate on reasons behind the motive, but said he hasn't heard one that answers his questions about what happened July 6, 2012, and he won't accept one.

"I don't care what the reason is," he said. "It's not good enough."

Neese said that the Shoaf and Eddy families haven't reached out to him or his wife. He believes they could have a conversation that might provide some insight into what the killers were thinking that night, two years ago.

It's been two years of reliving the details each day, Neese said.

"We really haven't gotten back to some kind of normal. I really don't know what normal is," Neese said. "It's been two years almost, and it seems like yesterday. Time just flew. All this time without my daughter, you would have thought time would just stop, but it hasn't."

Part of the reason time has flown is because of requests for the Neeses to share their story.

The incident has gained local, state, regional, national and international attention. Neese admitted that it does get tiresome sitting through all the interviews, but he does it so people can learn the truth.

"I want everybody to know the truth of what those two evil witches did," he said.

Skylar's killing has also provided one important lesson, Neese said. He implored parents to learn from what happened to him.

Know who your children are hanging out with, and know their parents.

### 'Gorgeous little smile'

Skylar should have celebrated some of life's biggest milestones this year. One was her high school graduation. The UHS graduating class rec-

ognized her during the May graduation ceremony.

That day was pretty tough, Neese said. He said he walked the rail-trail and did everything he could to get his mind off the significance of the day. But, he spent the entire day crying.

Graduation day was similar in pain to the day when investigators told the family they believed they found Skylar's remains, Neese said.

He said he and Mary often trade tough days and that the night of UHS's prom was tough for Skylar's mom. He said they cry on each other's shoulders and that it has put a strain on their marriage. But, they each have a strength that helps them

through it.

### Nothing's easy

Random comments from strangers can cause memories and emotions to surface. Neese recalled a recent day at work when a woman approached and said she prayed for him. It was something he had heard before, but this time he had to head to a back room and cry.

"Then I walk back and hear 'Sweet Child of Mine'... playing and that just went through me like a thorn in my side," he said.

People have said that dealing with the grief gets easier with time, but Neese said it hasn't for them.

There are days that are tougher.

If he could go back two years, Neese would have a simple message for his daughter:

"I love you," he said, taking a long pause. "That's about it."

He continued, "I'd tell her, 'Me and your mother miss her so bad. We both love her to death and I'm sorry those evil little witches did this to you. It's not fair.'"

Neese said he wants people to remember a few things about Skylar.

"The only thing I want people to remember is that gorgeous little smile, that bubbly little personality and the good things she brought to everyone's life. No one that was friends with her, or her parents, aunts, uncles or whatever will ever forget her."

## Nicole Brown Simpson's father, Louis, dies at 90

DANA POINT, Calif. — Louis Brown Jr., the father of O.J. Simpson's ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson, has died at his Southern California home, a family attorney said Saturday. He was 90.

Brown died Thursday, in the seaside community of Dana Point, attorney Natasha Roit said in an email. A statement issued on behalf of the family did not include a cause of death.

Brown was the father of Nicole Brown Simpson, who was slashed to death in 1994 with friend Ronald Goldman. Her former husband, a football great, was acquitted of murder in the high-profile murder trial, which was televised live.

A civil jury found O.J. Simpson liable in 1997 for the deaths of his ex-

wife and Goldman, providing a moral victory for grieving relatives who thought he got away with murder.

Louis Brown, who sat stone still as the verdict was announced, stood and smiled afterward. "I want to get outside and scream," he told the AP at the time. The jury awarded \$33.5 million in damages.

Brown and his daughter Denise founded a charitable foundation in his slain daughter's name to raise awareness of domestic violence and increase funding for assistance.

Brown served in World War II as a pilot and married in Switzerland after the war, the statement said.

His wife, Judi, and children were with him when he died. "It was his wish to remain in his home with those he loved," Roit said.

## TV and Broadway casting director Barry Moss dies

NEW YORK — Broadway and television casting director Barry Moss, who helped cast nearly 90 Broadway and touring productions, including the 1980 revival of "West Side Story," "Nine," "Torch Song Trilogy" and "The Who's Tommy," has died. He was 74.

Moss died June 17 of congestive heart failure at Mount Sinai Roosevelt in Manhattan, said his partner Bob Kale.

Among his casting credits are the 1995 revival of

"How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," "Titanic," "Woman of the Year," "My One and Only," "Black and Blue" and "Sweeney Todd." He also was the casting director for "The Cosby Show" and was a founding member of The Casting Society of America.

Moss was a child actor who studied theater arts at UCLA. He worked for the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences before moving to New York to begin a career as a director.

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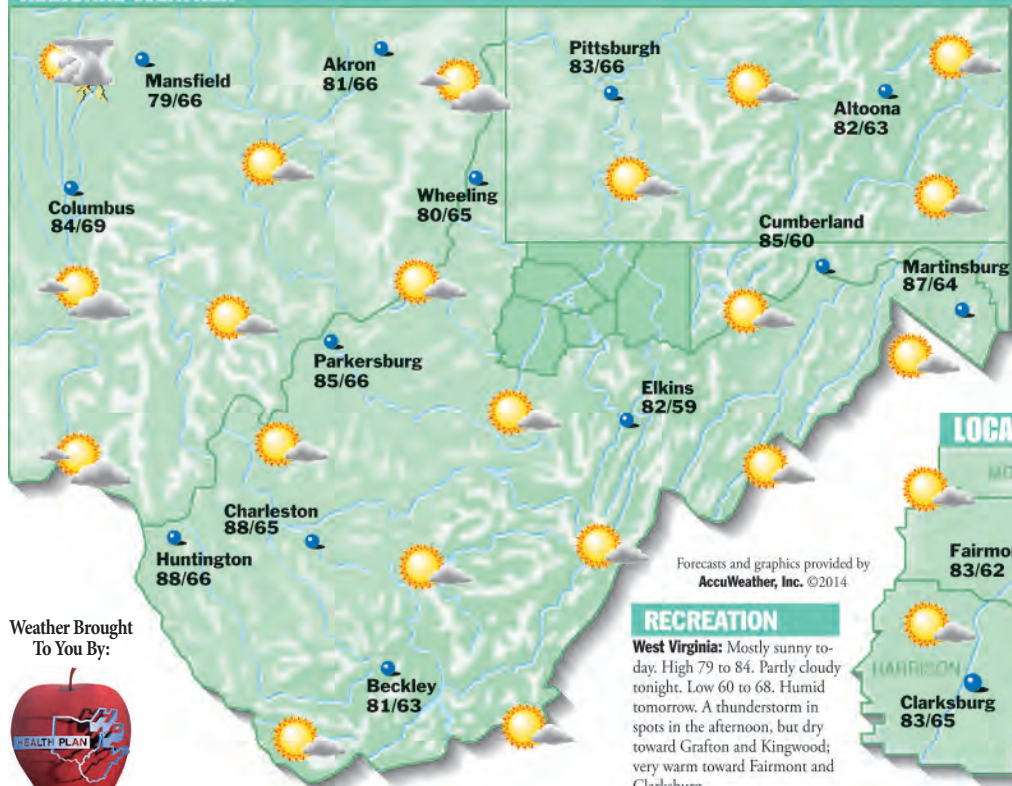

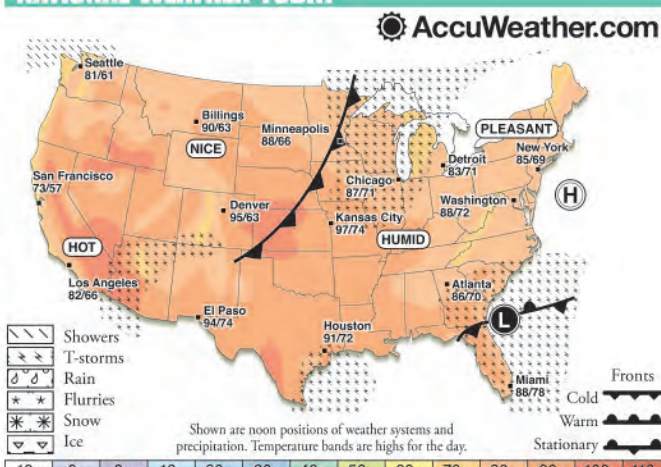

## Police: Unconscious man found along road

### Relative said victim's four-wheeler missing

The Monongalia County Sheriff's Department is investigating a suspected assault that a relative said left the victim with broken bones, cuts and on a breathing tube.

According to a news release from the department: Deputies were called to Morgans Run area of Cheat Lake, where they found an unresponsive man along the side of the road. He was taken to Ruby Memorial Hospital and ap-

peared to be an assault victim. His name and condition were not released to protect his privacy.

A relative said the man was found at about 10:30 a.m. on July 4. He had several cuts that needed stitches, a few fractures to his head and was on a breathing tube. The relative said the victim had motor skills and did respond to pain.

"I was shocked," the relative said about seeing him.

The victim left home late on July 3, the victim said. She added he had been drinking, but not excessively. He left with his four-wheeler and headed to a party area, the victim said.

The relative said she believed

the victim was staying the night with his girlfriend and the girlfriend believed he was staying with his family. The next morning, the family learned that he was taken to the hospital.

Family identified the victim at the hospital, the relative said.

The four-wheeler and its keys are missing, the relative said. She added that the victim is not the type of person to go out and start a fight. The man also had injuries to his hand, which led the family to believe that he tried to defend himself.

The relative said she was "heartbroken" over the situation and just wants justice to be served.

## Sam's Club: Ex-worker knew policy

Former employee: I was discriminated against

Sam's Club argues that a former employee was fired for her own actions and that its antidiscrimination policies were made available.

Myrtle Forquer filed suit against Wal-Mart and a Sam's Club manager earlier this year. Forquer argued that she lost her job as bakery team leader at the University Town Centre Sam's Club in July 2013 after being confronted over her views on the president's background, religious opinions and views on gay and lesbian couples.

Wal-Mart is the parent company to Sam's Club.

In its response, filed in Monongalia County Circuit Court, Sam's East Inc. asked to replace Wal-Mart as a defendant, as it operates the Granville store.

The company denies many of the allegations made in the lawsuit but said Forquer was asked about comments made in the workplace. She was fired for gross misconduct for discriminatory comments, the response said.

Sam's Club denied that age, gender or religious affiliation had any bearing on her termination.

Forquer said she was asked if she said anything about gays, Muslims or people on government assistance, to which she responded "no." She was also asked if she said anything about President Barack Obama being black, to which she answered he is biracial because she understood his mother is white.

The day after the confrontation, Forquer was fired for gross misconduct, including discrimination for her remarks regarding Obama's ethnicity.

The employer knew of Forquer's Christian beliefs as she wore clothing and jewelry that displayed her faith, according to the initial suit.

The complaint says the gross misconduct was, at best, a pretext for firing Forquer, and the motivating factors were actually gender, age and religious discrimination.

Forquer was replaced by a 23-year-old who had no qualifications or prior experience. The suit calls the situation "blatant" age discrimination.

She also suffered gender discrimination after a male employee received a six-day suspension

might not work in certain markets. For example, television advertisements might not be effective out-of-state, where one-on-one interaction could have larger effects.

years since WVU did a comprehensive marketing review, Martin said. At that time, it was more focused on athletics and the mascot.

She didn't have an estimated cost to hire the firm, but the hope is results will be seen during the fall semester.

Both President E. Gordon Gee and his predecessor, Jim Clements, have talked about WVU's momentum and its offerings, and Martin said she believes that the marketing campaign can help spread that message. She added marketing can share the message that WVU is in a strong position and can compete on the national stage.

**Smokers, can e-cigarettes save money?**

RICHMOND, Va. — It's difficult to say yet if electronic cigarettes are less harmful than regular fire-and-tobacco smokes, but they can save smokers hundreds or even thousands of dollars a year.

Some in the growing industry are touting the battery-powered nicotine sticks as a way for smokers to save money in the face of rising taxes and prices for tobacco cigarettes. But it may not stay that way for long as states are increasingly looking to tax e-cigarettes as they tax other tobacco products.

A look at the costs of smokes and e-cigarettes shows the savings can vary a lot, depending on state cigarette taxes and the brand and style of e-cigarette used. But the bot-

tom line is that e-cigarettes can generally make an expensive addiction cheaper.

A note on health: None of this takes into consideration the potential costs of any health effects from nicotine addiction, which can be huge. Clearly, the way to save the most money is to kick nicotine entirely. And taking up either habit for the first time isn't going to be good for your wallet.

**The basics of E-cigs**

The devices heat a liquid nicotine solution, creating vapor that users inhale. Smokers like them because the vapor looks like smoke but doesn't contain the thousands of chemicals, tar or odor of regular cigarettes.

Scientists haven't finished much research on e-cigarettes, and the studies that have been done on

their safety or ability to help smokers quit have been inconclusive.

But cost is increasingly becoming part of the equation as the average pack of cigarettes around the country tops \$6.15, according to the Federation of Tax Administrators.

**Doing the math**

Smoking is expensive. A pack-a-day smoker can spend anywhere from \$1,500 a year in a low-tax state, all the way to about \$5,000 in New York City, where a pack can run \$13. On average across the country, the tab comes to about \$2,250 a year.

The first consideration for someone looking to switch is whether to use disposable models or a refillable. The refillable models promise more savings in exchange for a bigger upfront investment.

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# WVU looks to advance urban forestry

BLACKSBURG, Va. — A multistate team from universities in West Virginia, Virginia and Maryland are working to advance the profession of urban forestry.

The team led by researchers at Virginia Tech launched Urban Forestry 2020. The project aims to examine the challenges faced by

the urban forestry profession and devise strategies for advancing the profession.

The project also includes representatives from WVU, Virginia State University and the University of Maryland. It is partially funded by the U.S. Forest Service.

Urban forestry is the management of trees and green spaces in communities to enhance quality of life and protect the environment. Team officials said that while the profession has advanced rapidly over the past 20 years,

there are many issues that need to be faced to move it forward.

“The beauty of the urban forestry profession is its interdisciplinary nature,” said Susan Day, associate professor of urban forestry at Virginia Tech and the project’s lead investigator. “People from diverse backgrounds work together to solve problems with a critical urban natural resource that has a big impact on our day-to-day lives. But the field’s interdisciplinary nature is also a chal-

lenge when it comes to networking and education, and the profession is experiencing some growing pains.”

The team has assembled a committee to help guide the project, bringing together leaders in urban forestry and related fields like urban planning, landscape architecture and civil engineering to examine recruitment into urban forestry, accreditation of university urban forestry degree programs, and professional credentialing and networking of urban foresters.

# Antlerless deer program applications available

# Md. sisters headed to U.S. rodeo competition

MYERSVILLE, Md. — Morgan and Lauren Keeney sparkle as they expertly navigate the rodeo ring — literally, because they’ve got bling.

The sisters from Myersville find every opportunity to spice up their ensemble, including glittery cowboy boots, large belt buckles (the rodeo equivalent of trophies), jeweled breastplates for their horses and shimmering belts.

“Some people don’t like bling,” Lauren said. “But we do.”

But once they mount their horses, they mean business. In 2013, the Keeneys joined Maryland’s first high school rodeo team, and they both did well enough in competitions to earn spots in the National High School Finals Rodeo beginning July 13 in Rock Springs, Wyo. Morgan also won Mary-

land’s Rookie of the Year award.

The National High School Rodeo Association has members from 41 states, five Canadian provinces and Australia, encompassing about 12,500 students, according to the National High School Rodeo Association. At finals — dubbed the “world’s largest rodeo” — about 1,500 contestants will compete, as the top four athletes from each event are invited to compete for national titles, prizes and scholarship money, according to the association’s website.

In Wyoming, Morgan, 17, and Lauren, 14, will compete in both barrel racing and pole bending. Lauren also recently picked up goat tying.

Barrel racers complete a clover-shaped pattern riding on their horse, while pole benders try to weave through six poles as they ride. Both are measured by

# Beekeepers focus on education, care

**KEARNEYSVILLE** — Honeybees are beneficial to the environment, pollinating plants and producing honey, but Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD) could lead to a reduced honey bee population in the future.

CCD is a name given to the phenomenon of declining honeybee populations in recent decades. There are many factors associated with CCD, but none have been established as a primary or direct cause of the disorder.

According to the Agriculture Research Service, the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s internal research agency, the main symptom of CCD is few or no adult honeybees inhabiting the hive, leaving only the queen and immature bees inside.

Some factors that could be related to CCD are viruses and fungi, parasites such as the Varroa mite and improper care of bees.

According to the Agriculture Research Service’s data on CCD, the total number of managed honeybee colonies in the Unit-

ed States has decreased from 5 million in the 1940s to 2.5 million now. In a five-year period between 2006 and 2011, beekeepers reported annual losses of hives averaging 33 percent each year.

Herbert Everhart, who co-owns Eversweet Apiaries in Kearneysville with Ed Burwell, has experienced hive loss — although not necessarily CCD — in the past.

Everhart said he began keeping bees 12 years ago after a neighbor who was keeping bees as a hobby could no longer care for his hive.

Everhart bought a second hive when he was starting out, and lost both before he realized there was more to beekeeping than he had first thought. He took a class,

and now spends much of his time giving advice to new beekeepers.

“More hives are lost by the backyard beekeeper or the beekeepers that run maybe 100 hives or so, and it’s because of poor management,” Everhart said. “Looking back to the very beginning, when I lost my hives, I didn’t want to see other people lose theirs. That’s where I got my passion for teaching beekeeping. I wanted to save those people the same heartache. Even now, when we find a hive that died over the winter, it still hurts just as much as if we had only two hives.”

In addition to raising bees and producing honey, Eversweet Apiaries sells beekeeping supplies, and Everhart offers advice for free.

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## Philadelphia fire may have begun in couch

PHILADELPHIA — A fire that raced through a row of two-story homes in southwest Philadelphia early Saturday, killing three 4-year-olds and a baby. The fire also engulfed at least 10 houses, may have started in a couch on a porch, officials said.

The blaze began shortly before 3 a.m. and was brought under control in about an hour, fire officials said. At least eight row homes were completely gutted, leaving behind only charred frames.

A fire department dispatcher identified the victims as 4-year-old twin

girls, a 4-year-old boy and a month-old boy. The relationship between the twins and the two boys was unclear. Four other people were injured.

Jeff Boone told *The Philadelphia Inquirer* that he saw a couch on fire on the porch of a house about five doors down from his residence and heard children screaming.

The flames spread across porches so fast, he said, that "it looked like someone had a flamethrower and just shot it all across."

The 27-year-old Boone said he called 911 and bolted out of his house to try to

save his neighbors.

"I was running, screaming, telling everybody, 'Get up! Yo, get yo! Go!'" he said.

Milton Musa told the newspaper his roommate woke him up and said their home was on fire. Once outside, Musa said, he saw two children hanging from a neighbor's window.

"I could see they weren't strong, and I was afraid they'd fall to the cement," Musa said. "So I went underneath them, let them fall on my back and carried them away."

He wiped away tears as he recalled the intense moments as the blaze swept

through the neighborhood.

"Everyone was running for their lives," he said. "I've lost everything. My paperwork, my documents, my house. Everything."

A preliminary investigation indicated the blaze started in a couch at one home and spread quickly to other residences. The investigation will continue.

"This is a tragic, tragic day for the city of Philadelphia. Tragic," Fire Commissioner Derrick Sawyer said. "We lost four children today."

The Red Cross said 42 people were displaced by the fire.

## First lady fights GOP on school lunch rules

WASHINGTON — First ladies typically avoid getting into public scraps, but Michelle Obama has jumped into perhaps her biggest battle yet.

She's fighting a House Republican effort to soften a central part of her prized anti-childhood obesity campaign and she said she's ready "to fight until the bitter end."

Mrs. Obama even mocked the GOP effort in an opinion column and argued her case before her Twitter followers.

"Remember a few years ago when Congress declared that the sauce on a slice of pizza should count as a vegetable in school lunches?" she wrote in *The New York Times*. "You don't have to be a nutritionist to know that this doesn't make much sense. Yet we're seeing the same thing happening again with these new efforts to lower nutrition standards in our schools."

Mrs. Obama lobbied largely behind the scenes four years ago for the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010, which requires more fruit, vegetables and whole grains in school meals, along with less sodium, sugar and fat. It was a major achievement, the first update to school lunch rules in decades designed to make school meals more nutritious.

The School Nutrition Association, an industry-backed group that represents school cafeteria workers and originally

supported the standards, has now turned against them. The association said it fully supports getting kids to eat healthier but said many districts are losing money because students aren't buying the healthier lunches.

More than 1 million fewer students eat lunch at school each day since the first round of standards went into effect in 2012, following decades of steadily increasing participation, said Diane Pratt-Heavner, a spokeswoman for the association. A second round of rules, including standards for school breakfasts, took effect July 1.

"How can we call these standards a success when they are driving students away from the program?" she said.

Her group wants more flexibility for districts that are losing money. A House bill to fund the Agriculture Department in 2015 would give districts a chance to apply to skip the requirements for one year.

Rep. Robert Aderholt, of Alabama, the Republican author of that measure, said the lunch rules go too far and came too fast for school districts to handle.

"As well-intended as the people in Washington believe themselves to be, the reality is that from a practical standpoint these regulations are just plain not working out in some individual school districts," he said after a House panel approved the bill. A vote by the full House is expected after its July Fourth break.

## 4 confirmed dead in Florida boat collision

MIAMI — Four people are confirmed dead and at least a dozen injured in a Florida boat collision, authorities said Saturday.

The boaters are believed to have been out celebrating the Fourth of July when the crash happened late Friday, near the Dinner Key Marina in Miami.

Rescuers were alerted by one of the boaters at about 10:45 p.m. He said he'd been hit by another vessel and that his 36-foot vessel was taking on water, the Coast Guard reported.

Multiple law enforcement agencies responded to a chaotic scene. Officers plucked several people out

of the water while struggling to determine how many were still missing.

"We kept getting report after report of more people in the water," Miami Fire Rescue Lt. Ignatius Carroll said.

Eight people were initially transported to Miami hospitals. Two adults, a male and a female, later died.

Commercial salvage crews located a second vessel believed to have been involved in the crash. Two unconscious women were found on board and transported to a nearby boat ramp.

Coast Guard officials said they contacted the

second boat's owner. They were told the owner's son had taken the vessel out Friday evening.

The search for the missing boater and any other possible passengers continued into Saturday.

Relatives of a female victim found her body in the water on Saturday, Jorge Pino, a public information officer with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission said.

Investigators located the body of another person later Saturday morning, Carroll said.

Names and ages of the deceased and injured were not immediately released.

## Stress could hurt brain development

MILWAUKEE — A team of University of Wisconsin-Madison (UW) researchers has shown that chronic stress of poverty, neglect and physical abuse in early life may shrink the parts of a child's developing brain responsible for memory, learning and processing emotion.

While early-life stress already has been linked to depression, anxiety, heart disease, cancer and a lack of educational and employment success, researchers have long been seeking to understand what part of the brain is affected by stress to help guide interventions.

The UW research published in the journal *Biological Psychiatry* adds to a growing body of research linking chronic stress early in life to brain development.

The research focused on two brain regions — the hippocampus and amygdala — that are involved in memory, learning and processing emotion.

Findings from other researchers have been mixed, which the UW researchers believe may be attributed to automated software being used for brain measurements.

The automated software may be prone to error because the brain regions are so small, according to the UW researchers.

The brain is changeable and treatable through exercise, medication and cognitive therapy, according to Jamie Hanson, a postdoctoral researcher at Duke University's Laboratory for NeuroGenetics.

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## Shark bites swimmer near Southern California beach

MANHATTAN BEACH, Calif. — A 7-foot-long great white shark bit a man swimming off Southern California's Manhattan Beach on Saturday, officials said.

The man was bitten on the upper right side at about 9:30 a.m., suffering puncture wounds described as moderate injuries, said Rick Flores, a Los Angeles County Fire Department spokesman. The man was taken to a hospital conscious and breathing on his own, Flores said.

The attack started when a person fishing off

the Manhattan Beach Pier hooked the shark and spent more than 30 minutes trying to reel it in, which, Flores said, made the shark grow agitated and take out more and more fishing line.

The victim was in a group of long-distance swimmers about 300 yards off the beach swimming past the pier, where Flores said the shark bit the man.

The fisherman cut the line, and a surfer put the injured swimmer on his board, taking the victim ashore with the help of Los Angeles County lifeguards. Paramedics began treating the man.



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## Autopsy: Palestinian teen burned to death

RAMALLAH, West Bank — An autopsy showed an Arab teenager who Palestinians said was killed in a revenge attack was burned to death.

Palestinian militants fired two rockets Saturday toward a major southern city deeper into Israel than any other attack in the current round of violence.

The Israeli military said its "Iron Dome" defense system intercepted the rockets that were aimed at Beersheba. The military also said at least 10 other rockets were fired from the Gaza Strip and said it had retaliated with airstrikes.

Clashes between Israeli police and Palestinian

protesters spread Saturday from Jerusalem to Arab towns in northern Israel as hundreds of people took to the streets and threw rocks and fire bombs at officers who responded with tear gas and stun grenades.

Palestinian Attorney General Abdelghani al-Owawi said he received initial autopsy results from a Palestinian doctor who was present at the autopsy in Tel Aviv. He said it shows that 16-year-old Palestinian Mohammed Abu Khdeir, whose death has sparked large protests in his east Jerusalem neighborhood, suffered burns on "90 percent of his body."

His account provided the first details of the

preliminary findings to be made public. The Israeli Health Ministry could not be reached for comment.

The autopsy found evidence that Abu Khdeir had breathed in the flames as burns were found inside his body, in his lungs, bronchial tubes and his throat, al-Owawi said.

He also said the young man had suffered wounds on the right side of his head apparently from impact with a rock or another hard object.

Abu Khdeir's charred body was found in a forest Wednesday after he was seized near his home. Palestinians immediately accused Israeli extremists of killing him to avenge the deaths of three

Israeli teens who had been abducted and killed in the West Bank. Israeli police said an investigation is still underway and they have not yet determined who killed the boy or why.

Israeli leaders have widely condemned the killing of the Palestinian youth, and Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu vowed those responsible would be brought to justice.

Palestinians took to the streets in protests after news of the boy's death on Wednesday and clashed with police in east Jerusalem. Riots erupted in east Jerusalem Friday, as thousands of Palestinians massed for the boy's burial.

## Honduras losing hope in search for trapped miners

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — Honduran officials said Saturday they are losing hope that any of eight still-trapped workers survived the collapse of a small gold mine.

Three days after the cave-in, "there is a strong, bad odor of death within the mine ... and that worries us," said Moises Alvarado, chief of the country's emergency commission.

"Without oxygen, food or water, it is very difficult to survive for the 66 hours that those men have been in the mines," he said at a news conference. "We hope for a miracle. And only a

miracle would let us rescue them alive."

Eleven workers were able to flee immediately after Wednesday's collapse, and three others were rescued on Friday.

The old, unregulated San Juan Arriba mine is in a mountainous municipality known as El Corpus, about 60 miles (100 kilometers) south of Tegucigalpa, the capital. Officials say more than 1,000 tunnels, most of them unmapped and buried, perforate the hillsides.

About 5,000 people work in artisanal mining in the area, many turning to the mines because plagues devastated the region's grain and coffee crops.

## Ecuador's president may seek indefinite re-election

QUITO, Ecuador — Franklin D. Roosevelt had it, so did Venezuela's Hugo Chavez and so does Nicaragua's Daniel Ortega. Could Ecuador's Rafael Correa be the next president to win the right to consecutive and indefinite re-election?

That's the question the country's constitutional court is debating, and the answer could radically change the future of the Andean nation of 16 million.

After years of vowing that he wouldn't seek office when his term ends in 2017, Correa recently announced that his Alianza Pais political party would push for a constitutional amendment that would open the

gates for the charismatic socialist to keep his job permanently.

Stung by recent municipal elections where his party lost key cities, including the capital, Correa said the change is needed to preserve the advances of his "Citizens' Revolution."

"My sincere position was always against re-election," he told the country recently, "but after deep reflection, and knowing that sometimes our choices are between the lesser of two evils, I've decided to support this initiative."

For his critics, permanent re-election is simply one more step in the country's slow march toward Venezuelan-style 21st century socialism with Correa at the helm.

## Four killed in car bomb attack in Somalian capital

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Four people were killed when a car laden with explosives blew up near the parliamentary building in the Somali capital, Mogadishu, police said Saturday.

The Somali terror group al-Shabab claimed responsibility for the bombing. Capt. Mohammed Hussein said the car exploded at a checkpoint where it had been stopped by Somali troops.

The dead were soldiers and refugees from an internal refugee camp near the checkpoint, Hussien said.

He said Somali troops ordered the driver of the car out the vehicle for a search when he detonated the explosives.

Seven children from the camp were wounded in the attack. Al-Shabab did not say the target of the car bomber but al-Shabab has launched a campaign of attacks against Somali parliamentarians.

Somali legislators were holding a meeting at the parliament at the time of the attack.

Al-Qaida-linked al-Shabab said it was responsible for the killing of a Somali lawmaker and his bodyguard in a drive-by shooting earlier this week.

The targeting of members of parliament appears to be a new strategy for al-Shabab. The parliament is seen as an emerging pillar of democracy in the war-rav-

aged Horn of Africa nation.

Al-Shabab militants have previously carried out attacks against United Nations staff, government officials and African Union peacekeepers.

The terror group has launch attacks on neighboring countries including Kenya and Uganda which have sent troops to Somalia under the banner of the African Union, to bolster the country's weak U.N.-backed government from al-Shabab's insurgency.

# Furniture maker turns derecho debris into decor

LEON — Retired *Washington Post* photo editor Joseph Elbert didn't have to go looking for inspiration when he decided to start building furniture.

It nearly fell on him. When a derecho swept across West Virginia on June 29, 2012, strong winds damaged buildings, uprooted trees and took down power lines across the state. Elbert's Mason County community did not escape the damage.

"There were just trees

everywhere and you heard the sound of chainsaws going," Elbert said.

That gave him an idea. He decided to gather the downed hardwoods from his neighbors and get them milled into lumber.

His neighbors liked the idea, too, often using their tractors and bulldozers to drag the trees to Elbert's property.

He then found a portable sawmill that would process the trees for \$200 per thousand board feet.

Elbert soon had 4,000 board feet of green sawn hardwood on his hands, but

then realized he had no way to dry it.

Professional lumberyards use huge kilns to dry their lumber, and while air-drying is an option, it takes a really long time.

Elbert began researching his problem on the Internet and soon found plans for a solar-powered kiln designed by Virginia Tech in the 1970s for use in third-world countries.

The big, insulated box lets in sunlight from the top, heating the space to 140 degrees. As moisture leaves the wood, it rises to the top of the kiln where it escapes through vents.

Elbert said while oak would take a year to air-dry, his kiln cuts the process down to just a month.

Now, his shop is filled

with piles of boards ready to be turned into lamps, chairs and tables.

It's not the kind of stuff you find at the local lumber yard. Elbert likes wood with knots, holes and other blemishes. He even cuts the boards to showcase these imperfections.

"It's part of its character," he said. "Most wood workers, it goes into the burn pile."

Elbert's work is a combination of rustic and modern.

He might use knotty, blemished wood, but his furniture is inspired by architecture and the mid-century design of the "Mad Men" era.

His chairs have high backs made up of long wooden slats, cut individually and glued together.

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# Ukraine claims a victory against rebels

SLOVYANSK, Ukraine — Ukrainian troops forced pro-Russian insurgents out of a key stronghold in the country's embattled east on Saturday. The significant success suggests the government may finally be making gains in a months-long battle against a spreading separatist insurgency.

As rebels fled from Slovyansk, vowing to regroup elsewhere and fight on, President Petro Poroshenko hailed the recapture of the city as "the start of a turning point" in a battle that has claimed more than 400 lives since April.

After a night of heavy fighting that saw heavy artillery fire from Ukraine's troops, government soldiers were in full control of rebel headquarters in

Slovyansk, a city of about 100,000 that has been a center of the fighting between Kiev's troops and the pro-Russian insurgents.

Soldiers raised the Ukrainian flag over the city

council building, while troops carried stockpiles of weapons out of the city's administrative and police buildings, which have been under rebel control since early April.

"It's not a total victory. But the purging of Slovyansk of these bands, made up of people armed to the teeth, has incredible symbolic importance," Poroshenko said.

# Volodymyr, head of Ukraine's Orthodox Church dies at 78

KIEV, Ukraine — The head of Ukraine's Orthodox Church died at 78 after leading it for more than two decades during the tumultuous post-Soviet period.

Volodymyr, who had been credited with stabilizing the church, died Saturday "after a long illness," the church said Saturday.

In his more than 20 years as head of the country's largest church, Volodymyr weathered

the breakaway of two groups that declared themselves independent of the Moscow Patriarchate, which incorporates the Ukrainian church. Observers said he succeeded in preventing even more splits.

"He will go down in history as the savior of the Ukrainian Orthodoxy during a very difficult historical moment," said Andrei Zolotov, an expert on Orthodoxy said.



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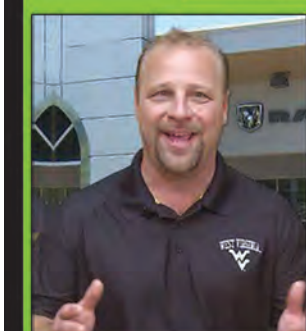

## 'Country Roads' led QB Trickett home to WVU

**THE COMMENT DIDN'T** appear to be made with a sigh or with any sort of an underlying tone of depressing realization.

WVU starting quarterback **Clint Trickett** instead said what he said matter-of-factly.

"I love this place and I love the people here, though sometimes they don't love me."

West Virginia is home for Trickett. He grew up here, considers many in this area to be some of his best friends and he played freshman football at Morgantown High before his family relocated to Tallahassee, Fla. Although his dad, **Rick**, still coaches at Florida State and Trickett started his career there, his connection to the Mountain State never faded.

During sleepless nights at FSU, Trickett admitted that plopping in the 2003 WVU football highlight tape was one of his best remedies.

"I would watch it and it would get me jazzed up for the next day," Trickett said. "Every time 'Country Roads' comes on, I get chills."

The bond runs so deep that West Virginia was on his mind when he got his driver's license.

"Don't tell my mom this, but I skipped out of school and drove up to West Virginia (from Tallahassee) that weekend," Trickett said. "I couldn't stay away."

So it is that Trickett understands how to take the good with the bad here. He knows what WVU football means to the state. He knows that the people here hate excuses — they just want accountability and results. He knows the work ethic, and he knows that every decision the WVU quarterback makes will be critiqued and often criticized.

People may appreciate his ties to Morgantown, smile when he talks about his favorite local fishing spots and love his dedication to hunting, but none of that makes overthrowing a receiver on a third down OK.

And Trickett, entering his second and final season with WVU, seems to be OK with that. He knows what he got himself into.

"You can say what you want about me as a player, but you're going to get a guy who plays his heart out and you're going to get a guy who is going to play hurt," Trickett said.

If anything, that's what we learned last year. Trickett suffered two concussions and somehow played through eight games despite injuring his shoulder in his first extended action. Certain scenes from the Baylor game will never be forgotten. While WVU got creamed, 73-42, Trickett kept gunning it. He couldn't lift himself off the turf with his right hand, wouldn't pick up the sideline telephone with his right hand and didn't high-five teammates with his right hand. It was clear his shoulder was throbbing. Yet, he never took himself out. He threw the ball 28 times before WVU coaches did what they should have done long before that and sat him down.

Does it bother Trickett that he only played one game at full health during WVU's 4-8 season? Absolutely. Does he admit to wondering, "What if?" from time to time? How could he not?

He stops himself though from going too far down that road.

A true West Virginian, Trickett promises only to leave his heart on the field.

"You can't call me soft," he said. "You can say I suck, but you can't call me soft."

The WVU football program has a solid track record of mining talent from Western Pennsylvania.

That's been by design. "One of the biggest things with our (recruiting) philosophy is that we treat that area like it's our home state," said WVU defensive coordinator Tony Gibson, who specializes in recruiting Western Pennsylvania.

The Mountaineers pulled Major Harris (1987-'89), Marc Bulger (1997-'99), Rasheed Marshall (2001-'04), Solomon Page (1996-'98), Eric Wicks (2004-'07) and Will Clarke (2010-'13) from Pittsburgh, pulled Penn State transfer Jeff Hostetler (1982-'83) out of Holsopple, hooked Dan Mozes (2003-'06) from Washington, lured Mike Logan (1993-'96) and Anthony Leonard (2007-'10) from McKeesport, and plucked Morty Ivy (2005-'08) from Monroeville, Don Barclay (2008-'11) from Cranberry and Pat McAfee (2005-'08) from Plum.

Those aren't just players: Those are some of WVU's all-time greats. And they all came from the same region.

Their decisions to come to Morgantown, and their subsequent success as Mountaineers, have only strengthened the bond between WVU and Western Pennsylvania, which remains a vital recruiting territory for the Mountaineers.

"From about 80 miles north to about 30 miles east and west of Pittsburgh, that's our home area," Gibson said. "You can drive up in a day and drive back, and those kids have a lot of access to get down here. That's really huge."

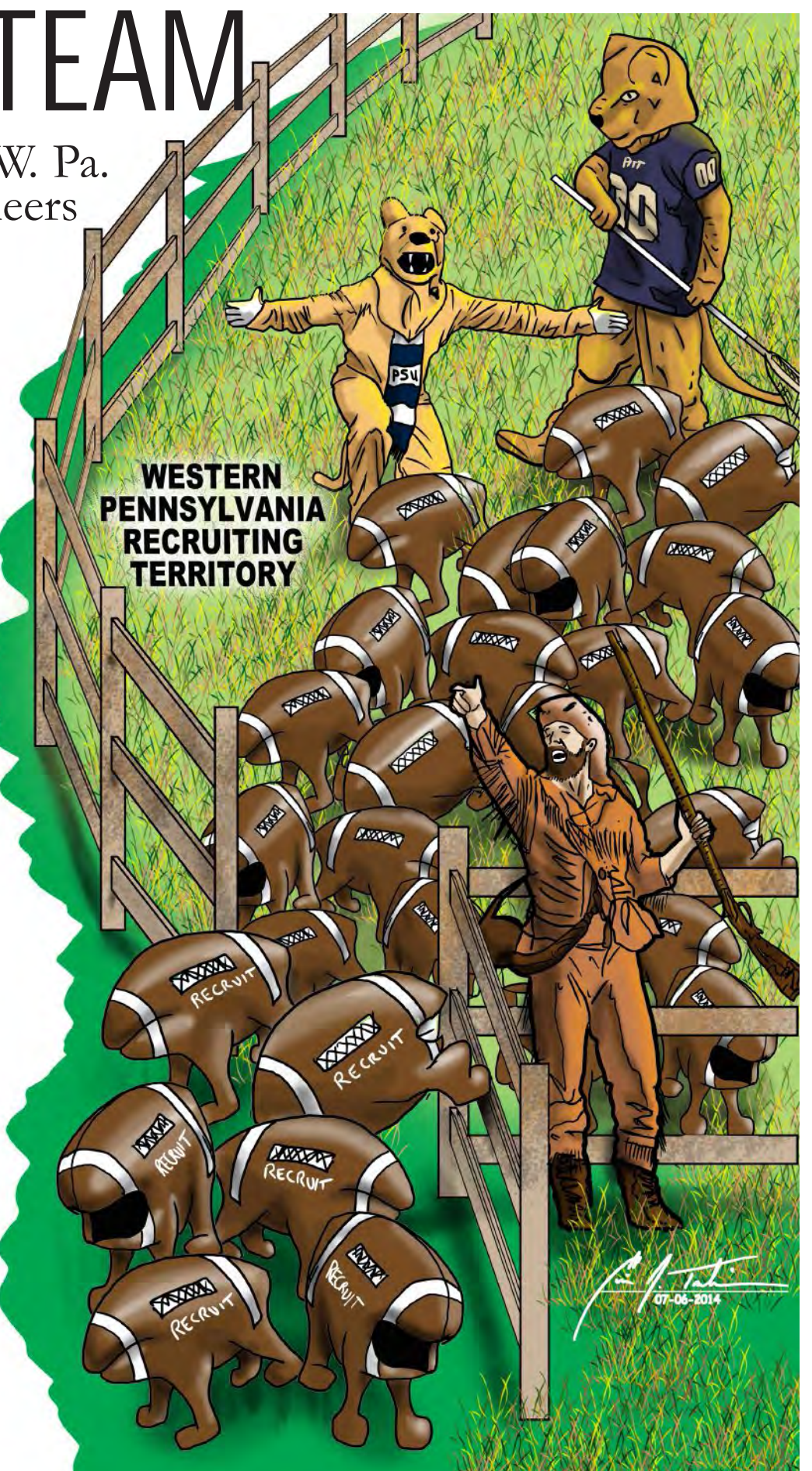
"And the number of players that have played here from that area and the connections we have — that's really the true philosophy of us recruiting it so hard."

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# Landing Mozes a recruiting coup for Gibson

Dan Mozes was a four-year starter for the Mountaineers football team, a three-time all-Big East first-team selection and both a unanimous and consensus All-American during his senior season, in 2006. That same year, Mozes won the Rimington Award, given to the nation's top center, which still stands as WVU's lone individual award in the history of the program.

None of that may have happened if not for Tony Gibson.

Gibson, the Mountaineers' defensive coordinator, was still on his first stint at WVU working under Rich Rodriguez when he took note of Mozes at Washington (Pa.) High School.

Mozes was a junior at the time, one year from Washington's undefeated season and Class AA state championship, and had drawn little interest from area recruiters.

"My perception of Dan's potential and some of the other schools' perception, including my alma mater, Penn State, were not congruent," said Guy Montecalvo, Mozes' head coach at Washington. "I knew the potential he had as a D-I player but, because he was only 6-foot-1 1/2, he didn't fit their typical profile."

Montecalvo, who now serves as the athletic director for Canon-McMillan High, in Canonsburg, Pa., couldn't gain any traction when it came to getting in-state schools to look at Mozes.

Penn State turned him down. So did Pitt.

Gibson jumped in and set to work on making Mozes a Mountaineer.

"Loyalty is a big thing, and Gibby and [Rodriguez] were the first ones to really come calling," Mozes said. "And the interaction with them was awesome. They were more than just coaches during that whole process: They were like father figures. That approach is so key for a good recruiter."

The approach was so key, in fact, that Mozes committed to WVU prior to his senior year. When other programs started inquiring about Mozes during that undefeated senior season, Mozes sent them packing.

"At first, I was recruited by West Virginia and Wake Forest — that's it," said Mozes, now the vice president of operations and head strength coach at Barwis Methods Training Center, in Plymouth, Mich. That facility's CEO is former WVU strength coach Mike Barwis. The center will be featured in a Discovery Channel TV series, beginning 9 p.m. Wednesday.

"And so when I committed to West Virginia after my junior year, Coach Montecalvo, who's a very loyal person, told me that a man makes a commitment and sticks with it. When other colleges came after me, he wouldn't let them talk to me. When mail came to me, I threw it by the wayside. Once I made my commitment to West Virginia, that was it."

It was a breakthrough moment for Gibson, who was in his first year at WVU.

Looking back, Gibson realizes how Mozes' commitment helped put him on the map as a recruiter in Western Pennsylvania, an area he's continued to focus on for the past 14 years.

"For me, it all started with Dan," said Gibson, who returned to WVU in 2013. "The guy was the best center in college football — and I knew it back then."

"We got him to commit the summer before his se-

nior year, right before his high school team went 15-0 and won the state championship. We pressed him a bit and told him that he needed to jump on board."

While Mozes turned out to be a steal for Gibson, he was also the one that got away for a handful of other recruiters. One of those recruiters, Tom Bradley, who now works alongside Gibson as WVU's senior associate head coach, was at Penn State at the time. He remembers Montecalvo's pleas to take a closer look at Mozes.

"When we turned [Mozes] down at Penn State, Montecalvo told me I was crazy. And I guess I blew that one," Bradley said with a laugh. "But evaluating talent is tough. Sometimes you're right on and some you miscalculate. You have to give [Gibson] credit: He did a better job evaluating Mozes, who turned out to be one heck of a player."

There's another reason Montecalvo specifically urged Bradley to sign Mozes: Not only was Montecalvo a Penn State alumnus, he shared the field with Bradley as a player. The two roomed together when Montecalvo was a graduate assistant for the Nittany Lions.

"Not only did I know [Bradley], but Bobby Junko up at Pitt was a lifelong

family friend and he was [assistant head coach] at the time," Montecalvo said. "I tried to sell them on Dan but they were skeptical. He didn't fit the mold. Those [Pennsylvania] guys had some egg on their face after Dan chose WVU."

While Bradley has hit his share of home runs on the recruiting trail, his old friend hasn't let him live down missing on Mozes.

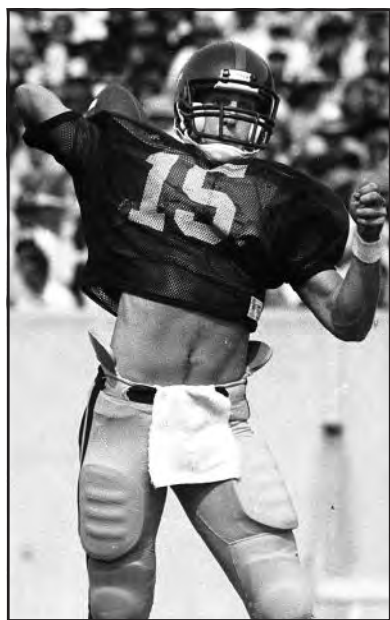
"You win some, you lose some," Bradley said. "Sometimes guys you love pan out and sometimes they don't. It's not a scientific process. But [Montecalvo] still gives it to me all the time that we didn't get Dan."

In the end, Mozes said, it worked out for the best. He left WVU as one of the most decorated players in the football program's history.

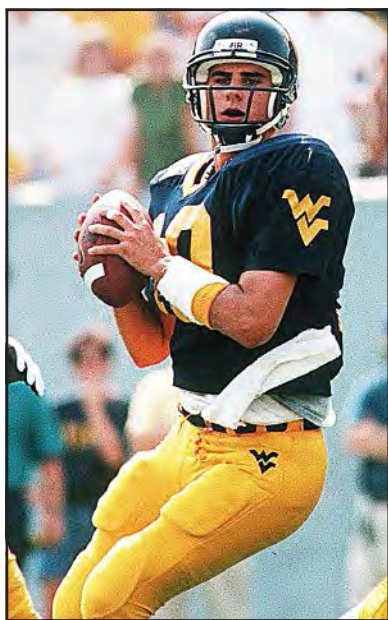
"People ask me what I'd change about my collegiate career," Mozes said. "But why would I change anything? I busted my [butt] and had a great time. We won the Sugar Bowl, I was an All-American, won the Rimington and I met my wife [Heather] there."

"I was told that the two most important choices you make in your life are where you commit to college and who you marry. Well, in my opinion, those are the two best choices I've ever made — and they both came in Morgantown."

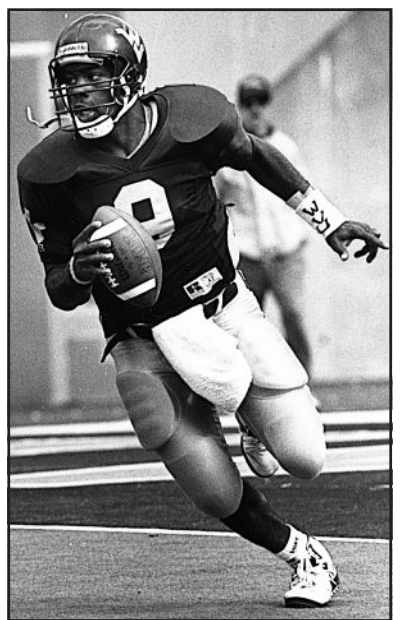

sylvania during his subsequent stops at Michigan, Pitt and Arizona. Meanwhile, WVU's presence in the region took a hit after his departure.

Linebacker Nick Kwiatkoski (Bethel Park) is the only Western Pennsylvania player on WVU's roster who predates Gibson's return to Morgantown.

Since Gibson's return to WVU in January 2013, the Mountaineers have brought in Hodari Christian (McKeesport), Cullen Christian (Pittsburgh; Pitt transfer), Ricky Rogers (Monroeville), Rushel Shell (Hopewell, Pa.; Pitt transfer) and a pair of Aliquippa High standouts Dravon Henry and Jaleel Fields. Henry (5-foot-11, 185 pounds) is a four-star cornerback and Fields (6-3, 286 pounds) is a three-star defensive end.

Breaking into Aliquippa and landing two top talents was a watershed moment for the WVU program.

"This is the first time I've ever gotten kids out of Aliquippa," Gibson said. "I've recruited a ton of them, but I'd never been able to get in."

Aliquippa was a Pitt stronghold, sending future NFL players such as Mike Ditka, Tony Dorsett, Darrelle Revis, Jon Baldwin, Tommie Campbell and Sean Gilbert to the league via the Panthers.

That connection made Aliquippa a tough place for the Mountaineers to gain a foothold. According to Gibson, the last member of the Quips to come to Morgantown prior to Henry and Fields was Chuck Fisher, in 1995.

"Pitt built a fence around [Aliquippa] and set

up their pipeline," Central Valley High (Monaca) football coach Mark Lyons said. "For West Virginia to pull not one, but two marquee guys from there is big time. Those are big pickups. That says a lot about the job [WVU] is doing."

WVU's efforts in the area haven't gone unrecognized.

"Anytime you're able to go into someone's backyard like that, of course people are going to take notice," said Leonard, who is now on WVU's staff as a graduate assistant. "Kids are talking about it, people at the barber shop are talking about it, and you can bet every college coach that's been trying to get into Aliquippa is talking about it."

"What 'Gibby' did (in signing Henry and Fields) was a real noticeable thing, but it shows what a hard worker he is. He's been trying to get kids out of Aliquippa for years and, with time and patience, it finally paid off."

### Gibson/Bradley duo

Gibson's recruiting ability already made WVU a threat in Western Pennsylvania, but the addition of senior associate head coach Tom Bradley, in February, gave the Mountaineers a 1-2 punch on the recruiting trail.

Bradley, a Johnstown, Pa., native, worked the Western Pennsylvania circuit for more than three decades at Penn State (1980-2011). He and Gibson bumped heads as rivals going toe-to-toe for the same recruits.

With both now working on the same side, WVU coaches hope their pull in Western Pennsylvania grows exponentially.

"It's really opened some doors," Gibson said.

"Bradley has certain guys that he knows very well and I've got some guys that I know really well. And now instead of recruiting against each other, we're on the same team."

"We work well together," Bradley agreed. "We can compare notes and contacts so that we can divide things up depending on who is a better fit for that particular recruit. Between the two of us, we have a lot of experience in the area and we both work hard at it. And it's worked out well so far."

High school coaches have taken note.

Lyons, who coaches WVU target Jordan Whitehead at Central Valley, joked that adding Bradley almost gives the Mountaineers an unfair advantage in Western Pennsylvania.

"It's like adding another cleanup hitter to your lineup," Lyons said with a laugh. "But yes, it gives West Virginia an advantage, plain and simple. Tony and Tom are cut from the same cloth, they both understand Western Pennsylvania and they know what's important to kids and people in this region."

Guy Montecalvo, who was Mozes' high school coach at Washington and now serves as the athletic director for Canon-McMillan High, in Canonsburg, is familiar and impressed with Gibson and Bradley.

"You team up Gibson and Bradley, and West Virginia just may put a real stranglehold on recruiting in Western Pennsylvania," Montecalvo said.

### Changing times

WVU still has to clear the out-of-state stigma when recruiting, though the pressure to stay local

might not be what it was when regional rivalries helped shape the recruiting landscape. But the Mountaineers' success in Western Pennsylvania (and those players' success in Morgantown) is a tool WVU's recruiters can use to their advantage.

"There's no doubt about it," Gibson said. "Anytime you can point to a guy like Major Harris, everyone knows him. If you look at that list (of WVU players from Western Pennsylvania), almost every single guy that came out of that area hasn't just played for us, they've been major contributors for us."

"And the guys we have now, they're going to be major contributors before their careers are over. Some sooner than others, but they all will. And we feel like we're getting good quality kids, too. We're not going up there to sign just anybody: These guys are going to have major roles here."

Logan, a Pittsburgh product, wanted to play for the Panthers but wasn't offered a scholarship to Pitt. While injuries limited Logan's career in Morgantown, he was good enough to go in the second round of the 1997 NFL draft and was recently selected to the WVU Sports Hall of Fame.

"I was born and bred to be a Pittsburgh guy," he said, "and I grew up idolizing players like Dan Marino and Tony Dorsett. I wanted to go to the University of Pittsburgh. I wanted to be a Pitt Panther. But when they didn't offer me a full scholarship, I said, 'OK, I'm going to go to their biggest rival and just kill them for four years.' And

what better school than West Virginia, with the Backyard Brawl, to go and play against those guys?"

WVU went against Pitt during Logan's collegiate career, with Logan recording a career-best nine tackles in the Backyard Brawl as a junior.

That didn't make things any easier at home, where the WVU-Pitt border battle was in full swing.

"It caused some grief on game days," Logan said of his allegiance to WVU. "My whole family is die-hard Pittsburgh sports fans, but when, I went to West Virginia my dad said, 'That's my son and I'm going to cheer for his team.' You can imagine the family feuds that almost started."

**Future focus**

Coaches admit Western Pennsylvania isn't producing the quantity of Division I talents it once did. New hotbeds, such as South Florida, have been more reliable for WVU recruiting in recent years.

WVU hasn't played Pitt since 2011 — and no future meetings have been established — but the Mountaineers remain committed to finding talent just north of the border.

"There's no question about it. That whole region is still very important to us," Bradley said.

"Anytime you go into a school with that 'WV' on your shirt, they know who you are and they know about your school," Gibson said. "They have a connection to it. Dravon Henry was a national recruit, he had more than 40 offers, but we got in there early and built that relationship with him and his family."

"He and [Fields] got along great with our staff and understood what we were trying to do. Not that anybody else didn't do it the right way, but I just think that we outworked people when it came to recruiting Dravon and Jaleel. They trusted what we were selling."

Trust may be the biggest factor of all. That's what Bradley and Gibson know they must earn as the Mountaineers continue to expand their reach in Western Pennsylvania.

"That's the Big 2 right there," Leonard said of Gibson and Bradley. "It's a huge bonus as far as recruiting goes. Bradley is a guru and Gibby just goes out and gets it done. Put those guys together and I think you'll see a lot of the top talent in that area coming to West Virginia in the next couple of years."

One standout member of the Cee-Bees' team is Hannah Carreon, who will be a junior this coming year.

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## 2nd Wimbledon title for Kvitova

LONDON — Petra Kvitova plays so much better at the All England Club than anywhere else, and now she owns two championships to prove it.

In one of the most dominant performances in a women's final at Wimbledon, the sixth-seeded Kvitova of the Czech Republic overpowered and overwhelmed 13th-seeded Eugenie Bouchard, of Canada, 6-3, 6-0 in only 55 minutes Saturday to add to her 2011 title at the grass-court Grand Slam.

"I know," Kvitova said, "this is the best tournament for me."

Absolutely true. Her career record of 26-5 at Wimbledon translates to an .839 winning percentage, compared to her marks of .667 at the three other majors and .681 at all other events.

In 2014, Kvitova lost in the first round at the hard-court Australian Open, and in the third round at the clay-court French Open. But get her on the grass court, and those speedy serves and flat forehands really shine.

"For sure, she was on," Bouchard said. "We know that when she's on, she's very tough to beat. Especially on this surface."

On Saturday, the 24-year-old Kvitova certainly was "on." Oh, was she ever. Pretty much perfect in every way.

The left-hander hit serves that reached 113 mph and earned easy points. Walloped big, deep returns that left Bouchard little time to react. Smacked flat groundstrokes off both wings that zipped right where she in-

tended, often skidding near lines, helping accumulate a 28-8 edge in winners. Won 11 of 14 points she played at the net.

Most surprisingly, even to Kvitova herself, was the way she motored around the Centre Court grass with her right thigh heavily bandaged, displaying defensive skill that she's not necessarily known for. It was telling that Bouchard lost in such a lopsided manner despite four unforced errors.

"I mean, (a) few shots was really incredible, and I really couldn't believe that I made it, actually," said Kvitova, who was within two points of defeat against Venus Williams in the third round. "I said, 'Oh, my God, this is good!'"

The match was played under a heavy cover of clouds, and it seemed as if Bouchard's best chance to regroup would be a rain delay. "I don't know," Bouchard's mother, Julie Leclair, said, "if there was much she could've done."

A shower arrived minutes after the brief-possible final concluded. Before the trophy presentation, the retractable roof was closed, and both players left the court for a bit.

## Defense stands up, Argentina into semis

BRASILIA, Brazil — This time for Argentina, it was less about Lionel Messi and more about the men behind him.

Argentina made the semifinals of the World Cup for the first time in 24 years on Saturday as stubborn defending and clever tactics overcame Belgium in a tight 1-0 victory.

Before the quarterfinals, Messi's magic had bailed out the team as it labored unimpressively through the group stage and past Switzerland in the second round, relying on four goals

and a couple of assists from its playmaking superstar.

But coach Alejandro Sabella's strategy appeared to work at Brasilia's Estadio Nacional as Argentina scored early and then outmaneuvered a Belgium team that was left completely frustrated.

Belgium coach Marc Wilmots criticized Argentina as "an ordinary team" that relied on a couple of attacking players and mostly defense, built on the back four and combative midfielders Lucas Biglia and Javier Mascherano.

It was good enough to beat Belgium, though, and might be the key to Argentina overcoming more impressive teams in the last

four of the World Cup as the South Americans go in search of a third title, but first since 1986.

### Netherlands 0 Costa Rica 0 (4-3 shootout)

SALVADOR, Brazil — Late substitute Tim Krul made two saves in a 4-3 penalty shootout victory over Costa Rica to give the Netherlands a spot in the World Cup semifinals following a 0-0 draw.

Krul, who came on in the 120th minute, stopped shots from Bryan Ruiz and Michael Umana in the shootout.

The Dutch team will face Argentina in the semifinals Wednesday, in Sao Paulo.

## Volquez helps Pirates beat Phillies

ST. LOUIS — Pinch-hitter Jeff Baker's RBI hit with two outs in the ninth inning helped Miami rally to beat the St. Louis Cardinals 6-5 on Saturday.

The win snapped a seven-game home losing streak for the Twins against the Yankees and was just Minnesota's fourth win against New York in 17 games at Target Field.

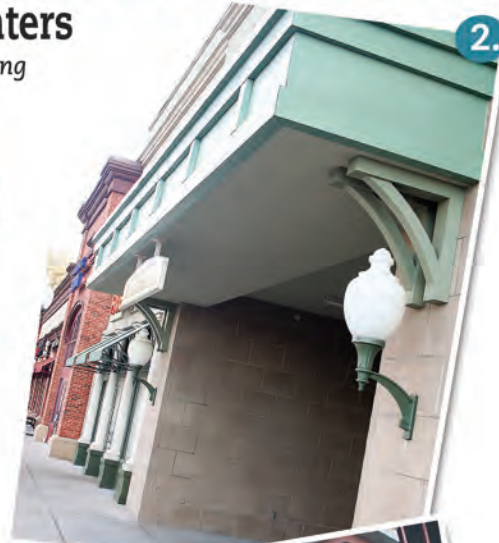

# Wildlife habitat, timber management go hand-in-hand

**RECENTLY**, it seems like every week you can watch the news and see a wild-fire burning out of control somewhere in this country. Granted, these fires can do a lot of damage, but a lot of good can come out of them too.

I was near Yellowstone National Park several years ago when that huge fire roared through the park. When I was back out there a couple of years later, it was amazing to see all of the

grasses and small pines that had begun to grow. Actually, it's fire that causes the seeds to come out of the pinecones and begin to grow.

Controlled burning is a very common wildlife habitat management practice in the southern pine forests, but can also be used in the northern hardwoods. The Indians used fire to create better hunting and getting rid of undesired species so that

they could farm. The colonists picked up on this practice and continued it.

Prescribed burns are also used to clear out dead and dry underbrush that causes these massive wild-fires to spread so quickly. When there's less fuel, the fire can be contained much faster.

Using fire as a management technique is not something we should attempt on our own. You should obtain the services of a qualified individual to take care of it. This person will help you establish your goals and objectives and prepare a burning plan. Different objectives can require burning at different times.

Weather is the most im-

portant thing when it comes to having a successful burn. The three top things that the fire professional will look at are the wind direction and speed, the relative humidity and the temperature. If any one of these three things goes awry, your burn can be a failure.

A cool winter fire will not harm the large trees, but will kill the smaller ones along with vines and shrubs. In the spring, these plants will sprout back and provide tender browse and cover for the wildlife. The fire will also improve the germination of legumes and forbs.

Another positive aspect of using fire as a management tool is the cost. It's

far cheaper to use fire than it is to purchase herbicides. The heavy use of many different herbicides to kill a wide variety of plants will significantly diminish the wildlife habitat. The use of chemicals can create other environmental risks and damage to the soil.

Actually, wildlife habitat management and timber management go hand-in-hand. When timber management is used to enhance wildlife habitat, a diversity of habitat types is created. If a stand of timber is left to mature with no cutting, this diversity is eventually lost. This results in the forest not being able to support various and abundant

wildlife species.

As landowners, do we actually "own" the land? Yes, we may have title to it or the exclusive rights to use it, but the reality of the situation is that all we really have is the opportunity to make decisions on how it will be managed during the relatively short time that we have it. If all you want to see is a lot of huge trees with very little or no wildlife around, just let the forest grow because that's the way it will eventually end up. If you want to see a variety of wildlife, cut and burn from time to time.

# After Cavendish falls, Kittel wins 1st Tour stage

**HARROGATE**, England — Germany's Marcel Kittel won the first stage of the Tour de France for a second straight year after a late crash brought down British rival Mark Cavendish in the presence of royals on Saturday.

Kittel, who earned four Tour stages in 2013, won the 118-mile run in mainly bucolic Yorkshire countryside from Leeds to Harrogate. The German raised his arms skyward and cried after he edged Peter Sagan, of Slovakia, in second, and Ramunas Navardauskas, of Lithuania, in third.

"I am incredibly proud of this victory," Kittel, a Team Giant-Shimano rider who also won two Giro d'Italia stages in May, said

through a translator. "It happened pretty easily. It was like coming out of a tunnel. I was able to accelerate like never before.

"It's really awesome. De-ja vu, yeah."

The two top favorites for victory in the three-week race, Alberto Contador and Chris Froome, finished safely in the trailing pack that clocked the same time as Kittel: 4 hours, 44 minutes.

With fewer than 400 meters to go, and the speedsters rushing ahead, Cavendish veered slightly to his left and bumped Australia's Simon Gerrans. The two crashed alone, with Cavendish landing hard on his right shoulder.

Cavendish got up gingerly and cruised over the finish line — cradling his right arm. X-rays revealed he separated his right shoulder, the tour said in a statement.

His Omega Pharma QuickStep team spokesman Alessandro Tegner did not

immediately comment about whether Cavendish would remain in the race.

According to Patrick

Lefevere, Cavendish's team manager, Gerrans slowed down in front of him, and he couldn't get out of the way. "(Cavendish) was so

sure that he would win that he probably made a mistake. He wanted to get out, he pushed, Gerrans pushed back, and they crashed,"

Lefevere said.

Many British fans were hoping for a win by Cavendish, a native of the Isle of Man, whose mother is from Harrogate. Prime Minister David Cameron, Princes William and Harry, and Kate, Duchess of Cambridge, were on hand among throngs of British fans who lined the route — a testament to the cycling craze in the U.K.

England hosts the first three stages of this 101st Tour before riders enter France on Tuesday. In all, the 198 riders will cover 2,277 miles of road before the July 27 finish in Paris. Stage 2 on Sunday covers 201 kilometers from York to Sheffield, in southern Yorkshire.

Cavendish previously said that winning the first Tour stage was his main goal this year. He was hoping to capture his first yellow jersey and his 26th Tour stage win.

## Do better by all children

Humanitarian crisis on our border cries for attention

The wish to give our children a better, safer life is not some liberal or conservative concept.

Nor is that desire just confined to America's shores and borders.

It's embodied in every family's hope for the future, from Azerbaijan to New Zealand.

Since the start of the federal fiscal year — Oct. 15, 2013 — this yearning has led families in Central America to risk the lives of at least 40,000 children as of June 15 in a perilous passage to the United States.

That compares to 2013's entire total of 20,000 unaccompanied Central American children taken into custody on U.S. soil.

Some suggest sending them back to their families immediately. However, U.S. immigration law prohibits turning away any children who are from noncontiguous countries.

For now, these children from Central America are held for awhile, then released to family members or foster families to await an immigration court hearing.

Some appear for these hearings and others don't.

The latest figures indicate the overall system is already choked with more than 300,000 such cases.

Though we're certain all too many people's first thought will be to politicize this issue, we will not.

This situation on our southern border is a humanitarian crisis, not a political one.

That's not to say that comprehensive immigration reform is not urgently needed.

However, under these circumstances, ensuring these children's health and safety is needed more.

That means something more than a thick, glass-enclosed holding area in white-washed cinder block rooms.

It also means ending the extreme overcrowding that is prevalent in these facilities. Sanitation must also be a priority in such crowded conditions.

Clearly, Washington needs to act immediately.

Not only by appropriating more public funds to house and feed these children, but also to adjudicate their cases in a speedy fashion.

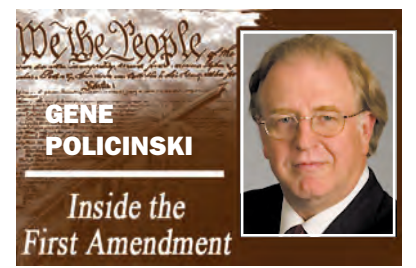
It's also incumbent on social networks, especially churches, nonprofits, child advocacy and civic groups, and others who care about children to step up now, too.

This may not be the welcome Latino parents were expecting for their children or the kind of welcome we would normally extend to any child.

But to think putting children in the hands of smugglers and sending them to an uncertain life here is better and safer than what these children come from puts this issue in perspective.

These are children — alone, scared, bewildered — and now wards of a system that's ill-equipped to adequately care for them, after all.

The best we can do is to do better by them.



## Just 45 words protecting our core freedoms

**C'MON PEOPLE — IT'S JUST 45 WORDS!**

We'll even give you the Twitter version: Freedom of Religion, Speech, Press, Assembly and Petition.

There, a whole lesson in what it means to be a citizen of the United States — and the answers to some of the questions on the actual test that you have to pass to become a citizen.

Perhaps that's why 29 percent of respondents to the 2014 State of the First Amendment survey couldn't name one — they don't have to. Those of us living in the U.S. enjoy its protection of our core freedoms by virtue of living here.

And while it's valuable to know what the five freedoms are — once again: Religion, speech, press, assembly and petition — it's even more important to know how we can use them, and how to defend them if someone means to restrict or take away those basic rights.

Clearly, we care about the freedoms — for many years in the annual national survey of adults, conducted since 1997 by the Newsweek Institute's First Amendment Center, respondents have said by a ratio of about 2 to 1 that the First Amendment does not go too far in the rights it guarantees. This year, 57 percent said the amendment has it right, while 38 percent disagreed.

Of course, those of us in the "First Amendment business" are worried about this year's 38 percent who said it does go too far. That means about one-third of our fellow citizens would rein in one of our basic freedoms — freedoms which we have preserved essentially intact since 1791.

It appears that the news media and the concept of religious liberty are most at issue:

While just 33 percent of survey respondents said the news media try to report the news without bias, 80 percent said it's important for the news media to act as a watchdog on government, and a majority (54 percent) does not favor court orders forcing journalists to reveal their sources.

Some 61 percent of those responding said that religious-affiliated groups should be required to provide health care benefits to same-sex partners of employees, even if the group opposes same-sex marriages or partnerships, while 54 percent said businesses providing wedding services should be required to serve same-sex couples even if the business owner had religious objections to such marriages. But 66 percent also said that since the Supreme Court has held that corporations, like people, have certain free speech rights, corporations similarly should have certain religious rights.

This year's survey shows that the highest number of respondents could identify "speech" (68 percent) and "religion" (29 percent) as two of the five freedoms — both highest in the history of the survey — but the numbers were the same as in 2013 for "press" (14 percent) and lower for assembly (7 percent) and petition (1 percent) than in 2013.

This year's survey demonstrates that more Americans are backing free expression in areas of our society that have not always enjoyed popular support, from students to same-sex couples. And while people may not see journalists today as unbiased, there's still great endorsement of the role of a free press, from being a "watchdog" to the use of confidential sources in performing that role.

Knowing our freedoms is a good thing. Supporting them, using them and protecting them — and renewing our commitment to those efforts as we celebrate our nation's independence once again — are even better.

I understand the idea of a cost-benefit analysis, such as travel time-savings. However, all costs need to be considered, including the public good of safe, pleasant streets.

When people like me avoid coming downtown because large trucks make it difficult to drive, expose my young children to cancer-causing diesel exhaust and make it unsafe to walk on sidewalks, money I would have otherwise spent at local businesses is lost to out-of-town corporations.

Please understand that I realize that everyone else has a right to make a living.

That said, without a union for the truck drivers, no one else is going to prevent companies from forcing drivers on a route physically

unsafe for the truck, the driver (in case of accident) and pedestrians.

Interestingly enough, unionized companies like UPS set up distribution points, where smaller trucks deliver the dispersed load. This is why you do not see UPS delivering downtown with its 18-wheelers. They know the truck will not fit, and if it did, it would be rude to try.

In this country, corporations may legally be "people," but driving on a public road is a privilege.

Privilege can be limited, restricted or revoked altogether — and when a small proportion of the traffic makes life so unpleasant and even unsafe for the rest of us, I support limiting privileges.

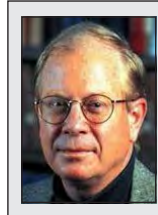
I support the Safe Streets Morgantown movement, and I hope you do, too.

# A replay of history

The American way of war: It just might surprise you

**WHEN YOU STUDY** how the U.S. goes to war, there is a prevalent though not perfect pattern. The triggering event is often a sudden crisis that galvanizes popular opinion and becomes the immediate occasion for military intervention but subsequently is exposed as a misguided perception or outright fabrication.

The Mexican War began when President Polk cited an attack on American troops in Texas — troops he had deliberately placed there to provoke Mexico. The Spanish American War began when President McKinley claimed that the battleship Maine had been blown up by Spanish saboteurs; subsequent investigations showed that the explosion originated inside the ship, probably due to an accidental fire in the munitions compartment.

More recently, the Vietnam War moved into high gear when President Lyndon B. Johnson used an

incident in the Gulf of Tonkin to justify massive military intervention in Southeast Asia. The incident occurred in disputed waters, and one supposed gunboat attack never really happened. The enemy might very well

have been a pod of whales.

This pattern is not perfect. The Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor was not a figment of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's imagination. Nor have subsequent conspiracy theories arguing that he was willfully negligent, searching for a "back door to war" against Germany, stood the test of time.

American military intervention in Iraq, however, fits the pattern perfectly. As we watch the enormous U.S. investment in blood and treasure during the past 11 years dissolve in Iraq, history requires that we remember the reasons we went to war, why they were untrue, and why the current sectarian chaos in Iraq was always both predictable and inevitable.

President George W. Bush, apparently persuaded by the unburdened convictions of Vice President Dick Cheney, argued that Saddam Hussein possessed weapons of mass destruction, including a nuclear capacity, and that there were clear connections between Iraq and the al-Qaida terrorists responsible for the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Both claims were concocted.

But the dark shadow of 9/11 hung ominously over all deliberations in that moment, so the CIA bent the arc of the evidence to fit the fab-

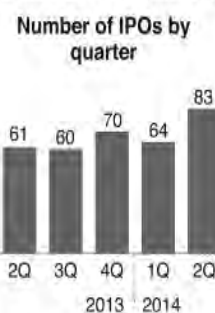

If it feels like every day a new company lists its stock for the first time, that's because it's close to the truth. Last quarter, 83 companies made initial public offerings of their stock, according to Renaissance Capital. That's an average of about six per week, and it's the highest number since the third quarter of 2000, when the market was in the midst of the dot-com bubble.

Expect the trend to continue. Last quarter, 117 companies made the initial filings for an IPO, the most in any quarter since 2004. A surge of Chinese companies listing on U.S. markets helped to lift the total: Last quarter 10 Chinese companies went public. Among the anticipated deals: Alibaba, the Chinese Internet giant.



CRUDE FEARS

The stock market doesn't seem too worried about the rising price of oil. The Standard & Poor's 500 index has been setting record highs even though crude recently topped \$107 per barrel, up from a low of \$95 at the start of the year. But conditions that could push oil higher keep piling up:

Violence in Iraq is threatening supplies right when an accelerating global economy seems set to stoke demand. Add on top of that the normal seasonal summer uptick for oil demand, and the risk of a price spike is higher than at any point since the start of the financial crisis, Barclays analysts say.



PAYOUT

Dividends keep piling up. Last quarter, companies in the S&P 500 paid out a total of \$10.2 billion, an 18 percent jump from a year earlier. That's enough to buy all the shares of Cheese-cake Factory at its current stock price, with enough left over to buy Foot Locker to burn off the calories. Investors have been eager to collect dividends, given how low bond yields are. And companies have been raising those payouts due to their strengthening profits.

George Stropoulos Title: Founder and CEO of Fullscreen His outlook: Offers insight on the developing world of online video.

Large media companies like Disney, Time Warner and DreamWorks Animation are starting to look to YouTube channel operators for a creative spark and access to young audiences.

After Disney's recent acquisition of Maker Studios and DreamWorks' purchase of AwesomenessTV, industry watchers are wondering whether channel network Fullscreen might be next.

The network has 40,000 content creators, 425 million subscribers and generates 3.5 billion views each month. In June of last year, it scored a reported \$30 million in investment from media companies The Chernin Group, Comcast and advertising agency group WPP.

Fullscreen founder and CEO George Stropoulos recently spoke with The Associated Press.

What is your vision for Fullscreen?

We started the company to empower the next generation of content creators. We're supporting about 40,000 creators around the world. That grows by hundreds per day. Directionally we like to say we're going to create the next Viacom, the next NBCUniversal, the next Disney.

Do you need investment?

No. We raised capital last year and now we're a profitable business.

When do you say, 'We are as big as Viacom?'

It's tough to know. It's never going to be an apples-to-apples comparison because we're talking about views in social video. We may say, 'We have a billion views.' And they may say, 'Well, what are they worth?'

What will it take for advertisers to shift TV spending to online video?

The media business has changed. Creative is coming from all around the world now. Fullscreen is at the epicenter of that. There's a strong degree of interest from traditional media, including the big studios. They're taking note of where youth are spending their time. The dollars follow the eyeballs and they want to be part of that.

Someone told me that a media buyer can wake up at 8 a.m., plan out their TV media buy, be in the office by 9 a.m. and do something different. It's established, turnkey, you're buying spots and dots. When you come into the world of digital media, it's fragmented. There are different ad formats, platforms, creators.

The desire is there but you have that kind of tyranny of choice. As the format simplifies and the industry standardizes, that will get better and better.

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) is seeking grant proposals to award up to \$1.5 million to for-profit and nonprofit service providers, such as universities, trade and professional associations, firms and other organizations.

The grants are for special projects to promote the development, success and long-term survival of small disadvantaged businesses participating in the agency's 8(a) Business Development Program.

SBA expects to award six to 10 grants in the range of \$150,000-\$250,000, and up to two awards may be made to small businesses. Applications will be accepted through July 20, and awards will be issued by Sept. 30.

Specifically, SBA is seeking unique and innovative projects to provide specialized training, executive education and tools to promote business development of eligible firms. However, grants cannot be used by small businesses as a

source of funding to expand their enterprise.

Through these projects, the SBA intends to increase the range of services available to eligible firms by addressing many issues facing them, including

- teaming with other businesses;
- mastering the process of federal contracting;
- reversing declines and turning around businesses; and
- securing loan financing or private equity funding.

To submit a proposal for funding under this initiative, an applicant

- may be a for-profit or not-for-profit entity;
- must have been in existence continually for at least three years;
- must demonstrate substantive experience dealing with issues relating to small business; and
- must demonstrate that it has the capacity to provide assistance to small businesses.

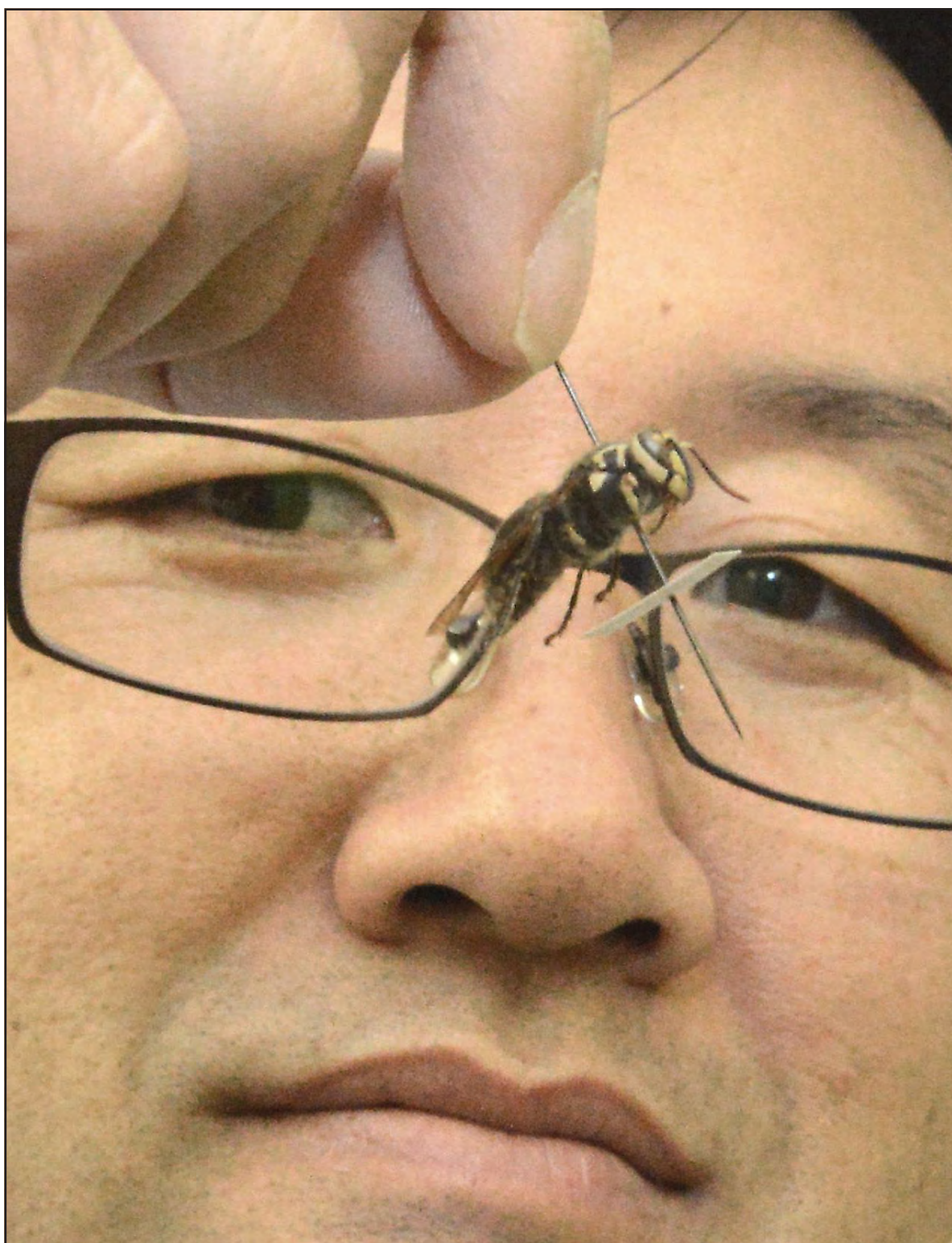

Beware. Warmer weather does not just bring the people outdoors; it also brings about an array of bugs and insects and the hazards they bring during the summer months throughout the Mountain State.

Late spring and early summer brings an increase in wildlife, which stays at a high level throughout the summer, said Susan Oleott, district wildlife diversity biologist for the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (DNR).

"Most insects are not dangerous, but the ones that are aggressive are the ones around their nests and are only life-threatening to those people who have an allergy to them," Oleott said.

However, although most bugs and insects may not be too dangerous, Oleott said it doesn't mean any bug or insect should be taken lightly, especially wasps.

"Paper wasps are starting to

## Web of confusion: The real story about W.Va.'s spiders

They may look scary, but for the most part, spiders are harmless, said Vicki Kondo, a research assistant in entomology at WVU. Even, she said, the ones that have a venomous bite.

In West Virginia, there is only one type of poisonous spider: The black widow.

While it's often believed that the brown recluse can be found here, Kondo and Jim Amrine, emeritus professor of entomology at WVU, said the only reasons you might find one are probably coincidental.

"I don't think we have reason to believe that they're here and breeding yet," Kondo said. In fact, many people may

mistake another spider for the dreaded brown recluse. And while this little guy can bite and cause quite an uncomfortable bite mark, the yellow sac spider is harmless, for the most part.

Out in the woods, you might see larger arachnids, such as wolf and fishing spiders, that may look intimidating, Kondo said, but they're pretty harmless.

### Black widow

Characterized by its black coloring and highlighted by a red or orange hourglass shape on its belly, the black widow hides in rock and wood piles or old buildings, Kondo said. It's a fairly small spider;

## Ticked off: Prevent a tick attack

Three types of ticks, three potential diseases.

Here in West Virginia, when traversing the hilly, grassy and wooded areas of the Mountain State, there are three main tick types to watch out for: Dog, deer and Lone Star ticks.

Each type has its own risks of disease if you're bitten, said Jim Amrine, emeritus professor of entomology at WVU.

Those main diseases are Lyme, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and Ehrlichiosis.

"All three of these diseases, the ticks, when they hatch, pick up the disease by biting mice," Amrine said.

If you do get bitten, Amrine said, don't panic. If you develop any symptoms of disease, see a doctor and tell them about the tick bite. Even if you do contract one of the diseases, Amrine said, they are all treatable with antibiotics.

And the incidence of all three diseases is fairly low, Amrine said.

### Deer tick, Ixodes Scapularis

"This tick is widely distributed in the northeastern and upper midwestern United States," the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention said.

"It's been quite rare in this area," Amrine added, "but now we're starting to see more of them," in areas such as Pittsburgh and Chestnut Ridge Park.

The deer tick can carry Lyme disease, so if you have been bitten, remove it carefully, put it in a vial or bottle, keep it dry and take it with you to a doctor.

"You don't want to take a chance with that pathogen, if it settles in," Amrine said.

## Harley-Davidson helps to put electric motorcycles in spotlight

PRINCETON, N.Y. — When Maggie McNally-Bradshaw and husband Curt hop on their electric motorcycles and twist the throttles, they get a rush like no other.

Or maybe a WHOOSH! "There is that sense of being at the beginning of something new, and part of our future as far as ecology," said McNally-Bradshaw, chairwoman of the American Motorcyclist Association. "People think it's novel. Then they realize it's powerful stuff. The technology is improving by leaps and bounds. It's coming."

While startups like Zero, Brammo and Mission are producing state-of-the-art electric motorcycles on the West Coast, Harley-Davidson has decided to jump into the fray. The Milwaukee-based manufacturer announced its LiveWire this month and plans to offer demo rides to gauge interest nationwide before going into production.

"We don't see it at all replacing internal combustion," Harley President Matt Levatich said. "I mean, maybe in 100 or 50 years, I don't know. We'll be

open to what people want."

Still, while Harley's announcement may not sit well with its core riders, who relish the distinctive rumble of the V-twin engine's exhaust, it might provide the impetus needed for the electric market to take off.

"We had our biggest single day of Internet traffic in the history of the company the day Harley made its announcement," said Scot Harden, vice president of

global marketing for Zero Motorcycles, which began in a Santa Cruz, Calif., garage in 2006 and now is the top seller of full-size, high-powered electric bikes. "It just validates what we've been saying and how it's going to play out in the years ahead."

A recent study by Navigant Research suggests the industry is at the start of a trend. The research company anticipates sales of

electric motorcycles worldwide will grow to 1.2 million this year.

No surprise that Yamaha, Honda and KTM also have electric bikes in the pipeline.

"It seems that electric motorcycles are going to be a pretty important mainstay," said Jerry Phibbs Jr., a longtime motorcycle dealer in Albany who sold all four of the Zero bikes on the showroom floor this year.

## Cat's fascination with water could be dangerous

**Q: My cat seems happy, but sometimes it's like she wants to commit suicide. Whenever I take a bath, she jumps into the tub. Then she screams as if she can't get out. We've tried to keep her out of the bathroom, but she's determined. Does she have a psychological problem? — N.P., Niagara Falls, N.Y.**

**A:** Your cat is apparently smitten with running water. New York City-based certified cat behavior consultant Beth Adelman suggests, "The running water stimulates the cat to jump, then she immediately realizes she's made a terrible mistake. Unfortunately, your cat isn't learning from previous experience, but her intent isn't to kill herself, I'm certain."

Perhaps, you can keep her out of the bathroom by having someone distract her with toys. Or, Adelman suggests, if you keep her out of the bathroom when

the water is running, odds are when you do let her in she won't be as interested in taking a bathtub dive.

By the way, it's important to know how your cat feels about water and the tub. Never leave her in the bathroom without supervision when water is running in the tub. Indeed, once in the water, she may not be able to get out.

**Q: My 6-month-old kitten will chew on just about anything. I'm careful to make sure she doesn't harm herself. Is there something cats can chew that's safe, similar to rawhide for dogs? — H.S., Baltimore, Md.**

**A:** If your kitty begins to nibble through a live wire, the consequences

could be deadly. For starters, consider buying electrical cord protectors, available at home improvement and many "big box" stores, or online. Remove as many plants in your home as possible, as gnawing foliage may cause an upset tummy or worse.

Ask your veterinarian about C.E.T. chews, specifically made for cats to chew on for dental benefits. Some cats like the large canine meatball-size dental chews from Royal Canin or Hill's Pet Nutrition. You might even go as far as stuffing the chews into a small dog Kong toy.

A small percentage of cats will chew on rawhide for dogs. Moisten the rawhide just a bit, then warm it slightly in the microwave.

## WVU medical director shares summer safety tips

**FROM HIKING ADVENTURES** to beach vacations to family barbecues, summer is a great time to be outdoors. But summer is also a time when many Americans get injured. Here are some summer safety tips from Owen Lander, MD, medical director of the Emergency Department at WVU Healthcare.

■ Wear protective gear. Whether you're hopping on a bike, motorcycle or all-terrain vehicle, using power equipment, or spending time on the water, always wear the appropriate gear to protect your body.

"Sprains, broken bones, lacerations, cuts — or worse — can be avoided if people take the time to put on a helmet, safety glasses, padding and other protective gear," said Dr. Lander. He also recommends life jackets when boating. "No one who has ever benefited from protective gear was planning on things going wrong," he said.

■ Watch out for poison ivy. "Poison ivy and oak are common this time of year," explained Lander. "You can practice prevention by thoroughly cleansing the exposed area with soap and water immediately after contact; this may help."

Once the rash presents itself, there is no cure, only efforts to relieve symptoms. Oatmeal baths and cool compresses, as well as over-the-counter anti-itch medications can help. If the rash is widespread and there are signs of infection, your doctor may prescribe an oral corticosteroid or oral antibiotic.

■ Bee-aware. Treatment for most stings consists of cool compresses to the area. You should also remove the stinger. Antihistamines, such as Benadryl, are helpful. Keep in mind that most anaphylactic-type reactions occur within the first three to four hours, specifically within the first 30 minutes. If an individual experiences massive hives, itching, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, the patient needs to be transported to the emergency department immediately. Lander says that anyone can have a severe allergic reaction, so seek immediate care for any significant symptoms. If you have an Epi-Pen prescription, obtain enough to always have one with you

— at home, in the car and during travel.

■ Love the skin you're in. Despite the plethora of sunscreens available, severe sunburns and the side effects, including nausea, fatigue, blisters and infection, are still a fairly common occurrence in the emergency department.

According to Lander, "Consult a doctor if a severe sunburn covers a large portion of your body with blisters, or is accompanied by high fever or severe pain." Some remedies for less severe sun-

burns include keeping the burns cool and moist, avoiding repeat exposure, and taking an over-the-counter pain medication. Lander suggests leaving blisters intact.

■ Stay hydrated. Even if you don't think you are losing water because you're not sweating buckets, the outside temperature and sun, as well as your activity level, contribute to dehydration and the risk of heat stroke. While grabbing a cold beverage seems like a tasty way to keep hydrated, Lander maintains that water and sport drinks are always your best option. "Keep in mind that soda and caffeinated drinks, as well as alcohol, are diuretics, which means they encourage the body to lose more water than it retains."

■ Fire safety isn't just for third graders. "We often treat patients who have burned or injured themselves while manning the grill, or lighting or cooking on a campfire," said Lander. "We're not suggesting that people refrain from these activities, but we are encouraging them to be smart. Stay alert and within your faculties, use proper equipment and follow instructions."

## Do things differently to solve a problem

**Q: My stepdaughter has been in and out of trouble for 13 years. Of the 18 years I've known her, she's deceived everyone she comes in contact with. She gave up all three of her children to their father 13 years ago.**

**She's bounced from one man to another and is now on her second marriage to a man who's been in trouble half his life. She'll turn 45 this December and is now in jail for the second time (that we know of). When she wasn't happy in New York, she fled with someone to Virginia.**

**She seems to need us only when she's low on money. Now she thinks we should send her \$300 monthly because nobody else will, while she is in jail. (Shortly after her arrest, her husband was also arrested.) She's even asked us to send her the money we usually give her for her birthday and Christmas now, claiming she'll never bother us again. My husband isn't happy about all of this, but he usually gives in and sends money.**

**I have two daughters, both in their 30s, who**

**have everything going for them and are never in trouble.**

**What advice would you have for us? — L., via cyberspace**

**A:** I'm sure you realize that your real question is not about whether or not to send your stepdaughter more money. Her problems are more psychological and spiritual than financial. Something has blocked and twisted her life into an orgy of self-destruction. One obvious culprit would be drugs. The obvious first step — which you could make a condition of sending her money — is for your stepdaughter to get a full psychiatric and medical work up and seek treatment at a good rehabilitation center.

Sending her money with no conditions makes you and your husband enablers, not parents, even if your intentions are born of love. But changing the direction

of her life when she's been off-track for so long won't be easy. Ultimately, your stepdaughter must choose the life she wants to live, and the choices she makes are, for the most part, beyond your control. If some day she expresses a desire to enter a rehab center near you, go pick her up that day!

I want to move outward and inward from your very personal family problem to what it might teach all of us about the choices we make. To do this, I'd like to introduce all of my readers to the best question I've ever heard in my life — one we must all ask, whether our lives are going great or we've hit some bumps in the road:

How long do you want to live like this?

That's it.

This question doesn't ask you to figure out why you're doing things that don't work out. It just points you to a different path. We always think we must understand why we mess up before we can change, but the truth is just the opposite. We can start doing things differently, then live our way into the answers of why we went astray.

All you and your step-

daughter have to do is say in a powerful and sincere voice: "No. I don't want to live this way one more minute!"

The question is also good because it works for happy people, too. If you want to live the way you're living forever, then do it! Continue to make the same choices about work, friends and family that you're making now.

Everything is about choosing, and the Biblical wisdom from Deuteronomy 30:19 is powerful and clear: "I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing; therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live."

Waiting is not choosing. Handwriting is not choosing. Choosing is turning around and walking in a different direction, which by the way is the exact meaning of the Hebrew word for repentance (teshuva). I pray that both you and your stepdaughter will choose a new way of life. I pray for all of us to choose, turn and live.

## Treatment for peanut allergy exposes kids to them

Nine-year-old Michael Lee, a bright boy who's bound for fifth grade in the fall, lives with a serious, life-threatening medical condition. He suffers from a peanut allergy, a growing menace that can make breathing a matter of wishful thinking and anaphylactic shock a horrifying possibility.

So why was Michael sitting at his family's kitchen table on a sunny and breezy morning last week, calmly and compliantly munching peanuts, one by one, with his mother standing by?

He was eating peanuts in hopes they would control his allergy to peanuts.

Counterintuitive? Yes. Medically risky? You bet. Brave? Definitely.

Michael is the first child in Sacramento selected for enrollment in a novel, new treatment for nut-allergic kids. Developed by allergists at Mercy Medical Group, it's the first such program to be rolled out in the region. It's called food oral immunotherapy or, more to the point, peanut desensitization.

Peanut allergies are exploding in number in babies and children. In response, Mercy developed the program to introduce nuts to young patients in very small doses, gradually increasing the child's exposure to try to lessen the body's immune system reaction to peanuts.

Since Michael was 4, he has been rushed to the emergency room a number

of times, said his mother, Geena Lee. First, for throat discomfort; then, head-toe hives; and finally, anaphylactic shock.

Lee said the family had two choices: One, to wait and hope Michael never has a lethal exposure to peanuts, a hold-your-breath option that breeds paranoia. Or they could weigh the risks and benefits of the new treatment and make an informed leap of faith.

"I don't see this as exposing him to something dangerous," Lee said. "I chose this treatment because the alternative is, what? To do nothing and be paranoid all the time?"

The science behind the

treatment is like inoculation. For instance, flu shots contain minute amounts of viruses to protect people from influenza, and allergy shots of pollen-based solutions ease the symptoms of seasonal outdoor allergy sufferers.

Here's the caveat: According to Mercy's allergists, the peanut desensitization program comes with "significant risk of a serious allergic reaction, including hives, swelling, bronchospasm, difficulty breathing, loss of consciousness and shock, which may necessitate emergency treatment and hospitalization." And, the unmentionable: risk of death.

Still, the pair of allergists

running the program, Drs. Rubina Inamdar and Binita Mandal, believe they've developed an air-tight protocol to prevent harm from coming to the dozen or so children they treat. Over 18 months, the two painstakingly reviewed research and protocols of a handful of similar programs across the country.

No one knows why food allergies — especially peanut allergies, considered the most dangerous — are growing at such a rapid pace. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that, from 1997 to 2011, food allergies grew in number by 50 percent from 3.4 percent to 5.1 percent of American children.

## Chiropractic judges your health through posture

**Q: I am the typical person to whom their mother always said "stand up straight or you'll be a hunchback." Well, I did not listen, and I have awful posture chronically now. **A:** Chiropractors, like your mother, warn their patients that incorrect posture can cause problems such as back and neck aches. Doctors of chiropractic can answer the question of how bad your posture is with a thorough examination.

If you look at the frontal view of a person with normal spinal alignment, the spine is straight. The head, shoulders, hips and

feet line up. When looking at a person from the side, the ears are back over the shoulders, and the shoulders are back over the pelvis.

However, the posture and spine are abnormal if:

■ The head is visibly tilted, shifted or rotated in one direction.  
■ The head juts out in front of the chest and shoulders.  
■ One hip is higher than the other, turned in one direction, or shifted to one side.  
■ One shoulder is high-

er than the other or turned in one direction, or the whole upper body is shifted to one side.

Abnormal posture may cause damage to your central nervous system, leading to pain, or worse, a chronic disconnect from your brain to the tissues those nerves from your spine ultimately go to innervate. A chiropractor can make spinal adjustments to reorient the body and eliminate musculoskeletal problems and free pressure from nerves.

This process is much faster for younger people, there is no doubt. They are much more pliable or plastic in nature and changes can still occur that are lifelong. Realize this kind of change happens well after most pain

is gone and takes time. Many people don't get pain until they are older and therefore do not ever address the problem.

Don't fret; changes can still occur if you are consistent with the tools and activities you are taught to do at home over many months and sometimes years. # Wedding fashions from 1800s to today featured

DENTON, Texas — Wedding dresses from the 19th century to the present day are featured in a new exhibit showcasing the changing styles of American brides, from a 1900s dress with a lace choker collar to a beaded flapper dress from the 1920s to a 1980s satin confection with an explosion of organdy ruffles.

More than 40 wedding gowns spanning from 1844 to last year are featured in the free exhibit that opened over the weekend in the North Texas city of Denton. Most of the dresses are from the University of North Texas' Texas Fashion Collection — which includes more than 20,000 historic clothing items, while others were loaned from private collections.

"It's going to bring up a lot of memories and sentiment," said exhibit organizer Myra Walker, director of the Texas Fashion Collection.

"American Brides: Inspiration and Ingenuity" runs through Oct. 24 at the Greater Denton Arts Council's Patterson-Appleton Center for the Visual Arts.

Walker said the exhibit not only shows the changing styles over the decades, but also highlights the elements that keep re-emerging. A Victor Costa-designed dress from 1993 for a wedding in Scotland with embroidered thistles features style elements from the late 1800s including a dust ruffle beneath the dress, covered buttons on the sleeves and a long train.

"It's got a 19th century flavor but it's really a 1990s dress," she said.

A gown from 1982 with billowing sleeves inspired by the dress Princess Diana wore the year earlier when she married Prince Charles stands beside a Gibson Girl-inspired gown from 1894 with similarly voluminous sleeves. Walker said American style began to come into its own beginning in the 1890s with illustrator Charles Dana Gibson's portrayal of American beauty.

"The show is not really about the white wedding dress, it's really about the essence of American style," said Walker, adding, "It is fashion history, social history, the birth of modern fashion and the birth of the American woman and the American woman becoming a fashion icon."

"It really is like a walk through fashion history," Walker said.

The exhibit also showcases dresses that stray from the traditional white, including an 1878 dress of deep plum silk satin featuring a boned bodice. "Everyone did not get married in a white wedding gown, often it was your best dress," Walker said.

Walker's own wedding dress from 1974 is part of the exhibit — an example of the earthy style of that decade. A neighbor made

the cotton dress with a fabric featuring tiny flowers from her outdoor wedding.

Dresses from last year include a strapless Michael Faircloth gown with a bodice featuring leather and a dress designed by Nardos Iman with a skirt of ostrich feathers.

A gown from 1952 of white cotton organdy embroidered with floral motifs was what Janie Stidham chose to wear to her 1994 wedding. She found the dress, featured in the exhibit along with one she designed, in a Dallas vintage store window after realizing she was too tall to wear her mother's teal-length wedding gown as she had planned and not finding exactly what she wanted in upscale stores around town.

"It was perfect because we were in this old chapel and we rode from the chapel to the reception in a 1930s limousine," she said.

When Stidham, an associate professor at UNT who teaches fashion design, created the 2007 gown for an Alaska wedding, she took inspiration from the location, choosing a gray satin fabric and embellishing the neck and

wrists with shredded silk and organza to evoke the icy surroundings.

Steven Porterfield, who owns Cat's Meow vintage store in the West Texas city of Midland and loaned several gowns from his collection, noted that wedding dresses have a special place in women's wardrobes: "That's one thing women keep," he said.

## In Mon County, 69 homes sold during June

**It's HARD** to believe that July 4th, our mid-summer holiday, has come and gone. That also means we are more than half way through 2014. I am beginning to wonder where 2014 went. This is also the time when we reflect on what the real estate market has done at the half way mark. We now have enough data to see how we compare to previous years accurately, and it also starts to paint the picture of what the market is for 2014. Before recapping the year, we must review June.

June was another strong month for single family detached home sales in Monongalia County. There were 69 single family detached houses sold in Monongalia County between \$75,000 and \$474,000. This is the highest number of sales in a month to date this year. The average sales price was \$236,403, while the median price hovered at \$228,000. The average days on market decreased to 56 days. This is most likely to be a result of many new listings selling quickly and the older existing inventory being picked over. The average days on market in May was 92.

Now that we have reviewed the month of June, let's evaluate the market year to date single family detached home sales. There have been 293 homes sold generating sales volume of \$67,934,715. The price range of homes sold has been between \$25,000 and \$672,500. The average sales price is \$231,859. The median sales price is \$220,000. The average list-to-sale ratio is 96.5 percent of the list price. The average days on market for properties sold, is 96 days.

These numbers are slightly behind 2013, which was an excellent year. Total sales volume is down 14.5 percent, the total number of homes sold to date is down 9.5 percent, the average sales price has dropped 5.5 percent, but the median sales price has held stable and the average days on market has dropped this year from 127 in 2013, to 96. The decrease in sales volume and number of homes sold can be attributed to the very slow start of the market during the first quarter as compared to 2013 when the market started strong.

Also, a big part of our housing market in Monongalia County is townhouses and condos. Year to date there has been 143 units sold totaling \$24,383,143.00 in sold volume. The price range of these units sold is \$73,500-\$315,000. The average sales price in 2014 has been \$170,511, and the median sales price has been \$167,000. The average days on market for sold units is 123 days. These numbers are similar to 2013. There has been exactly the same amount of units sold, but the average sales price is down 4.5 percent.

## Keep an eye on gutters

### Expert: Even with screens and guards, upkeep still needed

When was the last time you've cleaned your gutters? Well, this is a question that homeowners should know and stay up-to-date with, according to Jennifer Burgess, commercial sales specialist at Lowe's Home Improvement in Morgantown.

Burgess explained that many problems with gutters aren't major, but a simple solution to helping to keep your gutters clean can greatly help them in the long run.

"Gutter screens and gutter guards are great, especially if you're in a leafy area — you can put these on when you install the gutters or you can add this on later on," Burgess said.

By using gutter screens and guards, Ken Williams, millwork salesman at Lowe's, said maintenance will still have to be done to the gutters, but on a far lesser rate.

"You're going to have to maintain all types, but unless you put a gutter guard at the top of the gutter to get all the leaves — that will keep you

from having to go up and clean, but you're still going to have to get up every now and again to do maintenance," Williams said.

The gutter guard, though not perfect, will protect the downspout, as well.

However, Williams said cleaning the downspout on a time-to-time basis is required to having the overall gutter system last a long time.

"Protecting the downspout from getting leaves in it is great by using the protective cover, but it's probably going to clog-up on you and you're still going to have to go up and clean," he said.

As for the types of gutters that are offered to homeowners in the area, Burgess said they offer two types of PVC guttering and two types of aluminum guttering.

"Normally, people will buy the aluminum. It expands and contracts a little better with the roof than the PVC and the vinyl ones do," she said. "The aluminum will stay closer to the house if it's a really hot day — you're not going to have as much issues with it."

Nonetheless, no matter the type of gutters used, Burgess said a small issue may result in any type of guttering that can turn into something far larger if not treated immediately.

"If someone has an issue where the gutter itself has started to pull away from the fascia board and they have water coming in from behind the guttering, this can lead to the possibility of water getting behind into the wood of the fascia board," she said.

Another key factor when purchasing gutters isn't just when the weather is hot, but just the opposite — when it's cold.

In winter conditions, Burgess explained, the steps to making sure the gutters are consistently working efficiently — no matter what the conditions may be.

"In the wintertime, aluminum doesn't get as brittle as the PVC can, where you can have ice issues when putting up Christmas lights," she said. "During winter, you can use heat-tech products because they get attached to the

guttering and also to the overhang of the roof, which melts the snow and ice on the edge of the roof, so then ice will not pull your gutter down."

If the proper maintenance steps are taken at all times by homeowners, then Burgess believes the only other problem that may arise deals with the downspout of the guttering system and installing the proper pieces to it.

"Only other thing to be aware of is when you are putting the downspout in and that the elbow of the system that goes from the guttering down to downspout is bent in to either a three inch or the two inch dimension — that's normally the thing that throws people off," she said.

Williams put it simple when he said that the time for replacing gutters should not be too hard to tell — you'll just know.

"You can tell when a gutter needs to be replaced because it looks bad," he said. "If the gutters are sagging or look beat up — you're going to have to replace it."

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# A peek inside the high-tech home of the future

SAN FRANCISCO — It was a poetic convergence of tech trends at the corner of Fourth and Howard streets.

Over in Moscone Center West, Google was getting its Internet-of-things groove on at its developers conference, touting plans to tie digital devices together with products like TV sets inside our homes.

Meanwhile, across the street in Moscone North, thousands of the people who will actually be building these tech-savvy abodes — developers, architects, manufacturers and contractors — were having their annual pow-wow, giving each other a peek of

what awaits us all just inside our front doors of tomorrow.

All across the exhibitors floor at the annual builders trade show in late June, amid the nontechy stalwarts like roof tiles and toilets, you could almost hear the mantra humming just below the surface: “When it comes to the home of the future, all ... is ... one.”

“We put the backbone wiring inside the new home so that everything we use in that home is more connected,” said Joey Hill, a market representative with Legrand North America, a global rock star of switches and sockets. It’s partnering with General Electric on cutting-edge home security and home entertainment tech-

nologies, the very stuff that the Googlers were crowing about nearby. “We provide the infrastructure that supports things like Netflix on your Apple TV,” Hill said. “This is where the industry is going: You’ll control your home lighting, security and audio, all from your smartphone or tablet.”

While this trend has been picking up steam in the past year, Hill and others at the show painted a picture of an ever-rapid advancement in the digitally driven household. And borrowing a page from companies like Apple, where powerful computing is dressed up in sleek designs, Hill said, “It’s not just cool gadgets around the house, but we’ll be seeing much

more of a focus on style.”

And with that, Hill demonstrated a “pop-out outlet,” a wall socket that’s tucked into the wall and emerges — abracadabra! — with the push of a finger. “This technology has to be beautiful,” he said, “if it’s going inside your house.”

Standing nearby, Shannon Stafford was nodding her head in agreement. “I’ve got that system installed in my own house,” said the owner/president of Illuminations Lighting, an electrical equipment supplier in El Dorado Hills, Calif. “I can completely control my entire house with my phone.”

Stafford sounded like a kid in a candy store, describing the magic-wand features coming soon to new homes across the country. “I can dim

any of the lights down to 10 percent. I can customize every switch, outlet and night-light.”

This was a candy store for the home-tech crowd. On display a few booths over were new magical doorknobs that you can bump into with your rear end to open if your hands are full of groceries. Security is big, with sophisticated alarm systems and closed-circuit cameras that can turn a home into Fort Knox.

Grady Smith, district sales manager with Viking SupplyNet, showed off the latest in fire-suppression gadgets for the home, another big trend coming down the pike. That’s especially true here in California, he said, where since 2011 all new one- and two-family homes and townhomes are required by law to have fire sprinklers.




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# Front yard becomes living space

Garden designer Naomi Sanders was gratified to learn that a landscape design she created in Venice, Calif., was copied by a neighbor.

"I feel flattered," she said with a laugh. "It's great when homeowners see something or are inspired by a garden and apply it at home."

The imitation is understandable: Working with a limited variety of plants, Sanders transformed the front yard of a nondescript 1940s home into a striking, secluded space that feels fresh and modern.

The homeowners wanted an outdoor area they could enjoy without being isolated from their neighbors. But they never used the front yard because they felt exposed to the street.

Before diving into the makeover, Sanders examined the architecture of the house. "There was a weird disconnect between the 1940s architecture and the driveway, which are right next to each other," Sanders said. "I wanted to create a flow between the spaces as well as a connection between the driveway and the house."

Sanders painted the house green to help it recede from the street. This allowed the garden to stand out and feel larger than it was. Motivated by drought concerns, she also pulled up the lawn and installed a new driveway complemented by graphic pavers surrounded by gravel that works as a permeable hardscape.

Contrary to the homeowners' initial impulse to remove all the original foliage, Sanders chose to keep the home's older, established plants. A large palm tree was saved for its ability to create separation between the driveway and the landscape.

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# Honeybees: Nature's dying migrant worker

**Commercial beekeepers** who tend hives in California to help pollinate crops are on the front lines of the dying off of honey bees.

SAN JOAQUIN VALLEY, Calif. — On a cool January day in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada mountains, Steve Ellis culled his sick bees. The only sounds were their steady buzz and the chuffing of the smoker he used to keep them calm as he opened the hives, one by one, to see how many had survived. The painful chore has become an annual ritual for Ellis, and, hardened now like a medic on the front lines, he crowned another box with a big rock to mark it. "This one is G.A.D.," he said. "Good as dead."

Ellis, of Barrett, Minn., is one of some 1,300 commercial beekeepers from across the United States who mi-

grate to California each year, along with nearly 2 million hives, for the single largest pollination event in the world. Below him in the sprawling valley, nearly 1,400 square miles of almond trees — three-fourths of the global supply — were ready to burst out into a frothy sea of pink and white. To grow into a nut, every single blossom would need at least one American honeybee.

Ever since the ominous phrase "colony collapse disorder" first surfaced in 2006, scientists have struggled to explain the mysterious mass die-offs of honeybees. But here in America's food basket the escalating stakes are laid out as clearly as the almond trees that march in perfect rows up to the horizon.

Modern farm economics have created an enormously productive system of genetically engineered, chemically dependent agriculture. But it relies on just one domesticated insect to deliver a third of the food on our plate.

And that insect is dying, a victim of the very food system that has come to depend on it.

A rush of recent research points to a complex triangle of causes: Pervasive pesticides, a flowerless rural landscape dominated by cash crops, and the spread of parasites and diseases. Together they inflict enormous damage on the honeybees that crisscross the country each spring and summer, like migrant laborers, to pollinate everything from almonds in California to apples in Maine.

In the past several decades, the number of crops that depend on bees for pollination has quadrupled, even as the number of hives available to pollinate them has dropped by half.

Every winter, beekeepers on average continue to lose a fourth to a third of their hives, raising fears that the gradual decline of these remarkably resilient insects will soon limit the production of foods that Americans now take for granted.

Most consumers are insulated from the threat — as long as the aisles of America's grocery stores are resplendent with apples, lemons, coffee, cocoa, peanuts, grapes, onions, cucumbers and watermelons. But not Ellis and his sometimes partner Jeff Anderson, a third-generation beekeeper from Eagle Bend, Minn., whose family has made the annual trek to and from the California almond bloom since 1961.

For them, catastrophe could be just one harvest away.

This winter, Ellis lost about 1,200 of the 2,200 hives he had in the summer. Last winter, Anderson lost 65 percent of his 3,000 hives and didn't have enough bees to supply all his almond-growers.

Ellis and Anderson are among the most outspoken of beekeepers nationally — in federal court, in the news media, before regulators, legislators and anyone else who will listen to their warning about the American food system's mortal reliance on pesticides and monoculture.

Yet they see this unfolding crisis through entirely different prisms. Anderson, slightly round and solid as a fireplug, is a creationist who believes that God made the world and all its creatures in seven days, and that mankind was put here to take care of it. That includes using chemicals to grow food. "But we should be judicious in how we do it," he said.

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## Contentment is a better than wealth

**DEAR DAVE:** My husband has a great job, and I love my work and schedule as a substitute teacher. However, he wants me to take a full-time position so we can build more wealth. The only debt we have is our house, and we've already saved and invested a lot of money. What's your suggestion for this situation? — Marie

Dear Marie: First and foremost, you two have a responsibility to take care of each other and your own household. It sounds like you're doing that pretty well. So, if he wants you to take a full-time job only to build more wealth, I think that's a bad idea.

Wealth is for quality of life, and quality of life includes giving. It also includes a safe and stable future. But if you have to surrender the joy in life to do that — to build extra wealth or build at a different pace — well, to me that's just wrong. Contentment has nothing to do with how many hours you work or how many zeroes are in your bank account. Contentment has to do with your state of being. It's connected to your sense of gratitude, happiness and priorities. The idea that contentment is on the same spectrum as ambition? No, it's not.

I don't think you should take on a job or a schedule you hate just to pay off your house a few years earlier. I wouldn't do that, and I don't recommend you do it either. People should do something with their lives they find enjoyable and they're called to do. Now, if your kids are going hungry and your bills aren't getting paid, then you do whatever it takes. But in this case, Marie, you're happy and you guys are in a great place. I'm sure your husband is a great guy, but I think he's wrong on this one.

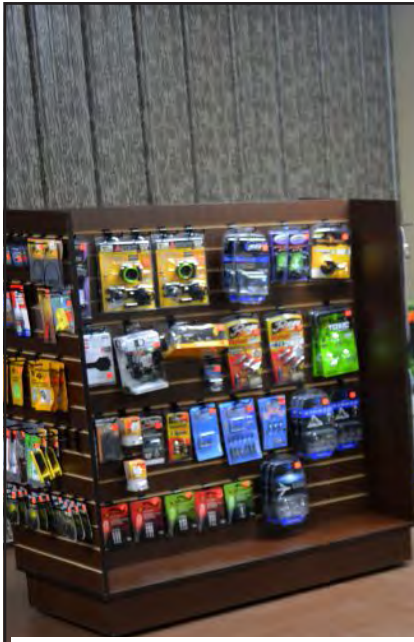
**DEAR DAVE:** My credit union offers free accidental death and dismemberment insurance. Should I take it? — Alaina

Dear Alaina: That's fine if it's free. However, I wouldn't rely on it as an integral part of my overall financial plan.

In most cases, accidental death and dismemberment policies are just a gimmick. You're not double dead if you die by accident, and your spouse or family doesn't need the money if you die by accident rather than a heart attack. They need the same coverage and the same protection regardless. When it comes to life insurance, I recommend a good level term policy that's 10 to 12 times your annual income. That means if you make \$50,000 a year, you need \$500,000 to \$600,000 in coverage.

Still, if it's really free I've got no problem with the policy. Just make sure you're not paying some other big fee to join a club so you can get "free" stuff. When that happens, it's not really free after all.

Bruceton Mills store offers 'a little bit of everything'

Whether you're looking for archery equipment, hunting gear or firearms, or if you want to virtually test your archery skills, then Pine Run Outdoors and Defense may be your ideal place.

The multi-purpose store opened in November, after nearly 30 years of having the family-run business of Pine Run Service Center right next door.

According to Pat Graham, manager of Pine Run Outdoors and Defense, the main reason for expanding the family business, which was started by his father in 1984, was before there was not store like this in the area.

"[We] opened just because there's really nothing like this around the area and (we) thought it would be good for it," Graham said. "Slowly, each month it's getting a little

bit better."

With this type of store being one of the few of its kind in the area, Shelia Haney, executive director of the Preston County Chambers of Commerce, said the more businesses and the array of different types of businesses the more people will benefit.

"It certainly is great to have diversity with businesses and great to have a range of different options for people in the area," Haney said.

The store, which is on Casteel Road in Bruceton Mills, offers a little bit of everything for outdoor activities, as Graham explained.

"We have a little bit of everything — obviously firearms, ammunition, fishing equipment," he said. "Just your basic everyday hunting and shooting supplies."

Graham said the store carries a large selection of

firearms, no matter what type you may be on the hunt for, but some stand out as the most popular firearms.

"We carry a lot of your higher end firearms — Six Hour Daniel Defense, Remington, Browning, Savage," he said. "We sell a lot of the Ruger, Smith and Wesson, Savage is a good seller for us, Mossberg — we sell a little bit of everything."

Switching types of firearms, Graham said that with the wide range of options offered at Pine Run, hand guns are quite popular, as well.

"In the hand guns, we carry the HKs, Smith and Wesson, FNH, Ruger," he said. "What we don't have, we order in for customers."

In a business that changes based on the needs of customers on a season to season basis and which hunting season it is, Graham said they're

prepared for any season.

"It's basically based on your season with this kind of [business], it's all seasonal," he said. "Of course, in bow season, you sell a lot of archery equipment and rifle season; you sell a lot of ammunition and hunting rifles."

Gear and equipment for the great outdoors aren't the only items Pine Run carries.

According to Graham, the facility has a high-tech archery range that is fully virtual and for all ages.

"Other things we do offer are a TechnoHunt archery range here in the back, which is really popular with bow hunters — it's a lot of fun to shoot," he said.

In addition to the store products, Graham said Pine Run offers bow leagues that they run a few times a year, and a concealed carry course once a month, which it's done by Kelly Defense Solutions LLC.

Graham said he is confident the store will continue to grow in a multitude of ways, as he understands the entire process is about continually expanding all that is offered.

"We'll keep building each month or each week, really — we keep increasing inventory," he said. "Word is still getting out. Obviously, it's going to take a little time for that."

## Helping working parents is good business

**THE TERM** "work/life balance" has become ubiquitous, yet most American workers remain decidedly unbalanced.

That's not to say there aren't companies doing the right thing by offering employees flexibility, paid leave and other accommodations. Those are the smart businesses, the ones that put a premium on attracting and retaining talented people.

But those companies remain the exception and not the rule, an odd fact in a country where people of every faith and political stripe speak of "the family" as being sacrosanct.

During a recent White House Summit on Working Families, President Barack Obama said: "Family leave, child care, workplace flexibility, a decent wage — these are not frills; they are basic needs."

I couldn't agree more. Unfortunately, while the president talked a good game and said he would make sure federal agencies enforce existing rules that provide workers with work/life flexibility, he hasn't done much to help working parents. His Re-

publican counterparts in Congress have done even less.

"Our sense is that small- to medium-size employers have a handle on this because they're competing in the same talent pool with bigger companies, and their ability to retain and attract people is based on flexibility, livable wages, equitable pay and mobility in the company," said Loren Harris, director of family economic security at the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. "Employers are looking at how they can attract and retain the best talent. They're seeing the writing on the wall and seeing that these issues are core to their mission."

But many larger corporations, knowing how gigantic the pool of available workers is, don't put much priority on accommodating employees.

"As with a lot of things in this country, there are sort of two Americas," said Tom Spiggle, a Virginia-based workplace attorney and author of the upcoming book, "You're Pregnant? You're Fired: Protecting Mothers, Fathers and Other Caregivers in the Workplace."

"If you look at the country overall, we're doing very poorly with family issues," Spiggle said, "especially compared to most other developed countries."

"There are companies that are on the cutting edge and doing really good work with that, and then there's everybody else, your line workers in the fast-food industry and in the lower end of the income chain. There are just some horrendous stories."

Spiggle said that since 2008, there has been a "significant rise" in pregnancy discrimination claims filed with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission: "These are just the people that bothered to go to the EEOC and file something. For every one of them, there are probably 10 who didn't make a claim."

Rather than waiting for law-

makers to mandate family-friendly workplace rules, Spiggle encourages people to make sure they understand the protections already in place. Things like the Family and Medical Leave Act, the Pregnancy Discrimination Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act (particularly as it relates to caregivers) and the Equal Pay Act.

This is an issue everyone — from workers to business owners — should care about.

In his book, Spiggle writes: "Raising children is, without argument, a matter of fundamental importance for this nation. Yet, for whatever reason, our country has chosen not to devote many public resources — for example, subsidized day care — to helping parents make balanced career decisions. I think this is shortsighted."

He's right. So let's not treat that as opinion; let's treat it as fact.

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## GMC Sierra HD ready for Herculean tasks

If you have a small mountain to move, you may well be drawn to heavy-duty pickups. The four-star 2015 GMC Sierra HD 4WD Double Cab may well be your tool, or augmentation, of choice.

Heavy-duty pickups are among the most capable vehicles on the road. They're industrial grade haulers that offer creature comforts such as ventilated seats and voice-controlled navigation and phone calls. Heavy-duty pickups get beefed-up versions of virtually every structural part and mechanical component of automakers' regular pickups, which are called "light duty" despite being able to tow up to 12,000 pounds, more than the average Indian bull elephant weighs.

Heavy-duty trucks are exempt from Environmental Protection Agency fuel economy tests and corporate average fuel economy ratings. Like UPS vans, semi trucks and farm tractors, they are considered commercial vehicles. They get a pass because they are classified as key to the U.S. economy, like freight trains.

Heavy duties account for a growing proportion of the pickup market. They're fabulously profitable and attract a surprising

number of personal-use buyers in addition to the farmers, horse breeders and oil wildcatters you might expect.

Heavy-duty pickups are exclusively the domain of the Detroit Three, Chevrolet, Ford, GMC and Ram all build them. Toyota and Nissan don't.

The GMC Sierra 2500 HD has a variety of wheelbases, bed lengths and drivetrains. It's available in rear- or four-wheel-drive and with a gasoline or diesel V-8 engine.

Prices start at \$31,565 for a rear-drive two-door with a two-door cab, 360-horsepower 6.0-liter V-8 gasoline engine and six-speed automatic transmission.

I tested a four-door Double Cab SLT model with four-wheel-drive, diesel engine, leather interior, parking assist and many other

features. It cost \$61,485. All prices exclude destination charges.

Mechanically, the Sierra 2500 HD is nearly identical to the Chevrolet Silverado 2500 HD. The Sierra justifies a slightly higher price with a cushier interior, some extra features and unique visual elements.

The Sierra I tested competes with the Silverado 2500 HD Double Cab LTZ, Ford F-250 4WD Super Cab and Ram 2500 4WD Laramie Crew Cab.

The GMC is at the high end of the price range for those trucks.

All the HD pickups offer optional diesel engines and heavy-duty transmissions for more towing capacity and better fuel economy than the gasoline engines. The GMC's 6.6-liter, V-8 diesel produces 397 horsepower and 765 pound-feet of torque. The diesel

and heavy-duty six-speed Allison transmission are an \$8,395 option package. The other brands' HD diesels cost about the same.

While customers pay handsomely for the diesels, the fact that the EPA doesn't rate heavy-duty pickups' fuel economy makes it impossible to compare the vehicles accurately. The same goes for towing capacity. None of the manufacturers have yet adopted the SAE standard for towing, meaning that each student essentially grades his own homework.

The Sierra 2500's claimed towing capacity of the truck is 800 pounds more than a comparable F-250, 50 pounds less than a Ram. The Sierra 2500's 17,900-pound maximum claimed towing capacity is greater than either Ford or Ram offers.

The Duramax diesel performs admirably in regular driving.

The Double Cab's interior is not as spacious as the crew cab, but the rear seat is more than serviceable. The front seat has plenty of room, a spacious bin in the center console and plenty of connections for power and USBs. The interior materials look and feel great, with soft wraps for the dash and doors, brushed aluminum-trim, a large touch screen and plenty of dials and buttons for easy use.

The 2500 HD is amazingly comfortable in everyday use.

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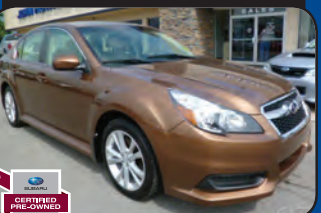

## Out of this world

### CBS shoots for the stars with sci-fi thriller 'Extant'

What defines us as humans? What is it that powers emotions and consciousness? Are there other beings out there in the universe that are cognizant? Are we alone in the universe?

They're all intriguing questions that open the discussion into the world of UFOs, extraterrestrials and artificial intelligences, as well as the discussion on just what exactly makes us human. You know, your standard sci-fi fare.

CBS is delving into that world (or possibly out of this world?) with one of the most highly anticipated, not-so-standard sci-fi series of the summer. "Extant" is a futuristic thriller that follows an astronaut coming home and trying to reconnect with her family after a year-long solo mission in outer space. Catch the series premiere Wednesday, July 9, on the eye network.

While the premise sounds like the perfect setup for a typical character drama, there are a couple key factors that hint at something that'll be far, far more compelling.

First and foremost, CBS has snagged some A-list names to star and executive produce the show, and when big names join a project, its story is bound to be just as big.

Academy Award winner Halle Berry ("Die Another Day," 2002) will star in the lead role in "Extant" as astronaut Molly Woods, back on Earth for the first time in a year after a solo mission in outer space. Berry has a movie resume as long as the trip to the moon and back, but she's returning to her roots — her first big break in Hollywood came as the star in the short-lived comedy series "Living Dolls" in 1989.

From there she bounced around with a couple guest spots on other TV shows, including a six-episode arc in the prime-time soap opera "Knots Landing." It didn't take long before she transitioned to the silver screen, and Berry carved her way into movie greatness with roles in "Jungle Fever" (1991), "The Flintstones" (1994),

"Swordfish" (2001), "X-Men" (2000) and its sequels, "Cloud Atlas" (2012) and the movie for which she won her Oscar, "Monster's Ball" (2001).

Another big name who is working behind the scenes is the legendary director and producer Steven Spielberg ("Catch Me If You Can," 2002), who'll be donning the executive producer hat for "Extant." To say that Spielberg has had an illustrious career is a massive understatement. For a man whose name is synonymous with filmmaking, it comes as no surprise that he's won more than 150 awards in his career — ranging from BAFTAs and Golden Globes to Daytime and Primetime Emmys. He has three Academy Awards to his name and another nine Oscar nominations.

Spielberg brings the pedigree to the small screen, as well as a knowledge and love for the sci-fi thriller genre. While his two Oscar-winning movies (Best Director for "Saving Private Ryan," 1998; Best Director and Best Picture for "Schindler's List," 1993) were wartime dramas, some of his other big-ticket masterpieces were from another planet. "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" (1977), "Men In Black" (1997) and "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial" (1982) all feature something otherworldly, and this background is sure to benefit "Extant."

The other key factor that suggests "Extant" will be more than just your run-of-the-mill, sci-fi

family drama is the ambiguity of the plot line. The trailers so far have been tossing viewers little treats about what to expect, except they're leaving you with questions and curiosities as well.

What's come to light so far is that on Molly's solo mission, she meets a strange man (or is it really a man?) played by Sergio Harford in his debut as a regular on network television, inside the space station. He needs help, but so many questions hover around the character. Who is he and how did he get there? When Molly returns to Earth, she finds out she's pregnant, but how is that possible if she was on a solo mission? What exactly is she pregnant with? Something human? Something ... alien?

Berry told "The Hollywood Reporter" that there's definitely something paranormal about her baby (I mean, how else can you explain getting pregnant alone in space?). She likened the situation to the classic Mia Farrow horror flick "Rosemary's Baby" (1968), saying that "Extant" shares aspects with the spooky thriller.

"There is a period that it will have elements of 'Rosemary's Baby,' she's pregnant with something unknown ... and over the course of the series, we have to decide ... what is it really?" Berry said.

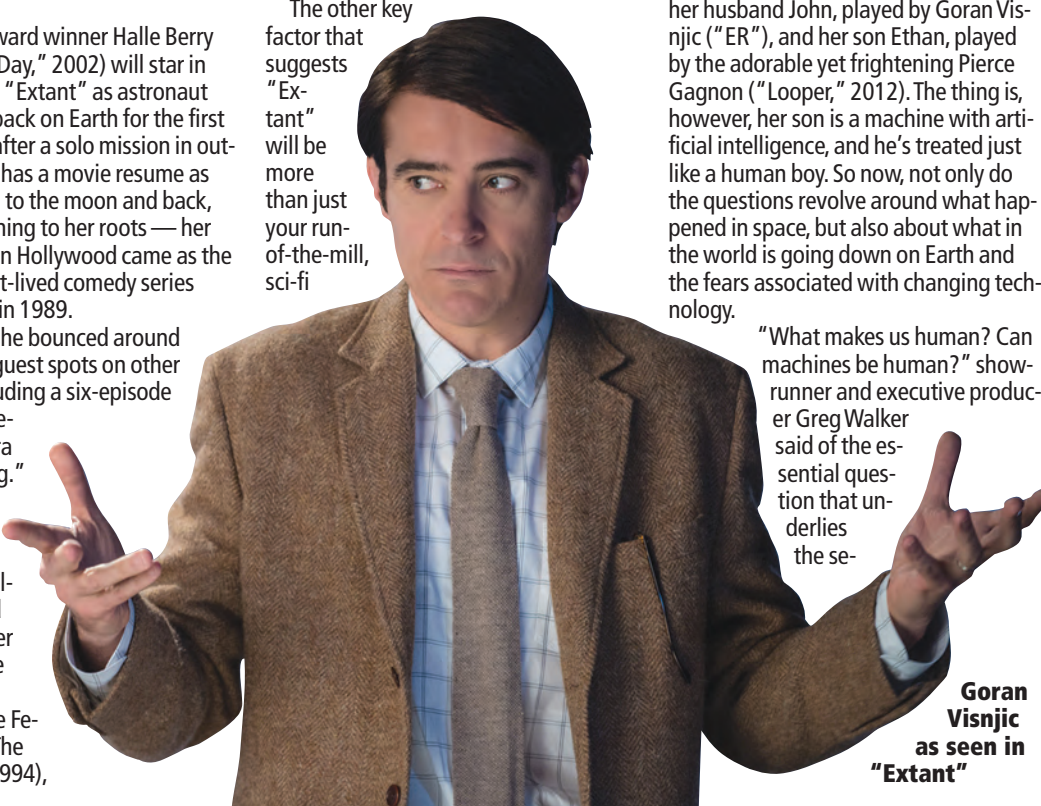
Thrown into this mix is her family — her husband John, played by Goran Visnjic ("ER"), and her son Ethan, played by the adorable yet frightening Pierce Gagnon ("Looper," 2012). The thing is, however, her son is a machine with artificial intelligence, and he's treated just like a human boy. So now, not only do the questions revolve around what happened in space, but also about what in the world is going down on Earth and the fears associated with changing technology.

"What makes us human? Can machines be human?" showrunner and executive producer Greg Walker said of the essential question that underlies the se-

ries. In his interview with "The Hollywood Reporter," he also mentioned that what makes us human is as much of a draw to aliens as anything the show explores.

It's all these unanswered questions that make it almost unbearable to wait

much longer for the show to premiere. With one of the most renowned producers at the helm and an Oscar-winning actress taking center stage, "Extant" looks to be something truly out of this world. Watch for it when the series premieres Wednesday, July 9, on CBS.

# What a 'Rush'

New actors join USA's exciting new medical drama

**What a 'Rush':** USA's highly anticipated and exciting new medical drama has been busy bulking up its cast.

"Rush" has been in the works for some time now, and as we rush ever closer to its July 17 premiere, the casting announcements have been coming in fast and furious. Starring Tom Ellis ("Miranda") as Dr. William Rush, a renegade doctor who caters to the rich and famous of L.A., "Rush" is shaping up to be a roller-coaster ride of a show.

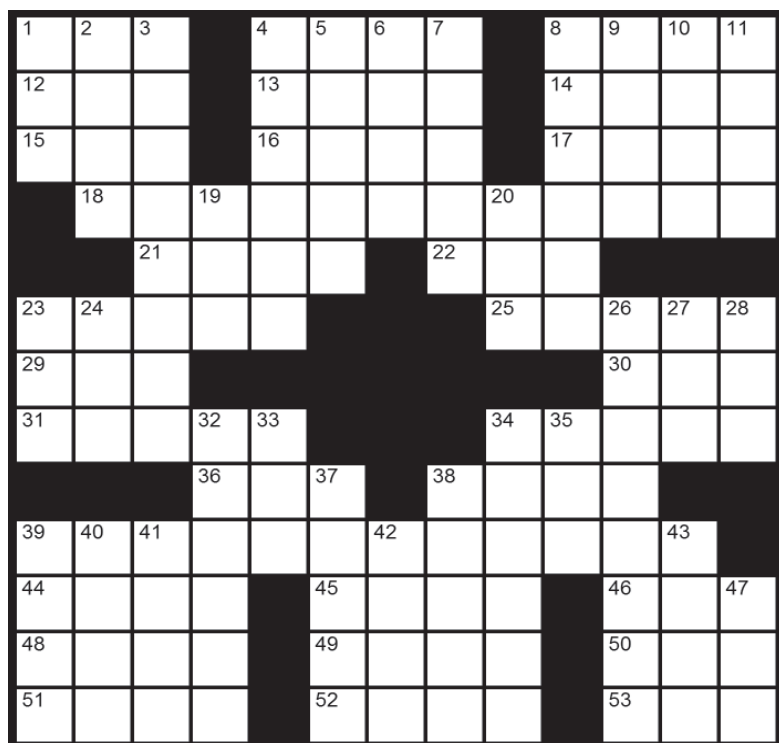
